As From The Dead.

Temple, Tex., Nov. 18.—A noteworthy occurrence that happened several days ago in Temple vindicates the old saying of "entertaining angels unawares" to a considerable extent, although the cherubim in this case happen to be a young man who has been searched for all over the United States and South America for the past year, all of no avail, when suddenly he turns up in Temple and the demonstration furnishes material for an interesting story. A few days ago Special Officer Miller of the Santa Fe road came upon a man in the railroad yards who was in a most pitiable condition. He had come into Temple on a freight train from Milano, being the victim of a "pass along" system that many communities adopt in getting rid of the unfortunates and afflicted. The man was dangerously sick, half-famished and in an awful state of personal cleanliness. His legs were swollen, his body a mass of sores and he was completely alive with vermin. Dr. Noble was informed of the case and through humane motives visited the young man and ordered him to be taken to the King's Daughters hospital. There the man recovered sufficiently to give his name and address, also that of his mother, who he stated was a wealthy woman of Burlington, Iowa. The mother was communicated with and immediately telegraphed back to give her son all the attention money could buy and that she would come on at once. In due course she arrived and then fuller details were obtainable. The young man was one of three sons of wealthy parents. The two other sons were graduates of Harvard and Amherst respectively, and one is at present in Cuba, while the other is a manufacturer of electrical specialties in Chicago. The young man in Temple had attended Harvard and was in his second year when he received a fall in the gymnasium which injured his head and to an extent impaired his intellect. The most eminent physicians of the country were consulted and failed to give relief. Finally under advice received from a specialist the patient was placed in an osteopathic institution in Missouri and treated for an affection of the spine. The case was treated for several months, and it was finally announced that there was dislocation of the neck, calling for a stretching process operation which was very severe. The night after the operation was performed, without success being achieved, the patient escaped from his nurses and left the institution. That was a year ago, and although Pinkerton detectives were placed on his trail and a general advertising campaign inaugurated to locate

the fugitive, he baffled all attempts at discovery. During the time his mother has traveled to many places far and near to have disinterred the bodies of men who have been killed or died under unusual circumstances, but the very first accurate knowledge gained of her son was when she received a message from the matron of the Temple Hospital. Then the son's disconnected account of his wanderings filled the gap in the story. He had been in Mexico and in many strange places that he could not recall, but his story showed that he had wandered as an object of charity, his gentle manners always securing him food, but many and often was the time he was compelled to sleep in the open air at night. He became ill nearly a month ago and he had been passed along from town to town until his physical condition was so terrible that when he reached Temple he was ready to give up the struggle and end the unequal contest, but just when the clouds were darkest occurred the lute in the rift and he fell into tender and sympathetic hands who exerted themselves in his behalf and inspired him with renewed hope. It also develops that the father, who died some years ago, was a wealthy citizen of Burlington and one of the city parks there is named for him. Before he died he distributed his property, consisting largely of railroad stocks, and this son's share included a large block of M. K. & T. R. R. stock, amounting to a considerable holding and at the very moment he was riding on the freight trains of the lines in hobo fashion it proves that he was one of its owners. The fear of a repetition of the terrible operation undergone in Missouri induced him to remain silent and an outcast rather than endure its tortures a second time. The mother paid liberally for the attentions shown her son and in addition remembered the hospital with a handsome present. The pair departed for their Iowa home yesterday, engaging the drawing room of a sleeper. The physician did not tell the mother his diagnosis of her son's case, but advised her to take him home at once.

Deed of a Crazy Man.

Caney, I. T., Nov. 18.—A terrible tragedy was enacted near Caney yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock. C. E. Pitts, living three miles west of Caney, was stricken with sudden derangement. His wife sent for a neighbor, a Mr. Taylor, who lived near them, to help control him. Pitts managed to get his shotgun and shot Taylor, killing him. He then tried to shoot his wife, but she escaped to a nearby home, leaving her five children in the house, the youngest but eight months old. When she left Pitts forced the oldest child, a boy, to place the chairs and other household goods on the body of Taylor. He then set fire to the heap and the body was burned beyond recognition. He then burned the house and barn, first removing the children. While he was doing this the oldest boy escaped to a place of safety. Pitts then placed two of the children on one horse and mounted another with the two smaller ones and started for Boggy bottom.

In the meantime citizens were gathering, but he would allow no one to approach, shooting Tom Acres, wounding him slightly in

the head, two buckshot going through his hat. He also wounded a horse.

Several United States Marshals are after him and think they have him surrounded in the boggy near Clear Boggy, about two and a half miles from here.

It is feared he has killed the remaining children, as shots were heard in the vicinity where he is supposed to be. The posse could not work at night. At least fifty men are after him this morning.

Turner Is Sentenced to Die December 22.

San Antonio, Tex., Nov. 21.—For the first time Judge Dwyer of the Thirty-seventh District Court pronounced a death sentence Monday morning. The sentence was pronounced upon George H. Turner who was convicted for the murder of Mrs. Mary E. Lynch, March 9, 1905. Turner will be hanged December 22, 1905.

When it became known that Turner was to be sentenced to death a crowd gathered in the courthouse. It was rumored that the prisoner would make a sensational statement regarding his accusers at that time and many were interested. But, for the most part, everything passed off very quietly.

While the sentence was being passed upon him Turner sat in front of the bar wearing smoked glasses. Besides him sat Deputy Sheriffs Fraser and Kincaid. Turner's attorneys, T. M. West and R. M. Watkins, sat near. District Attorney Baker occupied the witness box facing the prisoner.

After consulting a calendar Judge Dwyer commanded Turner to stand up, and speaking slowly and with visible emotion, said: "Have you anything to say why the sentence of the court should not be pronounced upon you in accordance with the verdict of the jury, which has been affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals, the court of last resort, and the sentence of death imposed upon you? Have you anything to say why this court should not pronounce sentence upon you now?"

During this time Turner was standing, leaning against the bar and for a moment everyone in the courtroom held their breath. Silence was so dense as to be almost oppressive. Then Turner slowly replied in even tones without showing any emotion: "No, I don't believe I have. It was my intention to make a talk this morning, but my three accusers are not present. I thank my attorneys for what they have done, all according to law, and I don't know of any more they could have done."

Judge Dwyer then pronounced the sentence in slow tones. He said:

"It is considered and ordered by the court that the defendant, Geo. H. Turner, who has been adjudged to be guilty of murder in the first degree, and whose punishment has been assessed by the verdict of the jury rendered against him herein at death, be now taken by the Sheriff to the place of execution on Friday, the 22d of December, Anno Domini, 1905, in Bexar county, Texas, and there be hanged by the neck until he be dead. And, it is further considered and ordered that the clerk of this court shall issue a warrant for the execution of this sentence of death, and direct and deliver the same to the Sheriff of Bexar county, Texas, who shall execute the same in the man-

Preparations are being made for the hanging and District Clerk Nevill is now at work upon the death warrant to be ready for the occasion. The rope that was made for the execution of Ernest Thompson will probably be used and the lower portion of the gallows will be shrouded in black. This will be done to prevent witnesses of the execution from seeing the body of the doomed man after he falls through the trap.

Child Shot Mother Through Body.

Lockhart, Tex., Nov. 19.—Mrs. J. V. Wiseman, of Lavernia, who is visiting her sister, Mrs. J. P. Saunders, was shot and seriously wounded at 7:00 a. m. this morning by her 5-year-old son. The boy found a Colt's 45-caliber pistol lying on a chair in the room. He raised the weapon and playfully pointed it at his mother; the gun was discharged. The bullet entered the body below the stomach and fractured the hip bone, coming out near the thigh and embedding itself in the wall of the room. Mrs. Wiseman is resting easy tonight.

J. V. Wiseman and W. M. Wiseman, of Lavernia, were in this city yesterday on their way to Lockhart, where Mrs. J. V. Wiseman, wife of the former, was accidentally shot by her 4-year-old son yesterday morning at the home of her sister, Mrs. J. P. Saunders, with whom she was spending a few weeks while her husband was on a hunting trip to Cotulla.

The little boy picked up the pistol which was lying on a chair in his mother's bedroom, and it is not known whether he pointed it at her and pulled the trigger, or whether it fell from his hands. The latter is most likely true, as the gun is a 45-caliber 6-shooter, and very heavy. The bullet struck her stomach and passed through her body. Dr. Ross, who attended her, said yesterday afternoon there is good chances of her recovery.

Burial Without a Parallel Takes Place In Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 19.—A burial without a parallel in this

The the Roman Catholic so strangely workmen who wer Forkis Joseph Gazda, two forema ing laborers who met a death a week ago. They were pit near a cupola containing many tons of molten steel. A plug gave way and 80,000 pounds of the fiery fluid poured from the cupola and overwhelmed them. The men were completely incinerated and not a trace of themselves or their clothing was left.

The Midvale Steel company was averse to selling the steel or using it for the purpose for which it was intended, and it was decided to bury it with the rites of the church to which the unfortunate men had belonged. Accordingly the 40-ton ingot, oval in shape, 20 feet long, 6 feet wide and 5 feet thick, was moved last week by a traveling crane to the rear of the machine shop, where a grave 10 feet deep had been made. A great crowd sought admission to the works today, but only the two sisters of Gazda, who were dependent upon him for support, and about 100 workmen, who were on Sunday duty, were permitted to attend the services along with the officials of the company. Among the officials was President Harrah. All heads were bared and flags were lowered to half-mast, while the two priests conducted the services. The great ingot was covered with earth and the funeral party dispersed. The grave of the men will be appropriately marked by the company.

Farmer Found Hanging.

Hillsboro, Tex., Nov. 18.—The lifeless body of Sam O. Thompson, a farmer aged about 32 years, living adjacent to Mount Calm, was found hanging in a barn on his place today.

He had left his house in the morning ostensibly to go to the cotton field, but failing to return through the day, a search was instituted, resulting in the discovery of his body. When found his feet were touching the floor, but life had been extinct some time!

Ninety-nine Years in the Pen.

And thus the enthusiasm engendered by memories of a great historic event will be mingled with admiration for our nation's glory typified by the emblematic Stars and Stripes rippling in the Texas breezes sixty feet in the air overhead.

The entire school will be arranged in ranks close by, and each department will have an appropriate banner carried by its representative standard-bearer. At a recent election for this purpose, Rudolph Mosel was chosen for the Primary Department, Gerania Turner for the Intermediate Department and Miss Thorne Renschel for the High School Department.

To all of these exercises the public is cordially invited. We shall be disappointed if you do not come. We believe that we have a right to expect your presence as an evidence of your interest in our efforts, and as an encouragement to your children.

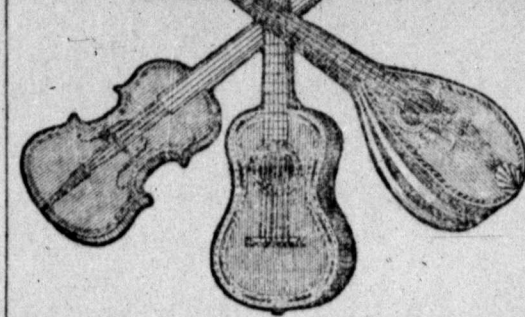
