From the center of the city the flood rushed to both sides of the town and the people ran out to flee to the mountains, many being caught and swept away. At the time when the storm seemed likely to abate and before its greatest intensity was felt, there was a great crowd of merrymakers in the plaza. The gamblers had scarcely had time to set up their tables and place their money thereon when the flood rushed down from the hills, sweeping away booths, money and tables.

### "Locomotive" Carr Dead.

San Antonio, Tex., July 6. James C. (Locomotive) Carr died yesterday afternoon at 4:05 o'clock at 300 South Flores street, his death culminating an illness of more than 6 months.

For the past 2 months he had been confined to his bed, his lower limbs being paralyzed, but for a greater period he has been in ill health. He was a sufferer from rheumatism and it was this disease which superinduced the paralysis. The end was not unexpected for days. Col. Carr bore his suffer ings with that fortitude which stamped his character, and which had been sorely tried in the early days. He passed quietly to the other world. If he suffered any pain whatever there was not the slightest sign of it. The longcontinued illness had weakened him and death came over him as a deep sleep over one who is weary and worn.

In the death of Col. Carr San Autonio loses one of its most unique characters as well as a valuable citizen; and another Texan of the early days is recordered among the dead. Connected with Col. Carr's career are many stirring events of frontier life. He belonged to that school of sturdy and ventursome spirits wno left the older States to seek their fortune in the great West.

## The Mountain Sun. COWMEN ARE LOOKING FOR NEW PASTURES.

Indian Territory Proposition Is no Longer Good.

San Antonio, Texas, July 6 .-The cattle business of the Indian Territory is all over now. Allot ment of lands and the man with the hoe has changed conditions there to such an extent that cattlemen are seeking outlets to other pastures. Even the Osage country the last pasture land in the Indian ious. It is to be hoped that his Territory, is entertaining what is probably its last consignment of cattle for pasturage. The reservation is being gradually allotted, and pending the final allotment the Department of the Interior is accomplishing what is known as "cleaning up." The herds that are now in the Osage pastures are being inspected by Federal quarantine officials, and those that are found to be in any manner affected or infested with ticks are being forced out of the reservation, whether they are ready for the market or not. It is thought that it will require four years to rid the Osage Reservation of ticks and fit it for a permanent position above

the quarantine line. C. M. Click, of Broken Arrow, I T., is in the city on a deal for a large pasture in Webb county. Mr. Click yesterday stated that he has been very successful in the cattle business in the Indian country for the past few years, since he went there from Texas, but that the end has come to opportunity for cowmen in that country and he is coming back to Texas.

"That country is settling up rapidly," said he, "and the pastures have been plowed under and corn and cotton is growing where steers used to find fat feeding. I do not believe that another year will find one-half as may cattle on the Territory pastures as this year has seen there. The cattlemen are getting out of the Territory and the leased postures are being abolished so that there will not be much of a movement to that section from Texas another year."

Mr. Click has planned to purchase a ranch of 80 sections of land west of Encinal.

The Tarahumare people, who live in the most inaccessible part of Northern Mexico, are ignorant and primitive, many still living in caves. Their only food is "pinoll," or maize, parched and ground. They have a peculiar drink called "teshun," also produced from maize and manufacared with considerable ceremony which tastes like a mixture of sour milk and turpentine. Their language is limited to about 300 words. Their imperfect knowledge of numbers renders them unable to count beyond ten.
