Scalded to Death.

Clarksville, Tex., March 4.—Passenger engine No. 343, going east, went dead today at Bagwell, a small station about eight miles west of here. This place was telegraphed and a freight engine in charge of Joe Ford, engineer, and Osley Herring, foreman, was sent to pull them in. Ford being sick, Dan O'Keefewere of this place was sent along to assist him. About two miles from here the engine left the track, ran along the ties for about fifty feet, turned over and rolled clear of the road bed. Joe Ford and Dan O'Keefewere were literally scalded to death and the flesh dropped off in great chunks when touched. Ford died at 3:15 and O'Keefewere at 5:10. Herring was pretty badly burned, but will recover. He states that they were only running about sixteen miles an hour and he cannot account for the wreck unless the rails had spread. Ford's home is in Texarkana and he leaves a wife and five children.

O'Keefewere lived here and was not married.

Will Keershaw and C. G. Williams, both of this place, were on the engine but were only slightly hurt.

Mexican Mangled on Alazan Bridge.

San Antonio, Tex., March 6.—The mangled remains of a Mexican who was identified as Tomas Rongel were found Sunday morning

about 3 o'clock lying on the bridge of the I. & G. N. railroad track, where it crosses the Alazan creek. The man had evidently been hurt but a short while before the body was discovered. He was barely alive when found. He was taken at once to the city hospital where he expired within a few minutes after being received. His right leg had been cut off between the knee and ankle. The right leg was mangled between the knee and the hip, the right cheek and scalp were also lacerated.

Coroner Umscheid was called to hold an inquest. Testimony will be taken this morning in Justice Umscheid's office in the court house.

As several trains had passed over the track just before the man was found, it is supposed that he must have been struck by one of them.

Rongel was 36 years old, unmarried, and had lived in this city for the past five years. He had been in the employ of the San Antonio Traction company and later had worked on the county roads.

Injuries Were Fatal.

New Braunfels, Tex., March 5.—Edgar, the sixteen-year-old son of Harman Rhode, living near Clear Springs, while riding a horse to water yesterday was violently thrown to the ground by the animal. A rope which he was using as a halter became tangled around his arm dragging him a distance of 200 yards. His skull was fractured and his body badly bruised and cut, from the effect of which he died today.

Strange Fatality in Schoepfer Family.

San Antonio, Tex., March 4.—Chas. T. Schoepfer, who resides at 138 Callaghan avenue in this city, has received the sad tidings of the death of his brother Paul, at Los Angeles, Cal. From the facts and circumstances surrounding the death of his brother, it appears that there is a mysterious fatality connected with the Schoepfer family, of itself reads like a tragedy and verifies the adage "truth is stranger than fiction."

The Schoepfer brothers, Paul, William and Charles, grew to manhood in the Kingdom of Wurtemberg, Germany. William, the second in age, being of a bold and restless nature, decided to seek his fortune in America and to that end came to the United States some thirty-four years ago and settled in New Haven, Conn. Paul Schoepfer followed a few months afterward. When William was advised that his brother was on the ocean, he went to New York to meet and welcome his brother. William and his cousin took up quarters in a boarding house. While waiting for the steamer's arrival, he took a stroll through the city. Failing to return in a reasonable time his cousin became uneasy and gave the alarm. Officers and detectives worked zealously on the case but without avail. William Schoepfer has never been seen nor heard of by any of the family from that day to this.

In due time Paul Schoepfer landed. Failing to find or learn anything of the whereabouts of his brother, he made his way South and settled in New Orleans. Chas. Schoepfer came over soon afterwards, coming to New Orleans. Paul had arranged his business affairs, however, to go to California and the brothers only met for a short while. Amid the changes and vicissitudes of years the brothers had indulged in the hope that they would meet again in family reunion. This was not to be. The same mystery which surrounds the disappearance of William, also applies in a large degree to the death of Paul. Friday he was found dead in his room and as the body was badly decomposed it was evident he had been dead for several days. He had occupied the apartments in which the body was found for the past twenty years.

Chas. Schoepfer is of the opinion that his brother was murdered. He is strengthened in this belief because of the fact, that his brother had recently received considerable money from Germany, but the searchers have been unable to find any money in the apartments.

Deceased was well known in Chicago and New Orleans, having relations in the former city. There are two sisters living in Germany. Mr. Schoepfer is awaiting further particulars of the death of his brother. Interment will be made in Los Angeles.

B. F. Mayo Killed.

Gordon, Texas, March 4.—B. F. Mayo and James Quarles had a pistol duel Thursday morning about 9 o'clock, in which Mayo was shot through the head, killing him instantly, Mr. Quarles was shot through the shoulder, but not dangerously wounded.

The difficulty arose over a disputed boundary line between them, over which words came to blows with the above result.

Mayo fired three shots and Quarles one, all at close range. Both men were old and respected citizens of Palo Pinto county. Both have families who have been raised in community. Mayo leaves a wife and five or six children, all grown.

A. Marks Dead.

Calvert, Tex., March 4.—Mr. A. Marks, one of Calvert's most prominent and highly esteemed merchants and citizens, was found dead in his barn yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock. When discovered he was sitting in his buggy, having been dead several hours. Mr. Marks was something over 50 years of age, having resided in Calvert about twenty years. He was a man of splendid business capabilities and possessed property in and around this place. His family consisted of a wife and two daughters and a nephew, Mr. Arthur Marks, who has been connected with him for several years. The funeral takes place tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock from his late residence. The services will be held under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity. The death of Mr. Marks has cast a gloom over the entire city.

Died From Poison.

San Antonio, Texas, March 7.—Victoriana Barrera, aged 22 years, died at 11 o'clock Monday morning at a restaurant on East Commerce street.

The young man's death was caused by a drug which he had swallowed. He resided on South Laredo street with his father, Pablo Barrera.

At the time of his death he was employed at the above mentioned restaurant. It was noticed that Barrera had been in a despondent mood for several days, and just prior to his death he had told a friend that he intended to kill himself. When asked why he contemplated such an act, he replied that he feared he would be sent to prison on account of a difficulty in which he had been engaged recently in a trans-San Pedro saloon in which a man had been hit on the head with a billiard cue. Barrera stated, according to his friend, that he had no money with which to pay a fine and costs, should such be adjudged against him, and therefore he would have to spend some time in the county jail or convict camp. He preferred death to either.

Barrera's father stated that when his son left home Monday morning he had not said anything that boded ill and therefore the tragedy was a terrible shock to the family.

Shot by Policeman.

Dallas, Tex., March 4.—Policeman R. A. McMillan tonight shot Andrew Moody, a Mexican, at Young and Austin streets. Attendants at the city hospital say Moody is shot through both lungs and can not live through the night. McMillan says he was trying to suppress a disturbance between Mexicans and that Moody attempted to shoot him and he had to shoot in self-defense. The county attorney's department placed McMillan under \$500 bond to appear before the grand jury on Monday next. He made bond and resumed duty on his beat.

SELF, THE JEWELER.

Judge John H. Reagan Last of Confederacy Dead at Palestine.

Palestine, Tex., March 7.—Texas mourns the loss of Judge John H. Reagan, one of the greatest, most honored and best beloved of her adopted sons, of one who gave years of his life to her service, always guided by a lofty patriotism and always commanding the highest esteem and the confidence of the people of his adopted State.

Born in Sevier County, Tennessee, John H. Reagan removed to Texas before he had quite attained his majority, and it was only a few weeks after he crossed the border into what was then the Republic of Texas that he had joined in an expedition against hostile Indians, in which he acquitted himself so well that he was offered a commission in the army of the Republic. From being a farmer and surveyor he became a justice of the peace, and that led him to the study of law and four years later he was elected a probate judge and later district judge. In 1857 he entered the arena of politics, being elected to Congress that year, and for nearly half a century thereafter he was a prominent figure, even to the day of his death. He was one of the six delegates from Texas to the Provisional Congress of the Southern Confederacy, and afterward Postmaster General in the Cabinet of President Davis. For several years he had the distinction of being the only surviving member of that Cabinet.

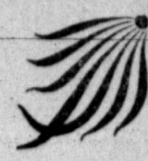
When his disabilities were removed by Act of Congress in 1875, Judge Reagan was again chose to be a member of that body, and served as Representative until he was elected to the Senate. It was while filling this term that Texas adopted a State Railroad Commission, and Governor Hogg persuaded Senator Reagan to give up the pleasant and agreeable and Senatorial office for the hard and laborious task of Railroad Commissioner.

May Name Negro.

Washington, March 5.—Although no official statement can be obtained on the subject, it is known the President has under consideration the appointment of Charles R. Anderson, a colored lawyer of New York, to succeed Charles K. Treat as collector of internal revenue for the District of New York. If this appointment is made Mr. Treat, in all probability, will be appointed to succeed Ellis H. Roberts as Treasurer of the United States at Washington. It is understood, however, that no change will be made until Mr. Roberts has completed eight years' service, which will occur next June.

Philippine Dialects.

There are between forty and fifty dialects in the Philippine islands. All of these dialects belong to one common Malayan stock. Their grammatical structure is the same. The sentence in each one of them is built up in the same way. The striking use of affixes and suffixes, which gives the speech its character, is common to them all. There are, moreover, words and expressions identical to them all. A hundred common words could readily be selected which would scarcely vary from one language to another; but the fact still remains that while similar in grammatical structure, these languages are very different in vocabulary—so different that two members of any two tribes brought together are unable to converse, or at first even to make themselves understood for the simplest steps of intercourse. Although similarity in structure makes it very easy for a Filipino of one tribe to learn the language of another, yet nevertheless these languages have preserved their distinction for more than 300 years of European rule and in the face of a common religion and in spite of considerable migration and mixture between the different tribes.

Thirty million of those dollars have been expended in the United States alone. As a result there are 779 Carnegie libraries in the United States, and it is estimated that a little over 14,000,000 persons have access to those libraries, making 18.7 per cent of the population which has had its torch of learning lighted from the sacred central fire of Carnegie.

OBITUARY.

D. C. Cox, a man of exceptional amiability and prominent citizen of Bandera county, died at his late residence, two miles north of Bandera, on Sunday, February 26, 1905, after an illness of two weeks from a severe carbuncle on the back of his neck. He leaves to survive him, besides his widow, six sons: James, Davis, Robert and Walter of Bandera, and Thomas and Fred of Center Point; and one daughter, Mrs. Will Burney of Kerr county; also Nathan Rayfield, husband of a deceased daughter of Bandera; and an only sister, Mrs. Stanley of Turtle creek, Kerr county. Mr. Cox was buried at Center Point and was a member of the Methodist church of that place.

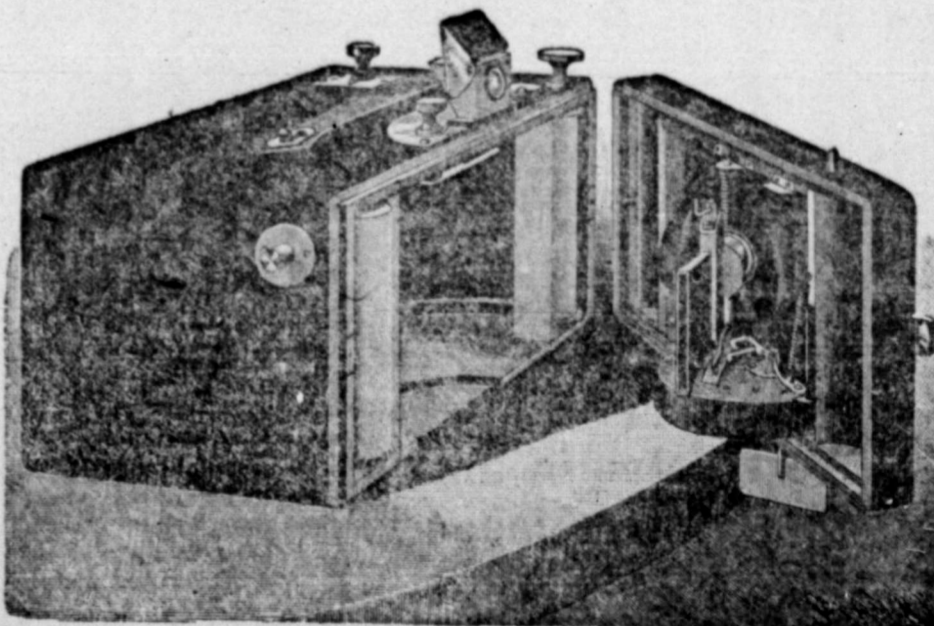
