**Appreciation of Gov. Hobby**

M. H. Wolfe of Dallas, chairman of the State-wide Prohibition Committee, has given out a statement that he believes Governor Hobby should have the loyal support of all good citizens in his capacity as governor and in his race for re-election. Speaking of the five liquor laws that have been passed that will make Texas as dry as a bone, Mr. Wolfe concludes his statement as follows:

"The credit for this remarkable victory is due largely to Governor Hobby. As I see it we would be ingrates if we should fail to re-inforce him in every way possible while he faithfully and sacredly administers the tasks as Governor of Texas, and furthermore to give him our heartiest support in the present campaign for the high office of Governor."

It was a great day for Texas when on last Thursday Governor Hobby signed the State-wide prohibition bill which closes every saloon in Texas after June 25th. There was a little doubt by some as to whether the governor would sign the bill in as much as he has always been a consistent anti-prohibitionist, but it seems he is willing to sacrifice his own personal views on this question

in order that the will of the people may be carried out through their representatives, and also because our great Government has made the call for a sober America in this great crisis. Well done Governor Hobby. You are the man of the hour in Texas and shall have the unstinted support of all the patriotic and liberty loving people of your State in your future efforts to give Texas the cleanest and best administration in its history.

**Gambling Must Go**

The Advance has always contended that gambling was one of the most demoralizing practices known to humanity. We have insisted that the officers enforce the laws against gambling in Kerrville and have been abused for our "interference." But listen what Thos. H. Franklin, one of the greatest lawyers and best citizens within the borders of Texas, has to say about it:

"The gambler is following his vocation without capital," said Mr. Franklin. "The money that he gets he gets from his victims. He backs the saloon, he backs the house of prostitution, he backs the thug, he backs the assassin, he backs the murderer and the robber, because they come to his den to spend their money. 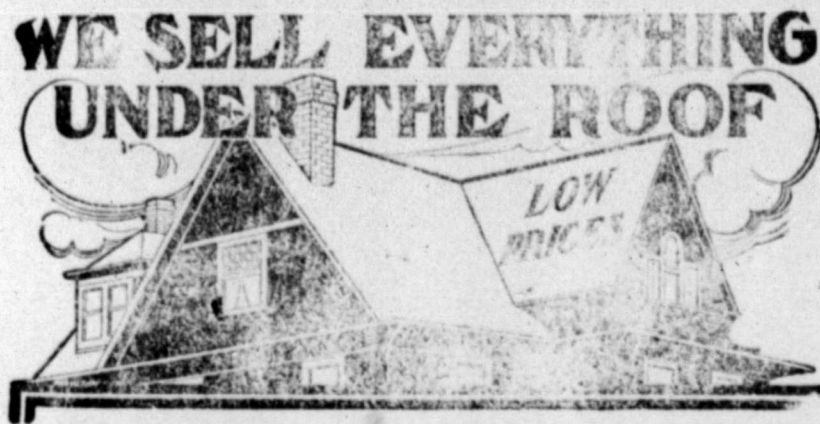

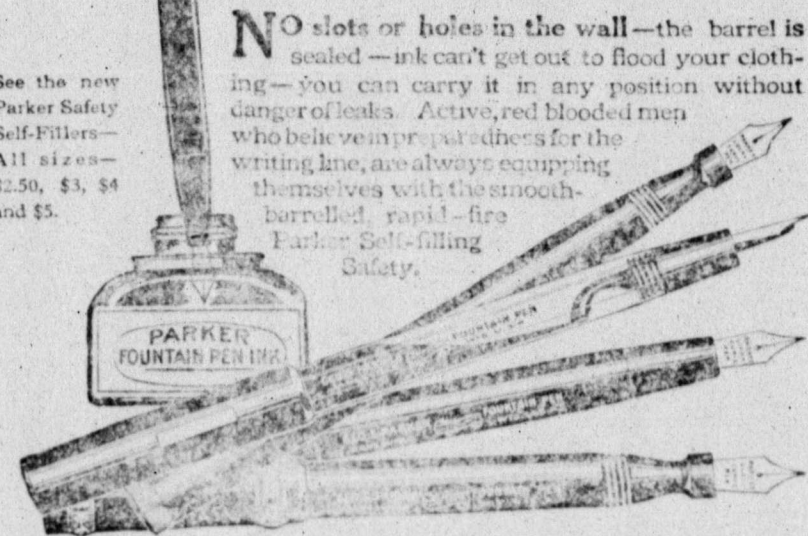

**Dry Reading Worth While**

A survey of the wet and dry situation throughout the country, just completed by the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Church, shows that there are 2,374 dry counties and 615 wet counties. This is a dry gain for the year 1917 of 88 counties.

The year 1917 gave the drys State-wide victory in New Hampshire, Utah and Indiana by legislative action and in New Mexico by vote of the people. Iowa failed by a very small majority to make its prohibition constitutional. Ohio reduced its wet majority almost to the vanishing point. New Jersey elected a local option legislature and Kentucky elected one pledged to submission of State prohibition and ratification of the national amendment. New York added 105 towns to its dry list, and Illinois closed saloons in the State capital.

The United States Supreme Court upheld the Webb-Kenyon anti-shiping law and sustained the rigid Idaho bone-dry law.

Congress voted the District of Columbia dry, passed the Reed bone dry law, shutting liquor out of all prohibition States, enacted a law prohibiting the sending of advertising of liquors through the mails in the States where it is forbidden, enacted prohibition for Alaska in response to the action of the people at the polls, made Porto Rico prohibition territory, forbade the sale of liquor to soldiers and sailors, prohibited the manufacture and importation of distilled liquors during the war, gave the President power to stop brewing to save grain and submitted an amendment to the Constitution for national prohibition.

DAIRY PRODUCTS VERY ESSENTIAL

Wiser Use of By-Products Is Clearly Shown to Be War Necessity.

IMPORTS HAVE BEEN STOPPED

Greatest Loss in Milk Industry Is Failure to Use Skim Milk and Buttermilk for Human Food—Plan for Better Dairying.

Dairy products are essential to the well-being of the nation, and the dairy cow produces more food with less feed than any other of our domestic animals.

Our Milk Flow in 1917. The total amount of milk produced in this country in 1917 is estimated to be \$4,611,350,000 pounds.

Ways to Better Dairying. Better results in dairying may be secured by proper sanitation and care in producing and handling milk.

Producing Quality Beef. Live-stock markets during recent years have experienced a continual growing demand for well-fattened beef animals weighing from 900 to 1,200 pounds.

Keep a Clean Cow Barn. The most common defect in dairy stables is a lack of cleanliness; cobbles on the ceiling and manure on the walls are too common in some places.

STATEWIDE BILL IS SIGNED BY HOBBY

MEASURE BECOMES EFFECTIVE 90 DAYS AFTER ADJOURNMENT OF LEGISLATURE.

PASS SUFFRAGE BILL

Senate Passed Bill Giving Women Vote in Primary—Measure Had Previously Passed House.

Austin, Tex.—Governor Hobby made history Thursday. He signed house bill No. 8, which invokes statewide prohibition for Texas.

With the signing of the statewide dry bill Thursday, Governor Hobby has given his approval to all but one of the liquor bills passed by the prohibition majority in both houses.

In signing the statewide bill the governor made the following statement: "I approve this act believing it is, under the conditions which prevail now, a contribution to that policy which will help to win the war and which subordinates everything else to that one thing."

MILK THAT IS SPILLED WOULD FEED THOUSANDS
