TALKS OF LEGISLATIVE MATTERS AND THE GROWING TENDENCY TO "REGULATE."

Austin, Mar. 5.—Since the storm of politics has spent its fury and the solons have at last got down to the state's business in real earnest, there is a strong tendency to do things. The thirtieth legislature of Texas will in all probability go down into history as the convention of regulators. There is no business of even a semi-public nature that has not had a bill introduced regulating it. There has perhaps never been a legislative body assembled in any state with such strong anti-corporation tendencies as has the present Texas legislature. Now the anti-corporation idea is, like socialism, very beautiful in theory, but in practice it appears to many conservative business men to be just a little risky for Texas just at this time.

For sections of the state where plenty of railroads and like public enterprises have already been established, it is perfectly safe for the people to keep up as big a howl as they like about "corporate greed" and such like sophistries as look well in print and act well as a catch-vote proposition for men who are seeking public office and are desirous of securing the vote of people who do not think, but when the matter is put squarely up to conservative, hard-headed business men, the men upon whom the burden of the government lies, it is a different proposition. For the representative people of west and south west Texas to lend their voices to any measure having a tendency to hamper in any way the operations of railroads would be a kind of public suicide. There are yet many counties in Texas that have not a mile of railway. The building of railroads is absolutely essential to modern progress and the successful development of new country, of which Texas has yet many millions of acres. Now this may sound like a pretty strong statement for corporations but when viewed from a cold-blooded business standpoint it is eminently correct for west Texas.

It is the history of the world that every time a great reform has been undertaken the people have gone to a violent extreme in their efforts to bring it about. This has been the case in the anti-corporation movement in this state. The railroads and other large corporations are unquestionably to blame for this state of affairs existing. Corporate interests for many years abused the privileges accorded them in this state and took such unfair and unjust advantages of the people who feed their enterprises that it became necessary for them to inaugurate a wave of reform. It is a very human principle, once you get a fellow going, to "lam him good and hard" and that is what the people of Texas are doing just now for the railroads. It occurs to me that a hobby is very much like any other horse in one respect, that is you can ride him too far. I am very much afraid some of the politicians in this state are going to ride that old anti-railroad hobby about a day and a half too far if they don't look out. The signs of the times are pointing

right now to the fact that certain politicians are beginning to fear that the critter is getting just a little bit knee-sprung. It is a foregone conclusion that at least one member of the Texas Railroad Commission has political aspirations of a very serious nature, and it is hardly probable that a good sturdy nag would have been abandoned by the commission and turned over to the younger set of politicians of the legislature as was done in the case of the two-cent fare business unless something was wrong with his mind. The railroad commission had all kinds of authority to fix the fares and tariffs in Texas and it does not look reasonable that they would voluntarily give up good political thunder.

The "dear people" are a strange gang of folks. They sometimes give a fellow a hobby and watch him ride it while they throw up their hats and yell, "go it old man you are a jockey after my own heart." But woe unto the fellow who rides until it begins to look as if the hobby couldn't hold out to the finish. The anti-corporation horse just barely got his nose under the wire in the last campaign, and wise politicians are getting a little bit shy of him. I predict that some fellow who sees things before they get him, is going to discover a mighty clean built thoroughbred colt in this state inside the next four years called "conservative business administration of affairs" and when he sees it he will get onto it's back and do some mighty fancy riding toward high office. The erratic man in which business and public affairs are being run in this state now cannot last, and when the old wooden hobby goes to wreck the people are going to be mighty sore at the fellows who led him out and told them it was a sure enough horse. It will only be the reaction, and such things have to come, but the next time Texas has an upheaval of public sentiment she will take a conservative middle ground, and keep in all things pertaining to state affairs. When that time comes the people will issue an edict that it will only be permissible for a man to be a politician while he is in the race for office, and he must cease the habit of rolling his eyes up at the galleries while his term of office lasts and give them honest disinterested service.

I am afraid that if I keep this line of talk going some folks will think I am a little extreme in my own views, but it is my opinion that it would not be bad policy for young men who have political aspirations to ponder the matter well.

But these are merely physical aids. To attain to the highest success there must be an inner spiritual life, guiding and directing, stimulating here, repressing there, an organic unity striving with concerted effort to the accomplishment of definite purposes and ends. Archimedes is said to have claimed that he could move the world had he only a fulcrum on which to rest his lever. But I had rather be the author of a soul stirring sentiment that would elevate humanity than to be the possessor of this boasted physical power. It is this moral and spiritual support that any school needs first and foremost, for it is an organic unity composed of pupils, parents and teachers, all striving toward a common end. Is it just to complain because another may use a different means to the same end? Had you ever stopped to consider seriously who is right? Who is wrong? Can you support your belief by well founded facts? No teacher is infallible. On the

contrary, they make many mistakes, but do not business men, too? The only question, then, that remains is, "how may these mistakes be best righted, not magnified?" Imaginary abuses are always of the worst kind. They usually arise from a misunderstanding. But I admire that man most who has the boldness to defend his position when he believes he is right, but who also has the manhood to abandon his position when he knows he is wrong.

OUR NEEDS.

Each grade should have a library kept in its own room. The advantages of this are obvious. In the first place it develops a "grade-ride" in its own possessions. Then, too, the books are selected so as to suit the age and capacity of pupils, they should also be selected from the various fields of literature, history, biography, science, pure literature, etc. This tends to broaden the minds of pupils by opening up different lines of thought. It also often discovers a pupil to himself. Many a man has made but little out of life, just because he discovered too late that occupation for which he is best suited. Circumstances, as notably in the case of Scott's turning from poetry to novels, have sometimes brought out these facts, but we should not trust to them. It is our duty to present them with a studied effort at discovering their hidden capacities.

Not only should each grade have its own library, selected from the different fields of literature and suited to the age and ability of the pupils, but each pupil should be required to read a certain number of books each year. The teachers in such grades should be thoroughly familiar with the contents of such books and in every case satisfy themselves the work has been done. This teaches pupils early in life how to read. It also stimulates and develops tastes along the right lines. I believe that the most pernicious influence of our age is the privilege given to pupils of indiscriminate reading. You say, "We don't have such books in a school library." True enough, but they will get them. Now it is our business to substitute and create a taste for something better. If every parent would stop to consider the sleepless nights that may be occasioned late in life by this lack of supervision over what their children read, they might deem it worth their while. No one doubts that a book, good or bad, moulds thoughts, forms characters and determines conduct. We would urge that you know what your boys and girls are reading.

Superstitions of Barbers.

"Superstitious? I should say yes." They won't admit it to any one except members of the craft, but barbers are the most supersti-

tious people in the world."

The man in charge of the second chair at one of the large hotel stopped his razor and loquaciously continued:

"You see that new man down at the end of the chair? He just came to work here this morning, and he'll have a nice large can tied to his coat tonight. Why? Because he is left-handed. If he remained here every barber in the shop would quit before the week was out.

"A left-handed barber is a hoodoo to any shop, and there's no getting away from it. You may think that's only a prejudice that barbers have for left-handed knights of the razor, but it's a well-grounded superstition as old as the trade itself.

"We'd be apt to have all kinds of hard luck if that fellow stayed here any length of time. I once worked in a New York shop where there was a left-handed barber, and almost every day an accident would happen to some of the others. We told the proprietor where the trouble lay, but as he was not a barber he couldn't understand what difference it made whether a man shaved with his right or left hand.

"One day a runaway horse plunged through the plate glass window and another day a mad dog ran in to the shop, followed by a policeman, who killed the beast under the left-handed man's chair. Without any apparent reason the hot-water faucets would get cold as ice and the razors would refuse to work properly. Customers who for years had been in the habit of getting shaved three or four times a week stopped coming, and it was all due to that left-handed barber. During all the while he was there not one of us won a bet on policy, although the porter used to dream some of the best numbers I ever saw. This fellow I speak of had red hair, and that, of course, made it worse. We finally induced the boss to fire him, and just as soon as he was gone things began to get good again.

"Now, this fellow on the end, who drifted in this morning, looks to be a pretty good barber but just as soon as the boss saw him stop a razor with his left mitt it was all for Julius. In most shops before a new man is hired he is asked whether he is right or left-handed.

"Another superstition among barbers is that they don't want to shave the first customer that comes in on Monday morning. That's a sure sign of poor business all week for the unlucky barber. Of course somebody has got to shave the first man in, but you don't see the barbers rushing madly up to the chair and beckoning to the customer. You'll see one of them go for a drink of water, another is too busy

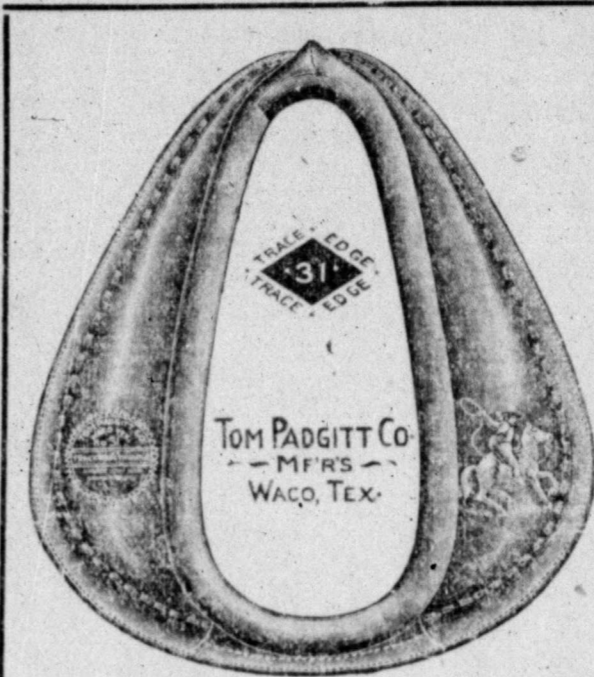

City Council Proceedings.

The City Council met Tuesday night with a full board present. The following business was transacted:

The Marshal's February report was received and ordered filed.

In the matter of making Spring street passable for light vehicles and pedestrians, it was decided to have wagons begin hauling gravel from there and place same upon the streets, and at the same time, it possible, make the street passable.

A fire hydrant that was to have been placed near the residence of Mr. H. Remschel, owing to serious difficulties: one that to put it there it would become necessary to cut the water off from the entire town for at least 24 hours; the other it was found that it would necessitate the tearing up of the lawns of Mrs. Vann and Mrs. Remschel. Permission was given Capt. Schreiner to run the pipe through Barnett street to Clay street and thence up Clay street near the residence of Mr. McClenahan, thus giving the property owners in all direction better fire protection.

The Mayor appointed Jno. C. Graves, G. H. Coleman and Geo. W. Walther as a Board of Finance to inspect the books of the Marshal and Treasurer and for them to report not later than the second meeting of the council in April.

It was stated that the fire company needed assistance in getting a new fire alarm bell and repairing done at the hose station. The council decided to give them the assistance and for the fire company to get a rough estimate of the cost and present it to the council at their next meeting.

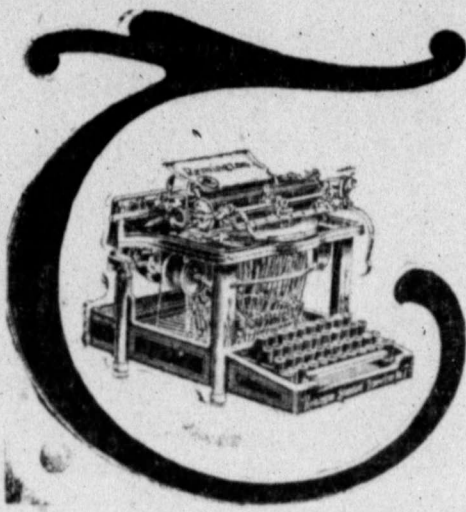

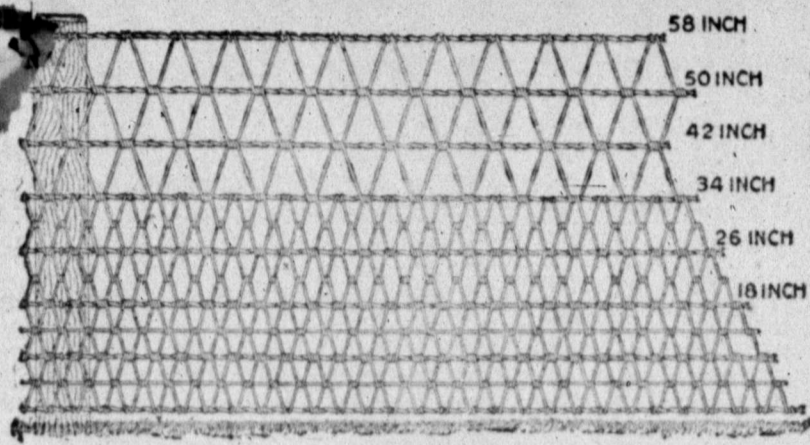

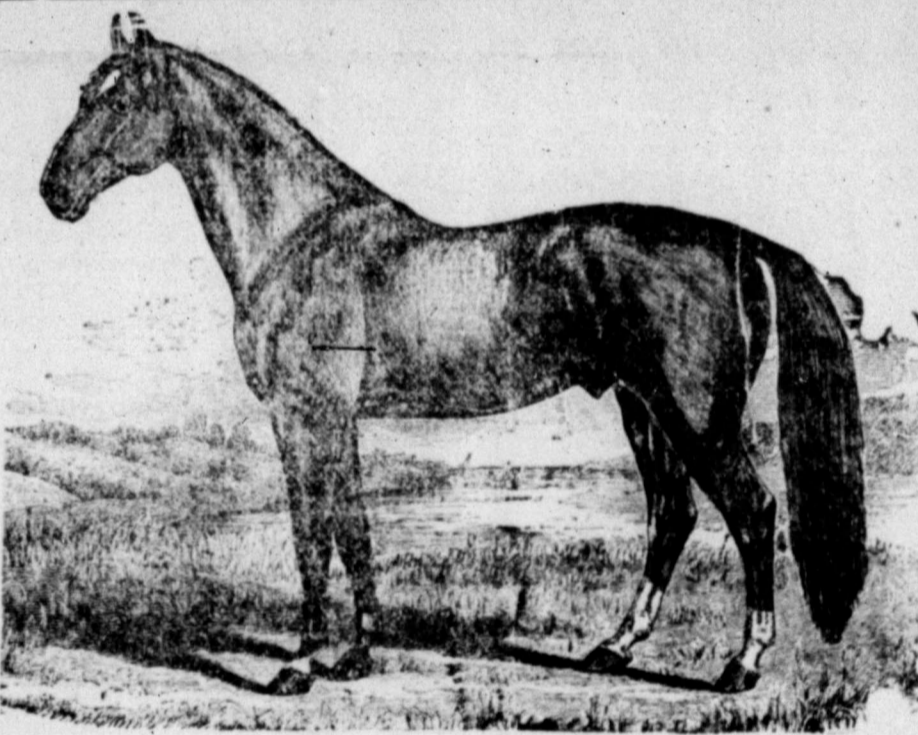
