

# Remedy to Smoke Nuisance.

A novel method of putting black smoke to practical use has been discovered at one of the large factories in Belgium. The smoke is taken from the chimney filled with a stream of petroleum, which absorbs the smoke and generates a gas which is burned and used to run gas engines.
