

## HUNS IN FLIGHT FROM BELGIUM

FRENCH AND BELGIAN CAVALEY FORCE ENEMY TO RETREAT ON LARGE AND RAPID SCALE.

### AMERICANS PUSH ON

in Albania the Italians Have Occupied the Austrian Naval Base at Durrazo on the Adriatic Sea. Germans Fight Hard.

Victory, crowns the allied arms on every battle front Northern Belgium is being rapidly cleared of the enemy by British and Belgian, forces. Belgians have occupied Zeebrugge and Heist have crossed the Ghent Bruges canal and on their left have reached the littch frontier whose 15,000 Germans out off from their retreat by the advance northward from Eccloo are reported to have withdrawn into Holi land, where they are interned.

Here the British have captured more than 2,000 prisoners.

Since the beginning of the operations in Flandeis the allies have made an advance of more than thirty miles over a thirty-six mile front, clearing ville all of Western Flanders as well as the coast of the chemy

Fighting desperately to hold their positions to the north and south of Le-Cuteau the Germans og a front of forty miles have massed nearly a half million men. Their line is vital to the Germans, but is just as vital to the success of the ailled arms, which are steadily pushing the enemy back and breaking through at strategical points.

The British Third Army is smashing its way forward to the south of Valenciennes. Success so far has attended this effort and the turning of this line will prove a source of great danger to vast masses of German troops holding the territory to the north and south.

The American forces, operating in conjunction with the British north of Wassigny, have advanced to the Sambre Oise canal. They occupied Rejet east of St Couplet at the point of the bayonet. retreating rapidly. This undoubtedly is one of the war's rreatest and most vital victories of

the gallant little Belgian army. French and British troops now have driven the despotlers of its country from a large section which the Germans have occupied since the early days of the war and have gained posttions of such importance that the Germans may have to abandon the entire coast of Belgium

Moreover, the sweeping advance of the allied infantry, preceded by a fan of French cavalry advancing rapidly, has left the entire area in which are the important city of Lille and the great mining and manufacturing districts of Tourcoing, Roubaix and Tournai in a salient which is growing deeper every hour and which the enemy can not hope to hold.

In Albania the Italians have occupied the Austrian naval base of Durazzo on the Adriatte Sea, while in Serbia the allied forces are continuing to press the enemy troops north of Nish.

. The great wedge that is being driven by the Belgian, British and French troops in Flanders now threatens seriously the tenure, by the enemy, of many positions in North Belgium from the Lys river to the sea, including his submarine and other bases along the coast, while to the south the Lille salient gradually is being enmeshed and doubtless soon will receive attention from the pincers which are being oiled for the task of reclaiming this important tract of territory, as far as Valenciennes, for France.

Washington -- Probably 25,000,000 or more individuals bought bonds of the fourth liberty loan, unofficial reports reaching Washington now indicate influenza Saturday, Because a large proportion of these. filed their subscriptions during the est few days of the campaign it will be a task of many days to count the number of pledges and to compile reports from the entire country. Definite figures and the total subscriptions to the loan are not available, but officials are confident the \$6,000,000,000 war credit had been oversubscribed.

Your Government

As a measure of economy Postmasters are directed to encourage the public to use stamps of the highest denomination suited to the amount of postage required on all mail. For example, a 3 cent stamp instead of 3 one cent stamps should be affixed to letters needing three. cents postage; and a 10 cent stamp instead of 5 2-cent stamps should be attached to parcels requiring ten cents postage.

Especial attention is directed to people who will use 2 1-cent stamps instead of 1 2-cent on postcards. In cases where the Government card has but one cent on it the use of a one cent stamp is unavoidable, however very soon all one cent cards will be exhausted.

By the use of large denominations a very large saving will result in the quantity of paper used, the transling as well as a saving of time to person affixing so many stamps. It is dengerous to lick stamps, keep them out of your mouth.

Ladies are especially requested to give this attention as it is noticed by postoffice employees that the women use more one cent stamps than nien. on the theory that green stamps are




