### Faculty Notes.

#### Horace W. Morelock.

Mr. Morelock is a graduate of Peabody Normal and of the University of Tennessee. He has also done one year's graduate work. During his college course he made a special study of English and is one

#### J. W. Bagby.

Mr. Bagby is a graduate of the Polytechnic College. While at school he made a special study of Mathematics, and has been very successful in teaching its various branches in high schools affiliated with the State University. He has had several year's experience as instructor in high schools and as superintendent. His work has uniformly been of a high order of excellence. He is a close student, a good thinker, possessing in a high degree that type of ability for a mathematician. His popularity as a Normal instructor is conclusively proved by the important positions he has held.

#### R. W. Bennett.

Mr. Bennett is a graduate of Centenary College where he did special work in Science. He has been in the teaching profession in the State of Texas for ten years, and his uniform success is attested by all, his services being in demand wherever he is known. During the summer of 1904 he was a member of the Faculty in the Summer Normal at Austin. At present he is Chairman of the Kerr County Board of Examiners, and for the past two years has been principal of the Center Point Public School.

has always been of the most stimulating and scholarly type. At present she holds the chair of History in Tivy High School. Miss Fulton is not only thoroughly prepared to teach the subject of history, but possesses those rare qualities of presenting the subject to the best advantage.

### The Normal.

The sessions of the Normal will be held in the High School Building which has an excellent Physical Laboratory, also a Library of about 600 good books, together with numerous books of reference. This building is situated in one of the most delightful parts of the city, has surrounding it a beautiful campus suited to all kinds of athletic sports, is elegantly furnished with the latest style of desks, globes, maps and charts, and is on an elevation which catches those invigorating breezes which contribute so much to taking away the dread of summer.

Special attention will be given to students preparing for and examination with a view to teaching. The latest scientific methods will also be employed in presenting the subject-matter, thus affording an excellent opportunity to inexperienced teachers of becoming acquainted with the secrets of success. The eminent Dr. McMurtrey will be taken as the standard on all pedagogical questions. The twofold object of the Normal will be to initiate new teachers into the difficult art, also to stimulate old teachers with renewed energies for their work.

### Special Courses.

In addition to the regular course outlined by the State Superintendent, instruction may be had in the following subjects by students desiring to pursue them:

1. English and American Literature—A brief sketch of the leading Authors, their best known works and how to study them.
2. German—A practical course along modern lines.
3. French—Its historical relation to English.

### Library.

The Tivy High School Library is very complete in books of Reference on History, Biography and Literature. All bona fide students of the Normal will have free access to this Library.

### Physical Laboratory.

This department has been recently equipped with a good supply of apparatus and laboratory tables. Among the numerous pieces are the Siren, Manometric Flames, Distillation Apparatus, Electrical Machine, Ruhmkorff Coil, Wheatstone Bridge, Rheostat, Linear Expansion of Solids, Electrometer, Galvanometer, Whirling Machine, Hydraulic Press, Pumps and a complete outfit on Light.

The subject of Physiology will also be treated in the Laboratory experimentally. The Microscope will be used extensively. The simpler elements such as O. H. N. and CO<sub>2</sub> will be made, to show their nature and relation to the foods.

### Examinations.

At the close of the Normal teachers will be given an opportunity to take an examination for State

Certificate, including "Second Grade," "First Grade," "Permanent" and "Permanent Primary." ### Convicts Raise Fund.

Houston, Tex., May 2.—Sheriff Anderson has received a letter from J. H. Walker, at Rusk, assistant financial agent of the State penitentiaries, inclosing a check for \$40.52 raised by the inmates of the Rusk prison for the relief of John Dunlap, who alleges that he was assaulted by Hottle, robbed and left for dead.

Mr. Walker stated in his letter that the money was raised by the better element of the prisoners, who feel that Hottle and several others discharged from the penitentiary have hurt the men they left behind materially and fear that the public may be disposed to judge all convicts by the standard set by these men.

It was the original intention of the prisoners to raise \$100 to be used in the detection of Hottle or rather to be used as a reward for his capture. But as the means of circulating such a subscription list in the prison is slow, Hottle was captured before this money could be raised. The men then decided to raise \$50 for the relief of Dunlap.

### Laredo Returns Contributions.

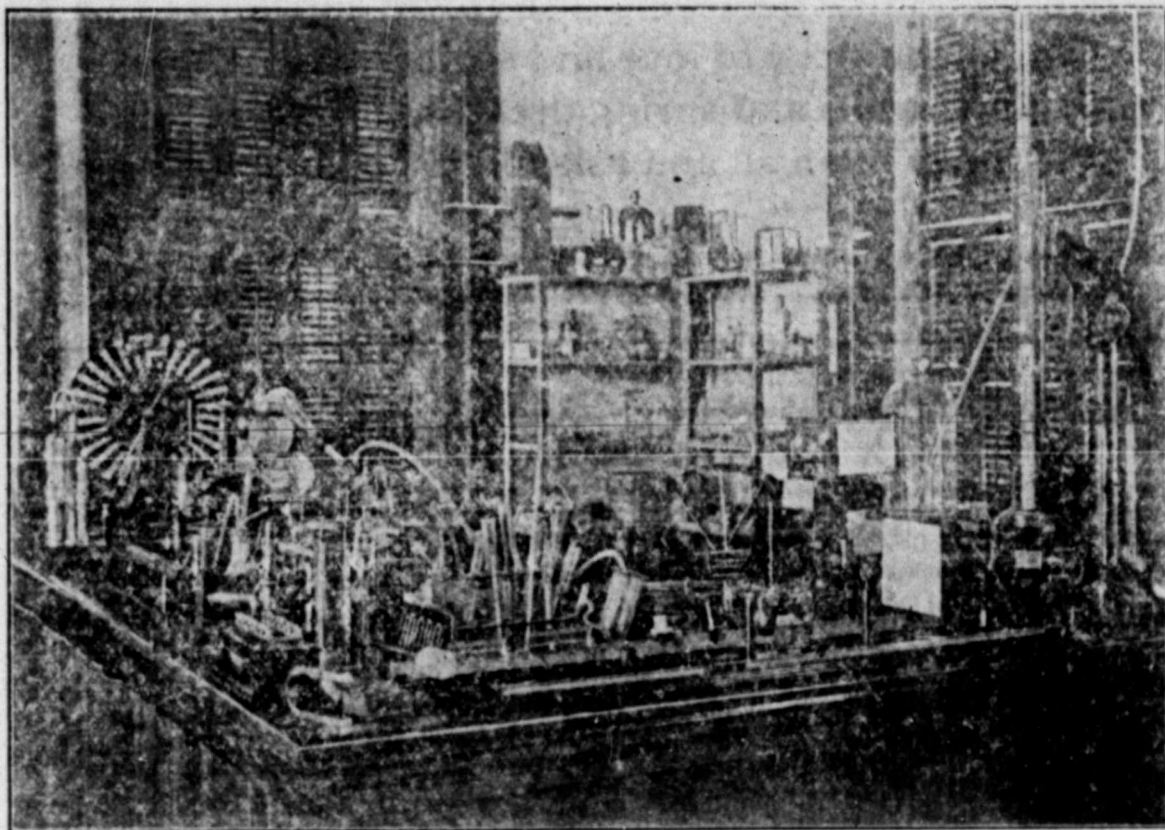

Austin, Tex., April 30.—E. P. Broline, aged 52 years, was found dead on Shoal Creek, where the speedway crosses it, early this morning. There are no marks of violence on the body, and it is believed that his death was caused by heart failure.

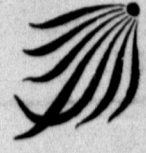

Of bread the American consumes 380 pounds, the Frenchman 540 pounds, the German 560 pounds, the Spaniard 480 pounds, the Italian 400 pounds and the Russian 655 pounds.

THE Wisconsin Legislature has passed a law prohibiting one branch of grafting in that state. That won't make much difference. There are others. You can almost always get things in Prohibition states anyway.

Wool is in greater demand this season than for several years. The wools grown in the section adjacent to Kerrville rank A1 in the American wool markets and are eagerly sought after by buyers. Representatives of all the large wool factors in America visit this market every season. Our wools are exceptionally fine this spring.

### American Negroes.

There are 9,204,331 negroes in the United States, including Porto Rico and Hawaii. Nine-tenths of them live in the South—one-third of its population. Seventy-seven per cent work on 746,000 farms of which 21 per cent are absolutely and 4 per cent partially owned by negroes. There are 21,000 negro carpenters, 20,000 barbers, and nearly as many doctors, 16,000 ministers, 15,000 masons, 12,000 dressmakers, 10,000 engineers and firemen, 5,000 shoemakers, 4,000 musicians, 2,000 actors and showmen, 1,000 lawyers. Since 1890 negro illiteracy has sunk from 57 to 44.5 per cent.

### Digestible Chestnut.

The London Lancet finds that the chestnut is the most digestible nut, and cannot only take the place of the potato, as in France, where chestnuts, boiled and mashed like potatoes, make a delicious dish, but in reality they are a more perfect form of food. According to the Lancet's analysis of the potato and the chestnut, the latter contains less water, more proteid, more fat and starch, but less mineral matter than the potato, and is more digestible than the latter. Like the potato, also, its nutritive and digestive qualities are greatest when baked or roasted.

### Where They Eat Flowers.

Many flowers are eaten as vegetables in Asia. In Japan the common chrysanthemum is eaten with relish as a salad. For this purpose only the petals are used. These are plucked while the blossom is fresh and are boiled until they assume something of the consistency of a jelly. Salt, vinegar and sugar are then added, and the salad is served with any dressing which may be preferred. Sometimes at a large dinner party the room is decorated with growing chrysanthemums, petals from plants chosen by the guests are then and there dropped into boiling water and a salad is soon ready, tinted with the color of the flowers.

### Foreign Students in France.

The Frankfurter Zeitung reports that the number of foreign students at the French universities is steadily increasing. During the past academy year the total was 2,510, and of these 1,603 were women. Paris alone reports 1,315 foreigners, and among them 401 women. Montpellier has 224 foreigners enrolled, fully half of whom are women. In Grenoble there are 223 foreigners, nearly all of these being Germans; and in addition 352 non-French took part in the well known "vacation courses" of this institution. Of the other French universities, Nancy reported 165 foreigners; Lyons, 87; Bordeaux, 86.

### Embalmed in Glass.

To preserve the features of those who have died it is proposed by casting around them a solid mass of glass. This would be perfectly transparent, and as no air could get in the features would be preserved indefinitely. Of course, it is not possible to pour molten glass directly on the body, so it is first coated with a thin covering of so-called "liquid glass," or sodium silicate. This is allowed to harden, and forms a protective coating. The body is then put in a mold and melted glass poured around it.

### A Scientist's Costly Mistake.

An English entomologist recently received for examination a few specimens of the gypsy moth, and accidentally allowed some half dozen to escape. These increased and multiplied in such an alarming fashion that the moths spread over a certain locality, in which they wrought considerable damage. It has cost that English county \$500,000 in the attempt to suppress them, and it is estimated that it will take another \$100,000 per annum to keep them from traveling outside the area which they at present devastated.

If the new floating machine shop comes up to expectations a battle fleet may establish a temporary base near a scene of action and change it to meet the exigencies of an engagement.

### Japanese Women Hermits.

Japan has its communities of silent recluses. There is a convent at a place called Yunakawa, about seven miles from Hakodate. A matron of 50 presides, and her instructions are implicitly obeyed. The women are all young, ranging from 16 to 25, and some of them are described as beautiful. The building stands in a farm of some 250 acres, but the women do not engage in any agricultural work. They spend most of their time indoors, and they observe a strict rule of silence.

### Gives Bounty to Oil Producers.

As a result of the change in oil duties in June, 1904, there has been a heavy falling off in the imports of oil in the Dominion of Canada, and a notable increase in the production of wells. Up to December 1, 1904, applications for bounty had been received from 365 producers. The bounty claimed amounted to \$123,088, representing 18,483,200 gallons of oil pumped from wells and delivered to refineries or storage tanks.

### Largest Tunnel in the World.

The Simplon tunnel has met with no end of obstacles during its course of construction. It will be twelve and one-half miles long when finished, the longest tunnel in the world. Its altitude above sea level (2,310 feet), is much lower than that of any other Alpine tunnel, which accounts for its great length. The Arlberg is six and one-half miles long and 4,300 feet above the sea level. Work was started in August, 1898, simultaneously from the Swiss and Italian sides. All the workmen (10,000), are Italians, 4,000 beginning work at Brigue, Switzerland, and 6,000 at Iselle on the Italian side. It was believed that the rocks were composed of vertical strata, but they proved to be horizontal on the Italian side. Great streams of water were met, which it required much energy to turn aside. After this difficulty has been overcome the engineers came upon a bed of moving sand, which threatened to fill the shaft already drilled. The rock through which the tunnel is being driven is mostly granite. Work progresses at the rate of twenty feet or more a day. The cost eventually will be between \$18,000,000 and \$20,000,000.

### Library Meeting.

The Kerrville Branch of the International Sunshine Society held a very interesting and most enjoyable meeting, at the Sunshine Library, Monday, May 1st, at 8:30 p. m.

In absence of the president the meeting, which was well attended, was called to order by the vice-president.

The business of the meeting was disposed of in short order:

Our librarian reported 600 books on hands, also that 260 had been let out to 80 members during the last month which shows how useful the Library is proving. Seventeen members joined the Society during April. It was decided that duplicate books could, at the discretion of the Librarian, be handed to the school library, who we hope will extend the same courtesy to us.

Next came the much looked forward to program which in its excellence surpassed our highest anticipations.

Mr. Walther in a most able speech full of brilliant witticisms, gave us the wonderful history of our President-General, Mrs. Cynthia Westover Alden, remarkable career, commencing with the time she went to New York a poor but ambitious girl, on through her life as a gifted singer, civic-work, journalist, author and last, but by no means least to her present work as the head of the glorious Sunshine Society, to which she is devoting the rest of her life without receiving any financial reward, but imagine the great happiness that must be her's in the knowledge of all the sunshine she is causing to gleam through the dark places of the world.

Next in the program was the subject by Prof. Morelock, who told us of the beginnings of the Society, of how appropriate its name was, illustrating in beautiful work pictures our dependence on the rays of the beneficent sun; and in his usual elucidate and expressive style demonstrated the great work this society is accomplishing, more especially as connected with library work, leaving with us as a last question, "Are we doing all in our power to improve the literary taste of those around us."

After interesting discussion the society adjourned to meet the first Monday in June. The subject for discussion at next meeting will be Frances Willard.

### A New Marconi Invention.

William Marconi, the wireless telegraph expert, in a lecture before the Royal institution, announced an invention of great importance to the efficiency of his wireless telegraphic system, which has hitherto been hampered by inability to receive more than twenty-four words a minute, and this only by means of a telephone attached to the receiver. By this method no documentary record of messages was made.

Mr. Marconi said: "I have been able very recently to construct a magnetic detector which will work a relay, enabling messages to be recorded on a tape by the ordinary Wheatstone recorder. The new receiver is far simpler than any yet devised for wireless telegraphy. It requires less attention and is absolutely reliable. The principal advantage is, however, that the receiving speed is increased from twenty-four to one hundred words a minute."

Mr. Marconi hinted at further improvements in receiving that he is elaborating in conjunction with Professor Fleming.

### Affectionate Statesmen.

In the closing hours of congress last week the republican gave Speaker Cannon a loving cup, and the Democrats gave the house leader, Jno. Sharp William, a similar token of affection and esteem. The presentations of the gifts was made at a joint caucus which was marked by a spirit of unusual fraternity and good fellowship. In fact, the diffusion of brotherly love was so copious that it rather slopped over. But be that as it may, the case was not so bad as some manifestations of a similar kind which occurred in former times. John W. Forney relates a fine anecdote of Stephen A. Douglas and Beverly Tucker. One day Douglas sat down on Tucker's knee, threw his arm about his neck, and said, "Bev, I love you." Tucker replied: "Douglas, when you get to be president I don't want any office, but I will have my ample reward if, in that great day, you will sit on my knee, hug me, and say, 'Bev, I love you.'" Tucker expressed the universal yearning of the human heart to be loved.

Julius Sterling Morton, of Nebraska, secretary of agriculture in President Cleveland's last cabinet, was the father of Paul Morton, secretary of the navy in President Roosevelt's cabinet. **Brahmin Water Clocks.**

The Brahmins' clocks divide the day into sixty hours of twenty-four minutes each, called ghurees. Commonly a copper bowl with a very small hole in the bottom of it is placed on the surface of the water and gradually filled. If the hole in the bottom is correctly sized the bowl sinks in twenty-four minutes. This registers the duration of the ghuree. An attendant thereupon empties the basin and strikes the hour of the day or night on the gong.
