IS NOW A CLOSED INCIDENT

Negro Who Attempted a Criminal Assault on a Young White Girl Burned at the Stake.

Sulphur Springs, Tex., Aug. 11.—Tom Williams, a mulatto, about 6 o'clock this morning made a criminal attempt on a young white girl in a pasture near this town. Three hours later he was a blazing mass in the public square at Sulphur Springs. The whole proceeding was as orderly as such proceedings ever are. There was no excitement, no fuss, no feathers, just a plain, business like lynching in which several hundred people participated. They had evidently made up their minds what they had intended doing, and they did it. In less than five hours after the assault, the tragedy and the end, the town had returned to its accustomed vocation and the incident was closed.

On a farm about two miles southwest of town Mary Childs lives with her mother and sister. About 6 o'clock this morning she started, as was her wont, to the pasture to drive up the cows to the milking pen. She had found the cows and was returning with them, when Tom Williams caught up with her. He took hold of the girl and said something to her that indicated his purpose. The girl in a moment realized her predicament and told the negro that he had better release her, as her sisters were nearby and would hear him. This evidently frightened the negro, and the girl, seeing that he hesitated, set up a scream and he loosened his hold on her and ran off as fast as he could. The girl went on her way and told what had happened. Neighbors were notified, and word of the outrage was brought to Sulphur Springs. Officers and a posse at once started after the negro and he was soon caught on the Katy railway track, about one and one half miles east of town. He was taken at once to the scene of attempted assault and was fully identified by his intended victim, who told in detail of her experience with him.

They started with the negro to Sulphur Springs. In the meantime news of the outrage had flown far and wide over the county and men for miles around had gathered to help hunt down the negro. They saw the sheriff and his posse coming with their prisoner and their plans were formed. A leader was selected and the sheriff was told that they intended to take the negro.

The sheriff pleaded with the mob to let the law take its course and made a show of resistance

when argument failed. He threatened to shoot and his deputies threatened to shoot also, but by this time the mob was in no frame of mind to be deterred by threats or even an active fusillade from the three or four men who had the prisoner in charge, and before they fairly had time to realize what had happened the negro had been taken from his captors and was being hurried toward the public square, followed by from 500 to 600 men, who had hastily gathered from all directions. As the mob proceeded toward the square it was augmented at every turn.

It seemed that every one knew what was about to happen. Those who were not attracted by such scenes got into their houses and women and children disappeared from the streets as if by magic. There was no hurrah nor any shooting off of fire arms; no shouting as the cavalcade moved from the center of the town. In the public square there is a band stand where free concerts are given by the town band. At one corner of this stand is a telephone pole. It was to this pole that Williams was hanged.

As soon as the mob arrived at the square the tools of its trade were provided. No one seemed to know where they came from nor how they were gotten, nor who got them. In fact, the method of death had not been seemingly discussed. But there was a rope and oil. The rope was to have been expected, under the circumstances—but the oil. That meant there was to be no mercy, no palliation, no consideration for the negro who was to be killed.

He was not only to be killed, but if torturing one friend could be made a warning to his soul then they were to be warned. And they were warned. How these things are done is even beyond understanding. But it was without hitch or loss of time that the negro was pinioned and the rope adjusted about his neck. There was no mistaking the purpose of the mob in this and the victim realized that he had reached his end. There was no lack of hands to swing firmly on the rope and the weight of the negro was quickly counterbalanced by the strong pull that lifted him about six feet from the ground.

Why those who pulled on the rope stopped when they had raised the negro only six feet was soon apparent. There was to be something more than hanging for this negro. He realized it about as soon as those who were about to torture him realized it. But he understood also that pleas for mercy would fall on deaf ears. Where the oil came from is not known. But it was there, ready at hand for the gruesome work. There were those there ready to pour it over the swaying, swinging body of the victim on whom the mob was about to express itself. Climbing onto the band stand, the man who poured the oil occupied a perch which enabled him to make a good job of it.

From his head to his heels the negro was saturated with oil. In little streams it dripped and trickled from his clothing and swinging as he was. He spewed and sputtered as the stuff got into his mouth, his eyes, his nostrils. As the can was moved away from the head a match went quickly to the feet and a blaze shot high in the air. The writhing negro, tortur-

ing slowly to death and swinging and swaying from his scaffold, was the warning the mob had started out to give his kind, that the crime for which he was accused would be met with the most awful punishment mortal minds could devise.

The mob stood by as the flames did their work. There always those in a mob who do things, and they were not missing out of this mob. The fire was kept going. But it soon burned itself out and the body was cut down. Then more oil was poured on it, and started afresh again. More and more oil was poured on it until the body was almost entirely in cinders. Then the mob left and in half an hour no signs remained of the gruesome tragedy that had been enacted, nor of the victim, whose death had been compassed so quickly after his crime.

Negro Was Beaten.

Sulphur Springs, Tex., Aug. 11.—To day about noon it was learned that a negro named Jim Cherry who runs a little farm and hauls water about town, commenting upon the circumstances of this morning's lynching, has made remarks reflecting upon the young lady. It was not long until a citizen's committee of about seventy-five waited upon Cherry and administered a sound thrashing with baseball bats and buggy whips. He was severely bruised, but was not seriously injured. The committee gave Cherry until 5 o'clock to leave town. He left at 2:30.

Jumped From Train.

Temple, Texas, August 11.—A young man named Amos Pilgrim, who lives several miles north of Temple, is in a very precarious condition as a result of an accident which occurred while getting off a moving M. K. & T. passenger train several nights since. The road passes his farm and in returning from Waco he undertook to alight near his home while the train was going at full speed, hoping to save a long walk home after reaching Temple. He struck the ground on his head and shoulders, rendering him unconscious, and he has been in a stupor ever since, with his condition growing so worse that it is feared his injuries will result fatally.

Ratliffe Murdered.

Velasco, Texas, Aug. 13.—The body of R. B. Ratliffe was brought in from Oyster Creek last night after an inquest had been held by Justice of the Peace Hoefel. The justice has not rendered his verdict, but the result of the investigation tends to show that he was murdered. A trial of the gun proved that he must have been shot at a distance of not less than twelve feet for any distance less than that would have shown powder burns. Deceased was shot twice, one shot going through the right jaw and coming out at the left eye and the other grazing his face.

Suicide has been suggested, but the absence of powder burns precludes such a possibility. Mr. Ratliffe sold some cattle the other day and was supposed to have a little money. Therefore robbery is suspected.

Deceased was about 60 years old and a large strong man, and had not an enemy. He was very quiet peaceable citizen and was well liked.

Attempted Assault Foiled.

Sherman, Texas, August 12.—Considerable excitement was occasioned among the campers at the Old Settlers' Park last night by an attempted assault on the person of a little girl about 12 years of age. According to the report of the officers, the little girl with some other children was sleeping under a wagon. Soon after 10 o'clock and while a number of people yet remained on the picnic grounds, she was aroused found herself in the clutches of a white man. She at once began screaming, and the brute crawled out from under the wagon and ran toward the railroad track, closely pursued by Josh McCollum of Bells, who was camping near the scene of the assault. In his hasty flight the man ran into a wire fence, but soon crawled through and made good his escape. At the fence the pursuers found a cheap woollen white hat and a strip of white cloth bearing the mark of "Bray Brothers, Henderson, Honey Grove, Clarksville and McKinney, Texas." It has been learned that a supply of these hats has been sold by several stores of Bray Brothers, who have a house in Sherman.

Bones of Americans to be Sold for Rent

Guadalajara, Mex., Aug. 14.—The bones of three Americans, two men and one boy, will be taken from graves in the Municipal Cemetery here and sold to bone buyers unless the taxes are paid on the graves within the next thirty days. The annual list of graves on which taxes are due has been published by the city authorities, and among the names are those of Louis Norwald, W. A. McConnel and Douglas Kibrell, Americans who died here several years ago. Kibrell was a boy. The periods for which payment was made for the graves in accordance with the Mexican custom, have expired and unless the leases are renewed, the graves will be emptied. Nothing is known concerning the whereabouts of relatives of any of the three Americans.

The remains of Thomas Walsh, an Irish-American, who died in this city a few years ago, have been given a perpetual right to the grave they occupy in the Municipal Cemetery by an act of the State Legislature. Walsh died without having drawn up a will in accordance with Mexican laws, and ranch land that he owned in this State was confiscated by the State Government. In view of this fact, the action was taken by the Legislature.

Lightfooted Swede.

Chappell Hill, Tex., Aug. 14.—Yesterday a Swede from near Elgin was here trying to get negroes to go with him to his country to pick cotton. He had succeeded in getting several to consent when a decided commotion was raised against him by the cotton growers around here. Things grew so hot against him that he lit out on foot for Brenham and walked the whole way in the terrible heat. However, it is said that several of his negroes followed him on foot, and went away with him. We shall soon need around here all the good cotton-pickers we can get, and it is desirable that cotton growers from a distance come not here to torage on our domain. They had better shinny on their own side.

Miscegenation Alleged.

Houston, Tex., Aug. 14.—Geo. Baxter, a negro, and a white woman, claiming to be his wife, were bound over in the court of Justice of the Peace McDonald today on the charge of miscegenation, the bonds being placed at \$250 each. They were arrested Sunday night by the police officers, it requiring a chase to capture the man. He had gone through a window, leaving his shoes and hat when the officers appeared on the scene. The woman stood her ground and after being taken to the police station she made the claim that she had been married to the negro for several years, giving the name of a clergyman in New York, as well as the location of the church in which the ceremony was performed.

After the negro had been arrested he stoutly denied that he and the white woman had ever been married. He seemed to fear that bodily harm would be visited upon him and told the officers what to do with his body in the event that life was extinguished from it.

Upon being taken before Justice McDonald this morning after preliminary hearing the man still maintained that he and the woman were not married, while she told the same story on the stand that she told the officers the night before when arrested. The man secured bail, but the woman was sent to jail in default. The law in such cases is plain, being as follows:

"If any white person and negro shall knowingly intermarry with each other within this State or having so intermarried in or out of the State, shall continue to live together as man and wife within this State, they shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary for a term of not less than two years nor more than five years."

Confessed to Murder.

Detroit, Mich., August 10.—Harry Johnson, who says his home is at Sherman, Texas, early this morning made a confession to Chief of Detectives McDonnell in which he said Harry Parker, who was arrested with Johnson last week in Cleveland, murdered Paynbroker Joseph Mercer here on July 28 while Johnson rifled the display windows of diamonds and jewelry.

Parker's name, Johnson said, was assumed, but his own name was correct as registered by the police.

Fasted Forty-Three Days.

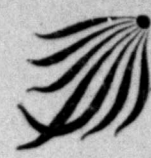
Alamogordo, N. M., Aug. 14.—Elder Herbert S. Rippen fasted forty-three days. During the fast he drank plenty of water and took outdoor exercise. He fasted for beneficial reasons and upon scientific principles, claiming to purify his system and ward off disease. At all times a vegetarian, his first meal after the fast was a hot lemonade, butter six days old, squash, tomatoes and rye bread. His weight when he began the fast was 157 pounds, and when the fast was completed 118 pounds. Otherwise he seems in perfect condition.

Masked Man Robbed a Comfort Saloon.

Comfort, Tex., Aug. 15.—Last night at about 9 o'clock the saloon of Pankratz & Steves was entered by a masked robber armed with a sixshooter who commanded Henry Steves, who was on duty behind the bar, to throw up his hands. Mr. Steves being taken wholly unaware, had no alternative but to comply, and the masked man then broke open the till, extracted its contents, amounting to about \$20, and after helping himself to a couple of bottles of beer, he marched Mr. Steves out of the place ahead of him, and forced him to walk several hundred yards up the railroad track beside him before allowing him to return to the rifled saloon.

As soon as the alarm was spread horsemen galloped out on the different roads leading from Comfort and telephone messages were sent in every direction with a view to intercepting the robber.

No trace of him was found last night, but this morning sufficient evidence was found against a negro, Lonnie Russell, to warrant Constable Surber and Deputy Sheriff Darnall in placing him under arrest, and he was turned over to Sheriff Zoeller, who took him to Boerne. The evidence against Russell is said to be very slight.

The people of Comfort are greatly stirred up over the boldness of the robbery, occurring as it did in a well lighted portion of the town, and in full view of another saloon across the street, which was filled with men at the time the hold-up was taking place.—S. A. Gazette.

Prof. J. A. Buchanan lectured Monday night on the "Ethics of Socialism," basing true socialism on the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. His principals are fine in theory, and a local club was organized.

About seventy Leaguers went from here Saturday to Corpus, and the majority of them have returned.

Everybody in this valley remembers Prof. A. Logan, who was for nine years president of our school. A man so prompt that the tap of his bell regulated the watches and clocks in Center Point. He is now a prosperous lawyer in Denton, Tex., one of the leading cities of the State. Many nice things are being said of him there by the local press, as well as the State papers. The latest is an address by him before the reunion of the old settlers of Denton county, with the subject, "Texas from 1850 to 1865."

Mr. Logan said in part:
The first settlers of any new country are men above the ordinary in bravery, manly virtues and intelligence. That being true much was expected of the early Texans. But the first settlers not only came up to expectations but went far beyond them. He also called attention to the question of

the Western boundary of the State and explained how it was settled. Senator Benton's bill introduced in the United State Senate in 1850 was discussed at some length. Mr. Logan called attention to the liberality of Texas in the early days to railroad building. He also spoke of the nobility of character of the early Texans in providing for the afflicted by giving large bodies of land for the erection of suitable asylums for the blind, the deaf and dumb and the insane, the asylums being built before the civil war.

The fickleness of public opinion was dwelt upon, in the change of mind of the people under the administrations of Governor Pease and Runnels. Mr. Logan paid a high tribute to the character and life work of John H. Reagan. He spoke at some length of the service of Texans in the different battles of the civil war; mentioning specially in this connection the name of that illustrious Texan, Albert Sidney Johnston. He showed that the greatness of Texas today is due largely to the broad views of the early settlers and that the rising generation should be taught to revere the memory of the heroes of the early days.

In closing his address Mr. Logan called attention to the magnificent public institutions of the State, showing that in many respects Texas leads any other state in the Union.—Ex.

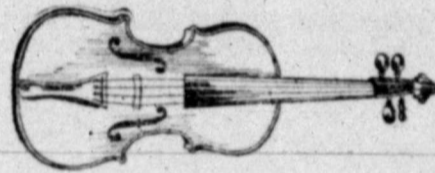

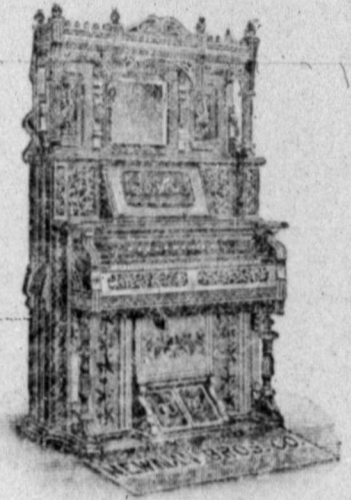
