CALIFORNIA EARTHQUAKES

Nearly All Preceded by Seismic Disturbances in Orient.

It has been a quarter of a century resulted in loss of life, although seismic disturbances are of common occurrence on the Pacific coast.

On March 26 and 27, 1872, there was a series of violent shocks in the Inyo valley. Several small towns were destroyed, and about 30 persons were killed. The shock was felt in San Francisco, and the walls of many buildings were cracked, and damage done to the Lick

Before that, in 1852, the only earthquake of note in the state was one which destroyed one of the Franciscan missions in Southean

The Pacific coast has been so frequently visited by earthquakes that it was deemed unwise, until a few years ago, to erect tall buildings in San Francisco. It was only with the advent of modern steel construction, which was believed to law is imperative. render tall buildings safe from the earth's tremors, that sky-scrapers made their appearance on the Pa-

In the past fifty years over 250 arthquake shocks have been recorded in San Francisco. The most severe were in 1868 and 1898. In 1868 much damage was done to the city and many lives were lost

The disturbance of 1898 did not result in loss of life, but caused much damage to property. This shock occurred at 11:53 p. m. March 31, and houses all over the city were shaken to their foundations. There was intense excite-

The 1898 tremor was declared to have been the most severe ever recorded at San Francisco. and it was remarkable that no loss of life resulted.

San Antonio, April 23.-On his way from Taylor to Tamaulipas, Mex., with a few carloads of the brother at the nearby station Hereford bulls for the ranches of that section of the Republic, E. M. Fink of El Paso registered at the Southern Hotel to spend the Antonio.

"I have found it very difficult to buy 2-year-old bulls in Texas,' stock either sell their bulls at the age of one year to the butcher or send them as steers to the mar-

Mexico now and is going to con tinue long enough to make it to the advantage of the cattle raiser to hold a few of his bulls.

"When a shipper makes affi davit at the border now, that his cattle are of good quality and to be used for breeding purposes only, they can go into Mexico without the payment of duty, Texas cattle, of the best quality only, have been shipped to Mexice to the ranches which desire to raise the quality of their cattle and naturally cattle from this State have a fine reputation in that country.

"The Mexican ranchmen, par ticuliarly in the coast section of Mexico, are making a large profit by raising good cattle from Texas stock and shipping them to Cuba. The Cuban ranches are still being restocked to recover from the effects of the Spanish-American war and the hard times preceding.

"Not many dairy cattle are be ing shipped. Herefords, however, are preferred in the country around Tamaulipas. Some dedairy cattle and they will be shipped from Texas."
