TALKS ABOUT ELECTION AND POLITICS.

The Old Frontiersman Expresses His Views on Modern Methods of Selecting Men for Public Office.

Next Tuesday, the 6th day of November is general election day in Texas. As a result of this great biennial disturbance a lot of people are mighty uncomfortable tonight. There are the state officers, who are already elected by the action of the Democratic primary last July. Then there are 131 representatives and 15 senators to be elected and a full set of county officers for 235 organized counties, and all the minor offices to be filled. Now all these hundreds of men are very busy and powerful anxious people. A great majority of them have already spent more money for beer and whiskey and "donations" and a poor grade of campaign literature than one term's salary will amount to. When a fellow sits down on the back steps and lights his pipe and watches the chickens picking around the yard, he almost wishes he was a chicken so he wouldn't have to be mixed up with elections. The modern election is so nasty. Why can't men let the people alone and just let them elect somebody? The plain people of Texas especially, are a mighty good jury to submit any question to, and they most generally get the decision about right. An official of any kind, from constable to president is the peoples' hired man, and I would like to know why the office seekers can't just submit their character references to the folks they expect to hire them, through the public press or some other reliable medium, and then let the people give out the job to suit themselves. It wouldn't cost so much in the first place and besides that the fellow who don't get hired wouldn't feel so much like a fool as he does after telling the people for six months that he is the only half-way, decent man that has applied for the job the only one, in fact has enough sense to do the work if he is hired.

I wonder who the fellow was who first started the practice of trying to raise himself to public prominence by telling lies on the other people who wanted the same job? Who got the system of

politics hind part before by stating in his application for public service that every man opposed to him was a liar and a scoundrel, and unworthy of confidence, instead of making a simple statement of his own merits and letting other people's business alone? Why, it has actually come to such a pass that when a candidate or his campaign managers starts a lie many of his people feel like it is their duty to repeat it, no matter how absurd the story may be. Men actually get to a point sometimes that they think another man who does not agree with them ought not to express his views, but simply keep quiet while "sensible people" talk. All this in America too, where the right of free speech is guaranteed to the people by the constitution of the United States. Another evil is that people just will make a personal matter of politics. They say they won't, but when it comes to a show down, often, men who are otherwise sensible fellows, will get mad as hops at their best friend, because he won't desert his principles and come across to them, never stopping to think for a moment, that if they are really anxious to be lined up with the friend they could jar loose from their own political principles and go across to him. It is no farther across the creek to the other fellow than it is from his side over to you. The best thing to do is to let each fellow have his own way in politics and respect him for being man enough to back his convictions with his vote and then all the time, when there is no political "rag to chew" be friends and be good. The last authentic case of warm personal friendship that could not be in the least cooled or shaken by politics was when Jonathan embraced David and said, "go in peace, the Lord be between me and thee and between my seed and thy seed forever." Jonathan knew that his father was jealous of the popularity of David and knew that David was likely to usurp his father's power. We have no evidence that Jonathan was disloyal to Saul, he simply loved David as a friend and no amount of political pressure could strain the relation that existed between them.

Well, well, politics and political parties are sometimes conducted in a manner that is not highly creditable to the community, but still we have them. They constitute the balance wheel of the government machinery, by constantly watching each other. After all we don't have such nasty politics in Texas as they have in some other sections, still we are like the tramp who had to compare himself and the Judge to Judas Iscariot in order to make a creditable showing.

There are a whole lot of young fellows in Texas who will cast their first vote in this election. Many of them will vote the way "dad" does, and that's not a bad plan. Often young fellows will get out and paw up the ground on the side of a political row that his sweethearts "paw" happens to be on. That won't do boys and any sensible old man would rather see his party lose a vote every thirty seconds for a thousand years than to see his daughter marry a man with a backbone like a fish worm. You don't have to quarrel with a man because your opinions don't coincide on public matters. You can disagree with a man without call-

ing him names and spitting tobacco juice on his boots, and if you disagree with him in a gentlemanly manner he will respect you for being man enough to say so, presuming always that he is a real man. Well it is three more days until the battle will have been waged, another week and the votes will have been counted. All the discussion will they be over, the newspapers will quit printing politics and pay more attention to facts, the voters will cease arguing the merits of men and go to getting in the winter's wood, and I along with a lot of other old fellows will find something else to think of while we smoke our pipes and watch the Thanksgiving turkey run his head out of the coop and pick up the stray kernels of corn that have been dropped on the ground.

TO OBSERVE THANKSGIVING

President Roosevelt Issues Proclamation Imposing the Customary Ceremony Incident to the Day.

Washington, Oct. 23.—The text of the President's Thanksgiving proclamation issued today as follows:

Proclamation: The time of the year has come when, in accordance with the wise custom of our forefathers, it becomes my duty to set aside a special day of thanksgiving and prayer to the Almighty, because of the blessings we have received and of prayer that these blessings may be continued. Yet another year of widespread well-being has passed. Neverbefore in our history or in the history of any other nation has a people enjoyed more abounding material prosperity than is ours; a prosperity that is so great that it should arouse in us no spirit of heedless disregard of our responsibility but rather a sober sense of our many blessings and a resolute purpose, under providence, not to forfeit them by any action of our own.

Material well being, indispensable though it is, can never be anything but the foundation of true national greatness and happiness. If we build nothing on this foundation, then our national life will be as meaningless and empty as a house where only the foundation had been laid. On our material well being must be built a superstructure of individual and national life, lived in accordance with the laws of the highest morality, or else our prosperity itself will be in the long run turn out a curse instead of a blessing. We should both reverently thankful for what we have received, and earnestly bent on turning it into a means of grace and not of destruction.

Accordingly I hereby set apart Thursday, the twenty-ninth day of November next, as a day of thanksgiving and supplication, on which the people shall meet in their homes or their churches, devoutly acknowledging all that has been given them and to pray that they may in addition receive the power to use these gifts aright.

live-stock show in the Lone Star State or the South.

ITS BEST THRILLER SPOILED

A Young Actor Broke Up "Jesse James" and Was Discharged.

An old-time actor was walking on Main street yesterday. At the Junction he met a young man who had been on the road only a few months, leaning against "the man's house," as he put it, and looking very disconsolate.

"Hello, Williams," the veteran actor said, cheerfully, "left the 'repertory' company?"

"Yes, quit," was the answer. "Trouble?"

"This way," the young man said, glad to find a listener. "I was property man, stage carpenter, call boy and everything else. One day we blew into a little coal mining town down here in Missouri. The 'opry house' was a barn-like shack where you could stand on the stage and shake hands with the audience. The owner'd been having trouble with the city officials about the license, and there hadn't been a show here for four years. Our manager paid the four years' license, boosted the prices and opened for six nights. The house was packed every night at a dollar a seat. On the last night the house manager came down, crawled up over the gas footlights and asked if we could stay three more nights. We said we could, and then the trouble began. We had only six plays in our repertoire, and they had already been put on there.

"It was a case of rehearse a bill in the morning and play it that night. Everyone was about crazy, studying a part one night, rehearsing it the next day and working in the bill that night. We pulled through until the last day. Then a deputation of citizens came to the hotel and asked us to put on 'Jesse James' that night. The manager consented. We called a rehearsal and then I began to hustle for 'props' and scenery. We had no engine for the 'Blue Cut' scene, so we decided to drop the curtain just before the train was supposed to come on. I got to gether some 2x4 planks and stretched them across the stage and painted black squares on them to resemble railroad ties. Then I made a switch. It was a wonderful piece of mechanism, and I was proud of it. There was supposed to be a log cabin at R. U. E. We didn't have a log cabin, so I put up a folding set cottage about eight feet high, and of course, forgot to brace it properly. That was where I lost out.

"The big card act came. I was only playing the Indian. It was my job to tie the girl to the railroad track. A small boy was out in the wings, shuffling his feet on a piece of sand board and bending on a piece of tin with two small sticks. He was the train and he was coming about ninety-three miles an hour.

"I struggled across the stage with the heroine and just as I got to the switch I stumbled and we both fell flat, knocking the track over and smashing the switch to pieces. The audience howled and the fellow who was playing 'Jesse' thought he could save the scene, so he came running on. It wasn't his cue and I got excited and tried to crawl through the window of the set cottage. I slipped and fell on my back and the cottage came tumbling over on top of me. My feet broke through the thin canvas and all the audience could see was a broken railroad switch and a pair of legs. I certainly 'brought down the house' that night. They didn't put on the fourth act. There was too much noise. I was fired. —Kansas City Star.

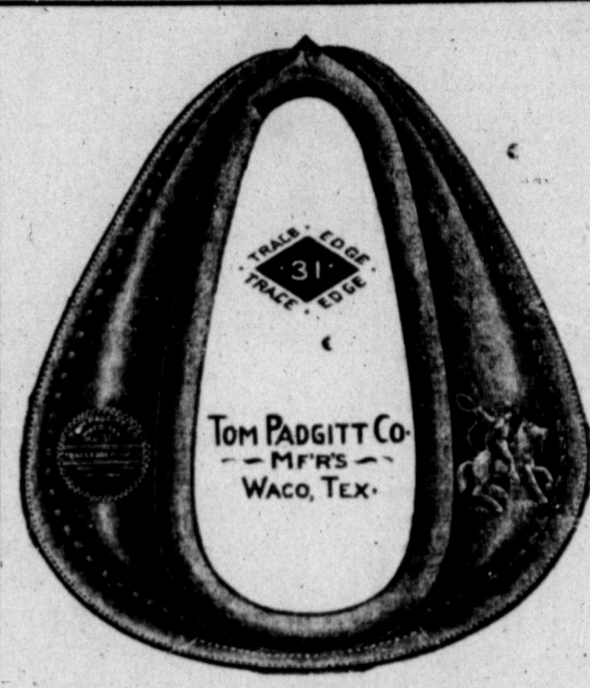

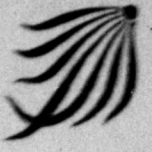

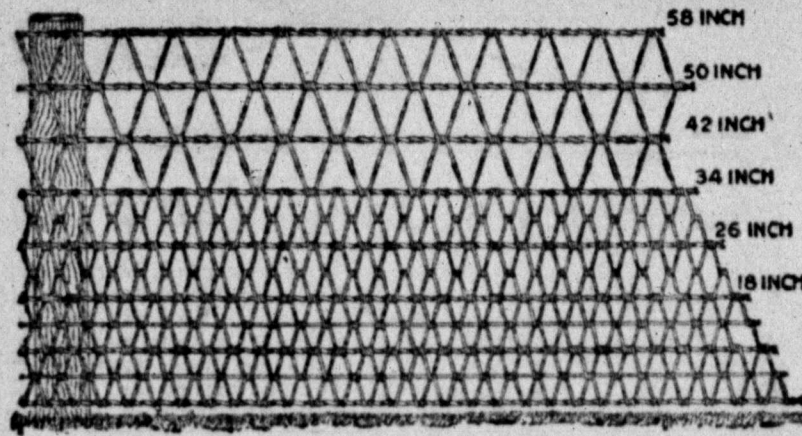
