Juror Dies Suddenly.

Paris, Tex., April 14.-Capt. O. E. Parish, an old resident and well-known citizen of Paris, died suddenly at 10:30 o'clock Saturday night in a room at the Kimball hotel. He was a member of the jury in the case of Sam Mc-Henry, charged with murder, on trial in the Federal court. The trial was begun Saturday and 'not having been completed, the jury went to the hotel in charge of Bailiff J. J. Campbell to spend the night. While sitting on the side of his bed laughing and talking to some of the other jurors, he began to cough and suddenly fell backward and expired apparently choking to death. A singular coincidence connected with his death is that at a former trial of the McHenry case a death occurred in the family of one of the jurors and a mistrial had to be declared and the case continued. Captain Parish came from Arkansas in 1874. He was 63 years of age, and was a gallant officer in the Confederate army.

Danger To \$31,000,000.

New York, April 16.-Thirtyone million dollars in silver bullion in the assay office at No. 30 Wall street, has been in danger of being melted by a fire which burned in ane of the basements for two hours. None but the employes knew of the fire and they finally overcame it without assistance. Next door to the assay office is the Sub-treasury, where the Government usually has from \$100,000,-000 to \$200,000,000 stored. In some way fire in the silver smelting room was communicated to a barrel of lard mixture used in the smelting process. There were twentythree barrels of this inflamable mixture in the room and like a flash they were enveloped in a sheet of flame so intense in heat that it was feared the great treasure in the vault would be melted.

Five employes in the basement, thoroughly drilled for such an emergency, were quickly at work, despite the dense smoke. All windows and senttles were closed to prevent giving the alarm to the public, and when, after two hours' work the last vestige of the fire had disappeared, windows at the rear were used to carry out the




