HATS OFF TO the young FFA and 4H Ciub members from Bovina who made such a fine account of themselves at the 32nd annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show.

To say that Bovina youngsters had the best record ever in the county show might be presumptious, but this writer has personally attended 17 of the last 32 shows, and this was by far their best showing in that time span.

It has not been too many years since Bovina was virtually "bringing up the rear" when it came time for the county show.

This trend has definitely reversed, though, especially since Bovina

Boving Dominates County Stock Show

For the second year in a row, Bovina showmen dominated the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show, setting the pace in qualifying animals for the show's auction sale. Bovina had the show's Grand Champion Lamb, shown by Charlie Trimble, Reserve Champion Lamb, shown by Charles Falkenburg, and Reserve Champion Steer, shown by Doug Roming. This gave Bovina youngsters three of the show's top six awards.

And Roming caused Herman Boone, judge of the steer show, to take a second and possibly a third look before passing over his 1164-pound Angus steer in the judging for the grand championship. Roming was the only Bovina showman to win a class championship in the steer judging, taking the trophy in the show's "jumbo"

wool entry, second to Trimble's in breed judging, captured reserve champion honors in the lamb show. Buyers at Saturday's premium auction sale paid excellent premiums to the young showmen, and the showmen from Bovina were well covered, even though tipping the scale in comparison to the rest of the county.

Trimble's grand champion lamb was bought by Agri-Sprayers for \$6.00 per pound. Roming's reserve champion steer brought \$1.10 per pound from First State Bank, and following the bidding Agri-Sprayers and the Bovina Blade each added ten

cents per pound to the bid price. Buyers did a considerable amount of "adding on" to the bid price, so that virtually all of the steers brought at least \$1.00 per pound, and \$3.00 per pound was average price for lambs. Barrows brought from \$1.50 per pound to around \$3.00. The champion barrow brought \$4.00 per pound, and the champion steer netted \$2.00 per pound.

The Grand Champion Steer was exhibited by Dean Church of Friona. Although it was the 15th steer title since 1948 for Friona exhibitors, it had been 13 years since a Friona youngster had claimed the title.

youngsters led the way with 72 animals in the auction sale, which qualified the top 150 animals. With one-fourth of the total being considered average for any community, Bovina just lacked three animals qualifying exactly one-half of the total.

In the past four years, Bovina youngsters have now won the county steer and sheep titles twice each. The only title which has eluded Bovina in recent years has been the barrow championship, but Bovina seems to be working on the situation, since 37 of the 92 barrows making the sale were from Bovina, or just over 40 per cent.

Lawrence Widner and Pat Barrett of the local vo-ag department are to be congratulated for their fine work with the youngsters, which is paying off dividends in a big way.

++++ THIS YEAR WAS at least the second year in a row for the all-weather county showbarn to have more than paid for itself. Last year, there were four to six inches of snow on the gound on showday, but the show went off without a hitch.

This year, our particular area missed out on most of the snow which blanketed parts of the region, but still had the cold weather, and thus, the showbarn again was a God-send.

We were telling Jim Russell Monday that we'd bet that at least on 75 per cent of the years, the county show has been held in adverse weather of some sort. It has run the gamut from bitter cold to swirling dust storms.

Last week, for example, the area sweltered under 85-degree sun on Wednesday. But came Thursday, and here was the Arctic cold front which sent temperatures skidding. ++++

Tractors Help In Emergency Causes

Tractors belonging to the American Agriculture Movement were pressed into service as emergency vehicles in Washington, D.C. on Monday, as the nation's capital was buried underneath 23 inches of new snow.

Ralph Roming, in a telephone report to the Blade, said that the mayor of Washington released 40 of the impounded tractors, and the farmers worked from mid-morning until past midnight clearing parking lots, and giving rides to doctors and nurses to and from hospitals.

In one case, hospital workers were relieved after spending 36 hours on. duty.

Roming said he operated his tractor from about 10:30 a.m. until 1 a.m. Tuesday.

"This snowfall may turn out to have been a God-send. The farmers have been given an opportunity to show what kind of people they are, and we have received the thanks of hospital officials and city residents," Roming said.

The Bovina AAM official said that Washington was virtually shut down on Monday by the record snowfall. None of the modes of public transportation could move. Hospital officials were upset because more of the tractors were not released, since they could have been used.

A number of buses were stranded, and farmers on tractors were sent to help solve the problem.

Roming said he felt the farmers' input in the ag committee hearings had been good. The hearings were to have resumed on Tuesday, but due to the weather, congress could not reconvene.

It has been bone-chilling cold the past week, with temperatures dropping to zero. Sunday's high mark was just 13 degrees.

Services Held For Embree

Funeral services for Warren Embree, 72, a former resident of Bovina, were conducted last Friday in Tahoka.

Embree was a former bank official in Bovina, and was associated with the bank here during its formative stages.

A native of Tuscola, he married Marie Stephenson on June 9, 1927. She died in 1971, and he married Billie White on September 13, 1975. Embree also was associated with banks in Lubbock, Carrollton, Lockney, Petersburg and Tahoka. He was senior vice president of the Tahoka bank at the time of his death, and had served as mayor while at Petersburg.

Survivors include his wife, two daughters, a stepdaughter, three stepsons, a sister, two brothers, and four grandchildren.

Guilty Verdict

David Allen Barcheers, 28, of Humble City, was convicted of second degree murder in the August 16 slaying of former Bovina resident, Dannie Lynn McKay, 22. The trial, which was moved to Clovis on a change of venue, concluded after the jury of six men and six women deliberated for about four and one-half hours. The verdict of guilty was read by Judge Rueben Nieves at about 10 p.m. Wednesday, February 14.

For his efforts, Roming also won the showmanship award in the show's steer division. Roming kept alive Bovina's record in the county steer judging, of having won one of the top steer titles for three out of the past four years.

An idea of how well the Bovina showmen did against those from the rest of the county can be seen in the fact that of the 150 animals which gualified for the auction sale, 72, or 48 per cent, were owned by Bovinians.

Friona showmen qualified 32 animals, to place a distant second, Lazbuddie qualified 28, and Farwell 18

Bovina youngsters virtually took over the sheep show, with 29 of the 40 sale spots--72.5 per cent--going to showmen from this community.

Class championships in the barrow show were won by Dale Turner, who also had the breed champion Yorkshire barrow, Del Ray Sudderth, lightweight Berkshires; Sharlet Johnson, lightweight Chester White; Jody Watts, mediumweight Chester White; Charles Johnson, lightweight Duroc and Jim Rhodes, lightweight Poland China.

In the sheep show, Bovina winners were Charlie Trimble for medium wool light heavyweight, Blake Sudderth in fine wool heavyweight, Laura Widner in fine wool cross, heavyweights, and Mark Teague in Dorsets.

Also, Lupe Salazar in fine wool cross, lightweight, Kathy Falkenberg in medium wool lightweight, Doyle Garner in medium wool, middleweight, and Charlie Trimble in medium wool, heavyweight.

Trimble's lamb was later judged the Grand Champion of the show, and Charles Falkenburg's medium

the teams like they did this year.




