Judge John H. Reagan Last of Confedracy Dead at Palestine.

Palestine, Tex., March 7 .- Texas mourns the loss of Judge John H. Reagan, one of the greatest, most honored and best beloved of her adopted sons, of one who gave years of his life to her service, always guided by a lofty 'patriotism and always commanding the highest esteem and the confidence of the people of his adopted State.

Born in Sevier County, Tennessee, John H. Reagan removed to Texas before he had quite attained his majority, and it was only a few weeks after he crossed the border into what was then the Republic of Texas that he had joined in an expedition against hostile Indians, in which he acquitted himself so well that he was offered a commis-
