MONK GIBSON CAUGHT

The Murderer of the Conditt Family Captured in a Barn Two Miles From Heart of Edna.

Edna, Texas, Oct. 9.—Monk Gibson is now in the Jackson County jail with a double picket line, one around the jail itself, and the other line outside of this, extending around the entire jail yard. As a further precaution for his safety the jail has been filled with soldiers and rangers who will remain on guard until there has been some further change in the situation.

The negro was recaptured and lodged in jail about 8:30 this morning. His captor was a negro named Warren Powell, who was passing George Gayle's hay barn two miles southwest of Edna about 7 o'clock this morning on his way to Mr. Gayle's rice farm to work. He was accompanied by his son.

As they were passing the barn, the negro, Monk Gibson, thrust his head through a window of small opening in the barn and hailed Powell. He saw who it was and hurriedly sent his son to the home of John Gibson, about one hundred and fifty yards distant to notify the latter. Mr. Gibson immediately got on his horse and hurried to town to inform Sheriff Egg.

In the meantime J. A. Jones, an employe of Mr. Gibson, secured a shot gun and joined Warren Powell, who by this time had persuaded the negro to come out of the barn and join him. He accomplished this by assuring Monk that the people had decided that he was not the murderer of the Conditt family and had given up the search for him. As soon as the negro came into his presence, Powell grabbed him by the wrist and held him while the white man, Jones, stood guard over him with a shot gun.

As soon as John Gibson reached town he notified Sheriff Egg. The latter immediately dispatched Deputy Sheriff Jim Powers to the scene in his buggy and with Jailer Asbeck and two or three other deputies soon followed. Deputy Powers was the first offi-

cer to arrive on the scene and found Jones and Powell in charge of the negro as indicated above.

He made the negro lie down and securing a rope bound his ankles and his wrists. He then placed him in his buggy and being joined by Sheriff Egg and his other deputies by this time, the crowd started in a run to town. They had not proceeded far before they met General Hulen, Captains McDonald and Hughes and five other Rangers, making an escort altogether of about fifteen men. The crowd with the prisoner then rode into town in a hallop arriving at the door of the jail just as morning guard mount had been completed.

The prisoner was rushed quickly into the jail, and the guard was distributed in a manner to afford proper protection. The whole thing was done so quickly that scarcely any of the citizens knew of the capture before the negro was safely under the protection of the military.

Many citizens who saw the officers hurrying to the jail suspected the cause of the unusual hurry, and themselves rushed in the direction of the jail. Before they could enter the jail yard they were turned back by the Rangers on horseback. The news soon spread over town, and of course, caused great excitement, but no unlawful demonstrations.

When first captured and after being locked up in jail Monk Gibson made the statement, and still adheres to it, that he secreted himself in the barn on the night of his escape from the officers and had remained there ever since, living wholly on hard ear corn, a quantity of which he found in the barn. Near the barn was a windmill which he said he visited occasionally at night for water. His first statement made to Deputy Powers was that when his horse ran into the second wire fence on the night of his escape he was thrown off, when the Lord picked him up and set him down in the barn where he was found.

Later, upon being reproached for lying, he modified his statement by saying that as soon as he fell from his horse he jumped up and ran as fast as he could, reaching the barn some time during the night. He immediately

secreted himself under the hay and cats and had remained there ever since. When arrested his pockets were full of corn and he was greatly emaciated.

Up to a late hour the negro made no confession. He persists in his original statement that he saw the negroes several times in Edna, but did not know their names. He has never mentioned any white man as being connected with the crime and strenuously denies that he had anything whatever to do with it. Every argument possible was used to induce a confession. He was shown the strong guard of soldiers thrown around the jail and assured that the troops on the scene were amply able to protect him. The large reward was then held out to him as an inducement to give the names of those who committed the crime. He replied that he would like to have the money, but could not give the names. Later in the day food was given him, which he ate greedily, but when offered coffee he refused it.

The barn where the negro was captured is about 150 yards from the home of John Gibson, the white man who came to town and notified the sheriff of the capture.

Mr. Gibson is one of the parties whom the negro notified of the trouble at the Conditt home at the time the murders were committed and was the first one to bring the news to town. Mr. Gayle's residence is somewhat farther off than Gibson's. The barn is in a big pasture only a short distance from where the murders were committed, and it is some distance to the timber in any direction. The barn was used for the storage of feed to be used in the winter, which accounts for the fact that the negro was not sooner discovered.

The crime for which Monk Gibson is accused was the murder of the Conditt family about twelve days ago. While the husband and father was engaged at work at a neighbor's some distance off, this negro who was plowing in the Conditt field, went to the house and murdered Mrs. Conditt, her daughter, aged 13, and three smaller boys. The negro was arrested and placed in jail, and in order to escape a mob, it was decided to move him. He was placed on a horse, and two deputies accompanied him. It was dark and the negro outran the deputies and made his escape.

Suicided With Rat Biscuit.

Corpus Christi, Tex., Oct. 9.—Nick Grevelis, a Greek, commonly known as "Big Nick," aged 76 years, and who for fifteen of the thirty years spent here, was a clerk for the late Nie Constantine in his hotel, committed suicide yesterday. Last Sunday, it is said, he tried to purchase some morphine at one of the drug stores, but this could not be had. So he decided to try another ruse and went to another drug store and stated that he was molested with lots of rats at his place and wanted to get rid of them. He first was offered rough-on-rats, then roach paste, but finally decided to take rat biscuit. He took the rat biscuit about 2 o'clock Sunday morning and died about 2:30 Sunday afternoon during which time he was conscious saying he was tired of living. It is said he attempted to take his life a week or so ago by stabbing himself in the groin.

geant of troop K, King was thrown into the guard house at the Post, whence he was rescued by Deputy Sheriff Nipper only after several hours' imprisonment. Nipper took him to the court house where he remained until after five o'clock. At the end of the day King said he was weary of well doing. Half a day's imprisonment, a lively appreciation of the terrors of martial law, and \$2.50 cash were the net proceeds of a day which he started with an act of kindness done with the best intentions.

Troop K, of the First Cavalry still has memories of the Philippines, and its quarter master sergeant has been in the army twenty-two years. He could not forget this fact in telling Sheriff Tobin the story of the horse Tuesday afternoon.

"I put him in the guard house," said the sergeant, with emphasis on the first pronoun. "My troop's been in the Philippines. I received those horses from the Twelfth Cavalry three years ago. I'm only a poor sergeant, but I've been in the army twenty-two years, and I know something about horses, and that horse wouldn't have gone off and left the troop horses."

This was delivered like the action of a rapid fire gun, and each sentence was punctuated by the negro with a "Yas sah."

"I don't doubt that, mistah," he said, keeping his eye on the trooper, who was striding around the room, "but I foun' the hoss with my hosses. He was a right pearty lookin' hoss, and I feed him at my own expense till I could come to town and brought him. I knows Sheriff Tobin wants all the staa'y hosses. And 'fore Gawd I wisht I'd let 'im alone."

"I ain't the man to get another man into trouble," resumed the soldier. "But if any soldier took that horse out and hocked 'im for two cans o' beer, I want to know who that soldier is."

"What makes you think it was a soldier?" asked the sheriff.

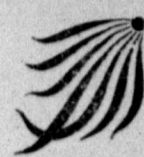
"What makes me think it? I'm a soldier myself and I know 'em."

King is a respectable negro and has a good reputation in the community in which he lives. He told Sheriff Tobin that all he wanted was to be reimbursed for feeding the horse and bringing it to the city.

The soldier said that the horse belonged to his wife. As he refused to pay the negro anything, Sheriff Tobin gave the man \$2.50. "I pay this myself," he told the negro, "because some day you may get another horse that we will want. I am sorry you took the trouble to bring this man's horse in."

R. G. Warner Has Disappeared.

Alamo to Be Museum and Library.

It is the intention of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas to make the Alamo a storehouse of information about Texas. It is also to be the center of relics and a museum of mementoes of the Republic and of Texas and of the territory that was embraced in Texas before the days of the Republic.

To this end Miss Adina De Zavala, president of the Daughters, has been collecting books and papers and relics for a number of years. When the Daughters take formal possession of the Alamo it is the intention of Miss De Zavala to install a library of books about Texas—every one that can be procured—and of books by Texas authors. It is her desire to make the Alamo the most complete and accessible library on Texas in the State or Nation.

In addition to the books to be placed in the Alamo it is the intention of the Daughters to place in the Alamo all the curios and relics that can be obtained bearing upon the early history of Texas. To this end Miss De Zavala has requested that persons having books, letters, relics or pamphlets which they are willing to donate to the Daughters for archives of the Alamo communicate with her. She has a fine collection already at her home, 117 Fourth street, in this city.

The date when the Daughters will take over custody of the Alamo has not been set. The matter will probably come up before the next meeting of the Chapter.

The material particularly desired by Miss De Zavala is that pertaining to Texas in the period prior to 1845.—San Antonio Express.

Fragments of Knowledge.

Historical—The telescope was invented in 1590, 98 years after Columbus sailed on his first voyage of discovery.

Envelopes were first used in 1839.

Decisive battles of antiquity—The battle of Marathon, B. C. 490, between the Greeks and Persians. The Greeks were victorious and the extension of the Persian rule westward was stopped; the battle of Syracuse, B. C. 413, in which the Greeks were defeated and the Italian peninsula was preserved for Roman development; the battle of Arabella, in which Alexander the Great defeated the Persians and opened the way for the empire of "the brazen-coated Greeks."

Scientific—A healthy adult breathes from 14 to 18 pints of air in a minute; in a day about 686,000 cubic inches.

Breathing produces marked changes in the lungs. Oxygen is diminished one-fourth; carbonic acid gas is increased one hundred times; watery vapor, ammonia and organic matter are also increased.

An adult requires 1,000 feet of air, say a room 10 feet square and 10 feet high. The quantity of carbonic acid gas in the air we breathe should not exceed one-sixth of one per cent of it. To keep this poison down to this point the air in close rooms should be changed three times an hour.

It is interesting to notice the freezing points of different liquids. Turpentine freezes at 15 degrees above zero, strong wine at 20, milk at 29 and water at 32.

Nothing in nature is more wonderful than the complicated network of nerves in our bodies; nor do we know of anything in the physical world which more strongly emphasizes the wisdom and skill of our creator. Each nerve is a telegraphic cord in itself which communicates with the brain. From this headquarters messages are sent to all parts of the body.
