Baby on 7,000-Mile Trip.

New York, Nov. 13.—Freda Petroskie, 5 years old, left Ellis Island alone today to complete the 7,000-mile journey from Warsaw, Russian Poland, to Bismark, N. D. She is the smallest and youngest immigrant ever making such a long trip alone.

Freda's father and mother departed from Warsaw 2 years ago and started a farm in North Dakota. They left the child with her grandmother in Poland.

The girl has a red tag on her left arm, giving directions in Polish, German and English, as to her destination. Attached to this is a little leather pocket, containing pursers' and train conductors' receipts for her passage tickets.

Freda came on the Moltke of the Hamburg-American line, and a steward saw that she was properly placed in the care of Miss Fitzgerald, a matron at Ellis Island. The child is too young to dress herself, and this task was performed for her each day on the Moltke by the stewardess.

A passenger agent for the Ontario and Western, on which road Freda began her journey to the far West, said that instructions would be passed from conductor to conductor and from road to road, which would be certain to give the child traveler every comfort and complete safety.

Suicide at Fort Worth

Fort Worth, Tex., Nov. 13.—With the aid of a pair of paperhanger's scissors, a flue and a rope, a man known in Fort Worth as John Martin, a carpenter, hanged himself this morning about 9:00 a. m. at the Colonial Inn. He left a note reading as follows:

"My name is not John Martin, but it will do you no good to know what it is. Give my things to Dad, and think as well of me as you can."

Dad was a fellow workman. Justice Rowland's inquest papers show that Martin ate his breakfast this morning and sat around several minutes before going back to his room. He smoked a cigar and talked with his friends, seeming to be in a happy mood.

After going back to his room he took a pair of scissors and placed them in a flue, tying a rope to the scissors. He stood on a window sill, tied a regular hanging knot in the other end of the rope, which he placed around his neck, and then jumped off.

Martin had been rooming at the Colonial Inn for about 3 months. Further than that nothing is known of him. It is said that he often told those around the hotel that he at one time had \$130,000, but lost it all.

Band of Texas Cowboys.

New York, Nov. 7.—If Argentine vaqueros do not learn more about roping and tying cattle in the next few months than they ever knew before it will not be the fault of Spence Jewell and his band of Texas cowboys, who sailed for Buenos Ayres yesterday under contract to Hill & Connell, old Texans themselves, and now the owners of a ranch in the South American Republic. There is not a man in Jewell's band of cowboys who is not a celebrity.

Clay McGonnigle, the acknowledged leader, for a long time held the title of champion, having roped thrown and tied a steer in 23 seconds in one of the contests for which the cattle country is famous. The others in the party are Len and Ira Driver, Joe Garner, "Wild Horse" Bill, Joe Hooker and Will Pickett.

The cow men, wearing sombreros with crowns a foot high and brims three feet across, attracted much attention in Broadway. Not one of them has ever been in New York before, and they enjoyed themselves hugely.

Mr. Jewell, who was on the Hill & Connell ranch in Argentine last August, came back to America especially to recruit his squad of cowpunchers.

"It is a business proposition," he explained. "The vaqueros know all about lassoing cattle, but they use ropes from sixty to a hundred feet long and do not know anything about throwing and tying cattle. It costs a lot of time the way they do things."

"Bill Connell has been training twenty cow ponies for the boys, and they will teach the natives what's what with a rope."

She Got Off the Car.

San Antonio, Tex., Nov. 15.—Yesterday afternoon a woman on a Government Hill car had more trouble in five minutes than usually afflicts the average human in a lifetime. She was a stranger in the city and was not accomplished in the art of making the necessary sign to induce the motorman to stop the car. She noticed the conductor always pulled the cord twice and did likewise when she wished to get off. The car did not stop.

The conductor rang the bell once when the car approached the next corner. She thought he had made a mistake and pulled the cord twice. Again she was disappointed. When the performance had taken place about three times she went on the front platform and said some things to the motorman that frightened him so badly he forgot to stop the car at the next corner, but would not risk his life any longer and stopped in the middle of the block.

Suicide in Pawnshop.

Austin, Tex., Nov. 13.—Fred Blittersdorf, a young married man of Austin, committed suicide this afternoon in the pawnbroker's shop of Hessey & Co., by blowing out his brains with a bullet from a revolver. He left a note addressed to his sister asking her to take care of the baby. He selected a revolver at Hessey & Co.'s store and said that he desired to purchase the weapon. While the back of the clerk was turned Blittersdorf placed the revolver to his head and pulled the trigger. He died almost instantly. He was a paperhanger by trade. He leaves a widow and a 2-year-old child.

Broken-Hearted Man Ends His Life.

San Antonio, Tex., Nov. 14.—This morning shortly after 1 a. m. Willie Schimmelpfenning took his life while standing exactly where Annie Murphy ended her life about 6 weeks ago. Broken-hearted over the loss of his friend Annie, is attributed as the cause of his suicide.

The tragedy occurred at his home, 315 North San Saba street. At home with him were J. P. Piggott and Dick Kuhlman, but neither saw the rash act committed. Schimmelpfenning came home from work and was apparently in the best of spirits. Just previous to killing himself the young man had been discussing the political situation with the other two young men. The two latter had left the room and were busily engaged in other parts of the house, when a pistol shot in the room occupied by Schimmelpfenning startled them.

Rushing into the room they found the young man staggering about the room, but fell in a few moments later. A bullet hole was found in his head and a 38-caliber pistol was found lying beside him. He had pressed the revolver to the right side of his head, just above the ear and pulled the trigger. The bullet passed entirely through the head, coming out on the left side from which the brain oozed.

Police headquarters was notified and soon the officers and the corner were on the scene. He was an electrician in the employ of the Dubinski electrical works, and was about 25 years old. He was a native of New Braunfels, but had made San Antonio his home for many years. He was known and liked for his jovial disposition.

Negro Suicide.

Houston, Tex., Nov. 13.—Terry Rogers, a negro, is said to have committed suicide this morning at 6 a. m. at the Texas-Kentucky saloon, corner of Travis street and Franklin avenue. At the time he was fleeing from officers bent upon his arrest. Rogers was alleged to have attempted the life of a woman with whom he lived.

Various charges have been registered against the negro in the past. He was recently fined for assault upon his wife, but had been released upon an appeal bond. Since that time trouble had been brewing.

Rogers and his wife had been walking on Washington street. He desired to go in one direction and she in another, and a fight followed. At that time Rogers was taken in custody. He was tried and found guilty, but released pending appeal.

On several occasions since he is alleged to have visited his wife's house on Heiner street and last night at 2 a. m. he was driven from the locality. At 5 a. m. he encountered her again. At that time he is alleged to have fired upon her five times. None of the bullets took effect, and Rogers fled with one charge still in his gun.

Walking into the rear of the saloon at the corner of the two streets, he took off his coat and vest and produced a revolver. Leveling it at his head, he is said to have fired.

He fell without a word and died almost instantly. The body was taken in charge by an undertaker. Justice Matthews conducted the inquest.

Cruel Act of Crazy Woman.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 14.—Becoming suddenly insane, Mrs. Ben Giest, living at 113 Wells street, today hurled her 5-year-old son out of a third-story window and then attempted to kill herself with a revolver. The screams of Mrs. Giest alarmed the landlady, who ran into Mrs. Giest's apartments to see what was the matter. Mrs. Giest was running around the room flourishing a revolver, while the little boy was begging her not to kill herself. Mrs. Giest had lighted every gas jet in the place and demanded that Mrs. Barton bring her more lamps.

Mrs. Barton declared that she didn't have any more and Mrs. Giest attempted to shoot her. Mrs. Barton, closely pursued, fled to the sidewalk and made her escape.

Mrs. Giest then rushed back to the rooms and picking up the little boy, tossed him out of the window. The boy, as he fell, narrowly missed a young lady employed in a department store on the first floor, and crashed into a basket of crockery which had been left on the pavement. The child was taken to the County hospital, where it was declared that he would die.

Slept 100 Hours; Still Sleeping.

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 11.—George Kaiser, a restaurant manager at the State Fair Grounds, who was found asleep at the Fair Grounds by the police Wednesday night and taken to the city hospital, has not yet been aroused from his stupor. Drs. Smith, Hannah and Smart are attending him and using every available method to disturb his long slumber. Dr. Smith of the hospital staff this afternoon stated that it was one of the most peculiar cases, and that they were still in doubt as to the nature of the disease. He said the symptoms are something like those of apoplexy. The man has now been sleeping for more than 100 hours.

Adee's Long Bicycle Ride.

Second Assistant Secretary Adee has sailed for Havre. He will make that the point of departure on a bicycle trip of about 1,500 miles through Central and Southern France, being accompanied part of the way by Alexander Thackara, consul at Rouen. He expects to return to Washington early in July.

Fair Attractions.

Of all the spectacles arranged for the entertainment of the visitors to the San Antonio International Fair, none has aroused more interest in the public mind than the collision between the two big passenger locomotives, each weighing in the neighborhood of eighty tons. These engines have been secured from the Rock Island road and it is calculated would have seen at least 6 or 7 years more of active service. This spectacle is going to cost the San Antonio Fair Association about \$10,000 for about one minute's entertainment on the afternoon of November 26.

As both engines will run light without cars behind them, all danger of explosion is avoided, though scrap iron is to be made of both locomotives.

There is, however, but one of the numerous great features at the Fair. Some of the others are the California air slip which has created much excitement in the vicinity, the Washington, D. C. Fair will pay \$100,000 for the sum of \$100,000. Professor Myers for his brilliant work. Some prominent citizens of the State will be asked to accompany Prof. Myers on his

flight each day. Others who would soar into the heavens may do so in the other aerial attraction, the captive balloon. Aside from these features there are a score of other free attractions to be seen by the Fair visitors each day.

On the Midway or Pike the fun will be fast at all times, for two score attractions, including the great Gaskill attractions, are to claim the attention of the public. People on the Fair grounds have the opportunity of doing all sorts of stunts from riding elephants and camels on sight-seeing tours, taking a meal in the lion's den or attending the Igorrote dog feast. No other Southern Fair has ever had so great an amount of entertainment. Nightly, there will be the magnificent war spectacle 'Siege of Port Arthur.'

But little need be said of the exhibits, for there is a greater expense of them than seen heretofore and practically every industry in the South will have some representation. Mexico's exhibit, the greatest ever sent to a Fair south of St. Louis, will naturally attract a great deal of attention by reason of its value and magnificence. Twice daily, the most famous military band of the Mexican republic

will give concerts.

The stock show will be the greatest ever held in the Southwest, the entire Northwestern, Western and Southwestern States being represented.

On all roads there will be excursions from Central, East and North Texas, in fact the railroads have broken records in the matter of offering low round trip rates to the San Antonio Fair from Nov. 18 to Nov. 30.

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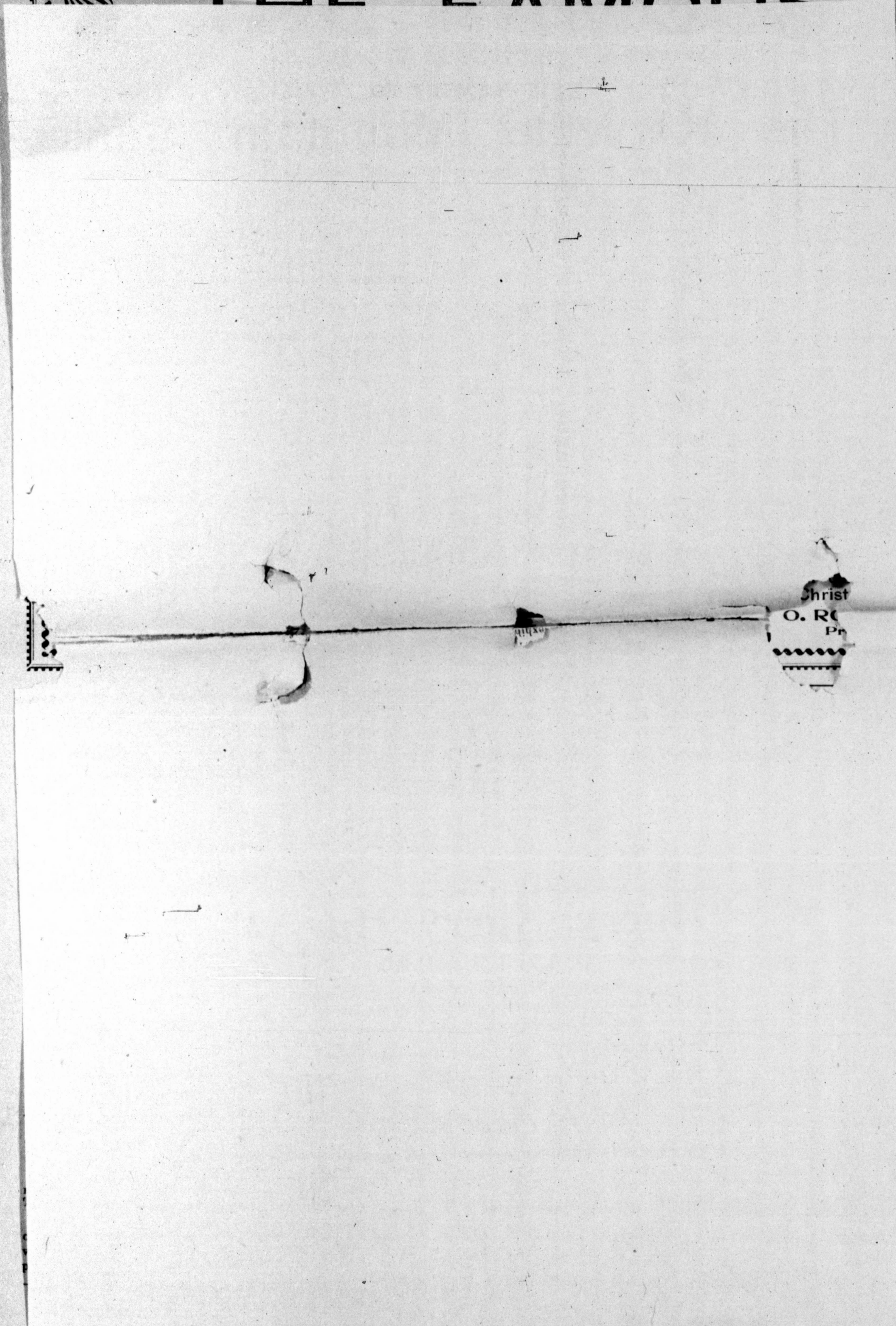

The November term of the Kerr County Commissioners' Court met at the court house Monday, November 13, with County Judge Julius Real, presiding; F. A. Karger, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1; John Rees, No. 2; Herman Schulze, No. 3; D. R. Watson, No. 4; J. T. Moore, Sheriff, and J. M. Hamilton, clerk.

G. A. Stowers et al, application for change in Rock Springs road. Change was granted at expense of G. A. Stowers and subject to the approval of the Commissioners' court.

The Trustees of the Kelley creek school were ordered to transfer and convey the one acre of land belonging to the school and invest the proceeds in other school property.

It was ordered that A. P. Heinen provide an outlet for the surplus storm water thrown on the road by a ditch dug by him along his field and thence across part of the land on the public road. To be fixed subject to approval of Commissioner Schulze.

The quarterly report of County Treasurer J. L. Vining, after a careful examination by the court, was found correct and approved.
