Mr. and Mrs. McLean were the first couple married in the county. They lived on the ranch until a few years before his death in '54.


Burial was in Bovina Cemetery with Claborn Funeral Home, Friona, in charge of arrangements.

# Year Sees Many **Projects Completed**

The year 1961 was folded back into pages of history Sunday night, Dec. 31.

The 365-day period in Bovina, saw numerous civic prolects conducted to successful completions, Bovina High athletic teams take a bi-district basketball championship and football squad a district banner, a new Little League ballpark constructed, a rodeo and roping arena built, expansion of the communities' residential and business areas and many other

News of 1961, as selected from files of The Bovina Blade, is offered here by months:

**JANUARY** 

Newly-organized Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture began to swing into motion; Mustang and Fillie basketball teams jumped off to good starts in district basketball races: action was begun to organize farmers interested in sugar beet production here; some 25 members of Bovina High FFA chapter made a trip to Southwestern Livestock Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth. **FEBRUARY** 

Bovina Sugar Beet Growers Association was organized with Wendol Christian named president; Williams Mercantile Co. was robbed of \$2000 in merchandise; Don Murphy, Bovina farmer, was national winner of DeKalb's grain sorghum production contest; J. W. Wright was top corn producer in Texas, also in a DeKalb contest; Texas Highway Department agreed to aid city and property owners on Third Street, Highway 86 and FM Road 1731 south by providing additional paving for the roads if property owners would pay for cost of curb and gutter; merchandise stolen from Williams Mercantile was recovered after arrest of four Clovis men; Ridgelea Addition, a new housing project for Bovina, became a near certainty; Mustangs won district basketball honors by downing Lazbuddie in a playoff and Fillies lost to Happy in same type playoff after finishing second in the league race; Mustangs defeated Adrian for bi-district and then lost to Jayton, 50-49, in opening round of regional basketball tournament in Canyon; \$160 in cash was stolen in a breakin at Bonds Oil Co.; A. L. Hartzog and Don Sides purchased Joe M. Brown Gin.

Annual Bovina FFA project show was staged in a Western Warehouse Co. building, Olen Johnston exhibited the champion steer and Buddy Turker had the champio! barrow; grand opening of E and D Motors on Highway 86 was staged; Roy Crawford, Bovina High vo-ag instructor, was named Bovina's outstanding citizen of year at first annual chamber of commerce banquet; Bovina High senior class staged a successful volleyball tournament which saw 27 teams entered; first day of spring saw Bovina covered with a blanket of snow,

Bovina Glass Works and Paint on Highway 60 observed its grand opening; J. D. Kirkpatrick and Jack Clayton were re-elected to school board; Al Kerby and Bud Crump were elected to city commission, replacing Bedford Caldwell and I. W. Quickel; Mustang track team finished third in district with four men qualifying for regional meet; Bovina's insurance key rate was lowered resulting in a 12 per cent decrease in premium cost; Bovina FFA honored three men as honorary chapter farmers, Pat Kunselman, D. R. Bushnell and R. T. Harbour; city was considering Bovina's proposed housing project from standpoint of furnishing water and sewer service to the proposed area; baseball was dropped from sports

curriculum of Bovina High.

Cynthia Patterson, Brenda Jones and Roger Ezell were named top scholastic students of 1961 Bovina High graduating class; deposits at First National Bank were holding steady with year prior; stop signs were erected at various intersections; Don Caldwell, Bovina High track star, ran second in mile at state meet; school board voted to drop band from school program; Lynn Looney, Billy Minter and David Anderson were top scholastic eighth grade graduates; Bill Christian, Inc., housing developer for a proposed project here, accepted city's offer for water and sewer facilites and the development moved into go-ahead stage; state highway department here moved into its new building on Highway 86; plans were being made for Little League baseball program; 22 were graduated from Bovina High in commencement exercises; Durward Bell and Walter Kriegel were elected to board of directors of Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc.; Bovina and Parmer County votes went Republican as they favored John Towers, the state winner, for U. S. Senator.

With four teams in each league, Little League and men's softball action began with games being played at night on converted football field; Alfred White, minister of Bovina Church of Christ, announced that he was moving to Olton to serve as minister; Rev. Davis Edens, pastor of Bovina Methodist Church, moved to Wellington to become pastor of First Methodist Church there; Rev. Edens was replaced by Rev. Harold Morris, who came here from Coahoma; Bovina Auto Parts, Inc. and Bovina Auto Service staged its grand opening; over \$2000 was raised in a drive toward building a Little League ballpark for the community; plans were being made to construct a roping arena west of town; Bovina Lions scheduled their annual July 4 celebration; price of haircuts in Bovina was increased from \$1 to \$1.25; Blade received a first place award for newswriting in Texas Press contests; 120,000 bushel addition was constructed at Macon Elevator.

A large crowd attended Bovina's July 4 celebration with carnival rides being a feature of the event; bank deposits were up \$200,000 over previous year; postal receipts also showed an increase; Northside Service Station was robbed; Don Stone was named minister of Church of Christ; construction began on new community ballpark; Bonds Oil Co. suffered another breakin; Three-Way-H&M was crowned champion of Bovina Little League; Steve Messenger of Friona opened a bookkeeping service here with offices in Bank Building.

AUGUST

Football practice began; new ballpark was complete and ready for action; work on new roping arena was progressing; a Bracero housing unit was closed here by U. S. Department of Labor creating possibility of loss of needed Bracero laborers during upcoming harvest season; ground-breaking ceremonies for Ridgelea housing addition were held; school opened with enrollment nearing 500 mark; Bovina Businesses Second Annual Cotton Bowl Football contest began in the Blade.



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
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# Burglars Strike; Get Tires, Antifreeze

Burglars struck at Grady Dodd's Texaco warehouse last Thursday night for the second time in seven months and made off with 67 tires.

A second burgiary at Kendrick Oil Company is thought to have been committed by the same persons that night. Eight truck tires, two smaller tires and 120 gallons of antifreeze were taken at Kendrick's.

Two trucks which were stolen Thursday night are believed to have been used in the burglaries. The first truck taken was from Gilbert Wenner's barn about one-quarter of a mile south of his residence at the Hub crossing. A second truck which belongs to Roy Christian was later taken from Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply.

Investigating officers found tracks and oil left by Wenner's truck at Dodd's. The truck was driven across the railroad tracks and halted for some time across the street east of Dodd's. A considerable oil pool was formed while the truckwas stopped at this position. The truck tracks then led to the warehouse ramp where the tires were loaded.


"There is no doubt that they were well acquainted with the area and had thoroughly planned the whole operation," Sheriff Charles Lovelace said.

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
