Austin, Tex., March 17 .- It is learned on reliable authority that the recent organization, under the laws of Utah of the National Railroad Company of Mexico, with a capital stock of \$63,350,000, is one of the concluding steps in the negotiations that have been in progress for some time looking to the transfer of the Mexican National and the Mexican International Railroads to the Harriman interests. It is understood that the new company will take formal possession of these properties very soon. The company has no intention of building a new railroad from Laredo or any other part on the Rio Grande border to the city of Mexico, as was stated in the recently published press dispaten from Salt Lake.




