





The Railroad as an Educator.

Since the outbreak of the trouoles, in the Philippines there has been a great demand for Lups showing the resources of the West, the routes to the Pacific coast, and to the islands of the Orient. Last summer one railroad company had 15,000 of these maps printed, at a cost of \$10,000. They cost 65 cents each; but were sold for 25 cents each, barely enough to pay the express charges. The managements of the public schools of Iowa, Missouri and Kansas learned of these maps, and to date have caused over 3000 to be distributed among the schools.
