udge Jon lit fedracy Dead at Palestine Palestine, Tex., March 7.-Texas mourns the loss of Juage John II Reagan, one of the greatest, most honored and best beloved of her adopted sous, of one who gave
years of his life to her service, alyears of his life to her service, al ways guided by a lofty patriotism and always commanding the high est coteem and the confildence of the people of his adopted state. Born in Sevier County, Tennessee, John H. Reagan removed to Texas before he had quite attained his majority, and it was only a few weeks after he crossed the border into what was then the Republic of Texas that he had joined in an expedition agamst hostile Indians, well that he was offered a commis well that he was offered a commis sion in the army of the Republic From being a farmer and surveyo he became a justice of the peace, and that led him to the study of law and four years later he was elected a probate judge and later district judge. In 18.57 he estered the arena of politics, being elected to
Congress that year, and for nearly Congress that year, and for nearly a prominent figure, even to the day of his death. He was one of the six delegates from Texas to the Provisional Congress of the South-
ernConfederacy, and afterwardPostmaster General in the Cabinet of President Davis. For seteral years he had the distinction of being the only surviving member of that Cabinet.
