Killing Near Liberty. C. A. Corson Dead and B. P. Roberson in Jail.

LIBERTY, TEX June 3.—Yesterday afternoon about 6:00 o'clock H. P. Roberson shot and killed Charles A. Corson, about six miles south of Raywood, this county. Corson died at 2:00 this morning, and Robinson is in the Liberty jail. Corson left Liberty the afternoon of the killing under the influence of whisky, and Corson was riding on a horse with his shotgun. On meeting Roberson, cursed him and fired. OLIVEREZ HANGED.

Condemned Man Chatted Gaily With Fellow Prisoners Shortly Before He Went to the Gallows.

Penalty For Murder.

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEX., June 2. Andres Oliverez was hanged in the Nueces county jail at 11:22 this morning for the murder of Mrs. James Hatch, Jr. Oliverez slept soundly last night. At 7:00 o'clock this morning he ate a hearty breakfast. At 11:00 o'clock he dressed in a new black suit, white shirt and slippers. When the death warrant was read to him by Sheriff Bluntzer he said all he desired to say was to express his thanks to the officers for their kindness during his incarceration.

At 11:28 the march to the scaffold began. When It was reached the absolution was administered the condemned by Father Jaillett. When asked if he had anything to say Oliverez shook his head, but waved his hands to the crowd and said in Spanish: "I am going alty. now, good-by friends."

He was perfectly cool and collected and stepped upon the trap camly puffing a cigar.

His hands and feet were bound by Deputies Hires and Ranahan. The noose was adjusted by Ranahan, and the black cap by Hires.

At 11:32 Sheriff Bluntzer sprung the trap. Oliverez's neck was broken by the fall. His heart ceased beating within thirteen minutes and forty seconds At 12:00 o'clock the body was placed in a coffin and sent to the home of his wife. It was interred at 4:00 o'clock this afternoon.

The grand jury was recalled on the following Wednesday. While the jury was in session, Oliverez sent for District Attorney John I. Kleber, and confessed that he killed Mrs. Hatch. He said he did not know what caused him to commit the crime. That he went to the house and struck Mrs. Hatch on the back of the head with a hatchet, and after she fell, he struck her several blows.

He. was indicted, and his case called for trial Monday, April 28, just one week after the commission of the deed.

The defendant was represented by J. R. Scott and John C. Scott, the court appointed them. All the morning was consumed securing a

When court convened in the afternoon a number of witnesses were examined. The prisoner's confession was read to the jury By consent of counsel the case was then submitted without argument. It took the jury exactly 15 minutes to retire and return a verdiet of guilty, assessed the death pen-

Monday, May 1, Oliverez was brought into court, and by Judge Stanley Welch sentenced to be hanged Tuesday, June 3. When asked if he had anything to say, why sentence should not be passed he replied that a man who was brought in as a prisoner and placed in a cell adjoining his, had pursuaded him to make the confession, and that his confession was untrue.



JAMES L. SLAYDEN. Hellprim Describes Crater.

FORT DE FRANCE, June 4 .- Angelo Hellprin who is here for the National Geographical society, came into Fort de France last night from his explorations of the crater on the summit of Mount Pelee. Prof. Hellprin is well and in good spirits. The following important points have been settled by Prof. Hellprin:

The location of the new crater has been accurately determined; it is positively known that there has not been an overflow of moulten matter; there has been no subsidence of the mountain, and the height of Mount Pelee is unchanged; the carter does not contain a cinder cone; there has been no cataelysm and no topographical alteration of the country. The period of violent eruptions has probably ended, although the volcano may continue to be quietly active for a long time to come. Referring to his expedition, Prof. Hellprin said to-day to the correspondent for the Associated Press.

"I left Fort de France with Mr. Ledbetter the morning of May 20, and reached Acier at 7:00 o'clock in the evening of the 3rd. We visited Vive and Basse Pointe, the latter place has been entirely destroyed by the overflow of the local streams. Mud flowing into the beds of the rivers there caused this

"May 31 we made our first ascent of the volcano. We arrived at the top of the old crater, the former site of Lake Palmiste, at 11:00 o'clock.

"The extreme top of the volcano is covered with condescoria, bowlders and rocks, which had been ejected from the crater. Further down the mountain is covered with ashes and mud. On our way down we saw the river Fallais rushing along with great velocity and full of steam and mud. We re ched Acier well, but soaked, caked with mud and very much di appointed.

At Acier we met George Kennan and his party, and determined to attempt a second ascent the next day, June 1. When we reached the old crater it was again enveloped in vapor. Between the lifts in the clouds of vapor we could see the new crater of which Mr. Varian made an excellent sketch. Suddenly the vapor cleared away and we made a dash forward. We reached the edge of the new crater and from where we stood we could have dropped stones into the white-hot mass within."
