GRAPHIC STORY OF THE VOLCANO FROM PEN OF EDITOR OF CENTURY MAGAZINE.

Naples, April 15.—The following rounding Mount Vesuvius was written for the Associated Press by Robert Underwood Johnson, editor of the Century Magazine:

"I had the unexpected opportu disaster by personal observation in a trip entirely around Vesuvius.

"Since the Chicago fire I have seen nothing so terribly impres sive. Twenty years will not repair the damage, including the destruction four whole villages. With a change of wind or slightly greater propulsion of the seismic force the same fate might extend to other segments of the circle of which Vesuvius is the center.

"Arriving from Rome two hours late by train, I joined a party of two Italian gentlemen and two English ladies, including Miss Undera train from Torre Anunziata, three miles this side of Pompeii and two wedge of lava which destroyed Boscotrecase. We had a magnificent view of the eruption eight miles away. Rising at an angle of 50 degrees the vast mass was beautiinto new forms and drifting south in black clouds of ashes and cinders soon revealed by the moonlight.

MOB AT SPRINGFIELD, MO., MAKE SHORT SHRIFT OF PRISONERS CHARGED WITH ASSAULT.

Springfield, Mo., April 14 .- A mob of 3,000 removed two negroes named Duncan and Copeland, from the county jail, hung them to the electric light tower in the public square and built a fire under them. and they were roasted to death. They were charged with assaulting Mabel Edmonton.

A mob of 1,000 men gathered at the city jail at 8 o'clock tonight and upon learning that the negroes were not there, hastened to the county jail, where the prisoners were confined.


