Austin, April 1.—Well, I have no disposition to work an April Fool trick on the readers of the SUN, but I shall be obliged to write this story on the first of the month or the people will be deprived of the benefit of reading it this week. There has been so little to tell of late that I really did not think it worth while to trouble you about it. In my last story I told you I thought that the legislature would soon enact some revenue laws, well I was wrong about it and did not want to tell it so that is why I didn't write anything last week. The fact of the matter is that there are men here who have been telling the proceedings of the Texas legislature every session for the past ten years, who would not try to predict anything about what they will probably do a day ahead. Now when I came to Austin a fellow whom I thought was authority, gave me a "but in" card and I thought I was entitled to predict as much as I pleased, and indeed I am, but not with any more assurance of guessing the right thing than anybody else. The "August Body" is still grinding away at things the dear people did not know needed being done for Texas until this band of patriots got here and figured out that if they did not get busy at once the grand old state was going to the "Demnition Bow-wows."

The two-wheel mode of paying statesmen is still in vogue here, but there are many of the new members who seem to think that after Easter the old winter suit is too heavy and too warm for comfort, and there is a longing among them for a special session and a five dollar wage scale. The real facts in the case are that the regular session can't get to the appropriations bills and measure.

They have passed all kinds of bills in the past two weeks except the ones that they know must be passed before they can adjourn. Among others they have passed an anti-gambling bill that makes it a felony for a fellow to guess what time it is. I have not heard a man, woman or child say "I'll bet you" anything for a week, and there are enough dominoes out of business in Texas right now to build a six foot wall around the capitol. An anti-gambling law is all right and a good thing but you know that if you stretch a blanket enough it will get mighty thin in places, and I am afraid that this law seeks to

cover so much that it will leak in spots in spite of all the officers and the courts can do. I am not knocking on the law, as a law, but you know reform is a good deal like molasses, it is powerful good stuff, "lasses is," but you can get too much of it on your beard at one time. The thirtieth legislature has undertaken the biggest b'illin' of reform that has ever been cooked in one mess by any legislature in America. If all these regulation laws stick it won't be long until there won't be enough devilment going on in Texas for a fellow like you or I too look good by comparison.

There has been an awful strong tendency in the present legislature to do things too well. The gang went to work to comply with the platform demand for the anti-lobby bill, and they passed one that probably means less than that number of words have ever expressed before in the history of the English language. The anti-pass law was and is the most monumental perversion of a supposed principle that any legislative body in the world has ever perpetrated upon the people. I don't pretend to know what the result of all this radical legislation will be, but I know the people of Texas never contemplated any such an enormous amount of work for their money as they are getting from the men who are now representing them. Every few days I hear some fellow say "I don't think that law will stand in the courts, do you?" Now you just stop and think a moment how ridiculous that sounds. In the first place, neither the man asking, nor the one asked would know a constitutional measure from a copy of the Greek lexicon in nine cases out of every ten, and besides that all people of anything like ordinary intelligence knows that the real finished product from a law factory is the last guess of the supreme court. The worst kind of a law is one like the Terrell election law, having so many little hills and knobs of language and so many new trails across the unexplored "wilderness of talk" that it will not stay con-

Some of the gang over here have been romping on "The Gentleman from Kerr" pretty strong because he said one time he would rather have some people "think" he was a traitor to his party because he did not vote for a bad bill drawn under the guise of a platform demand, than to know of a certainty that he was both a traitor to the interests of Texas and a fool because he did it. Now what I was about to say about platform demands was this. I guess every man in Texas who can read knows that a bill has been introduced to "perfect and simplify" the election law. Before I go any further, I

want to say that I know what a traitor looks like. I've been told a number of times since I've been here, and the other day I went down to the furniture store and looked in a big mirror and blame my hide if I looked any way different from what I did when my mother used to tell me I was honest. If telling the plain, unvarnished truth is treason to party and to the people you write stories for, then I want to be a traitor just once, so here goes. In order for you to fully understand how much the whole scheme of legislation "depends upon whose ox is gored" I will have to repeat here one plank of that sacred instrument, the Democratic platform, which I feel sure that three-fourths of all the Democrats in Texas have never read. "The 12th plank in that wonderfully constructed platform reads: "We expressly demand of the next legislature the enactment of such amendments of the Terrell Election Law as may be found necessary to simplify and perfect the same; and we further demand the adoption of an amendment there to providing for a uniform test, and such an amendment to the election law as will, by blanket primary, enable a majority of the voters of the respective parties to make nominations by direct ballot of the voters without the intervention of conventions."

Now then, go back and read that paragraph down to the semi-colon and make a mark there, because I want you to do a little thinking about it. If there is anything in the platform that the people of this state really clamored for that is it. Everybody agreed that there was something the matter with the election law, and we all wanted it fixed. That is the part of the demand that the people made. Now read the other part of it and see how much real, serious thought you ever gave to the matter of which it treats. Is it not a fact that the thing you and your neighbors wanted done was to shape the election law so you could vote intelligently, and so you could hold elections without the assistance of the attorney general, and without the necessity of bankrupting your county? I think I heard some of you say as much. Is it not also a fact that you did not say much about the part of that paragraph that comes after the semi-colon? Is it not, indeed, true that you had very little concern in the matter of electing candidates, and is it not your opinion that if you had a simple, easily understood election law, one that would secure an honest election, that you would take chances on getting a Democrat to fill offices, and also on getting the particular Democrat that the majority of the people wanted? Now then, I am coming to the meat of the story. You expected the 30th legislature to comply with this particular demand more than any, or all of the rest, didn't you? Well, I am afraid you are going to be badly disappointed. The only bill that has so far come out of the committee on Privileges and Elections is what is known as the James Bill, and treats entirely of the latter part of the plank, which concerns only the politicians of the state. Now, don't misunderstand me, I know politicians are people but they are not all the people, nor all the Democrats. I do think it is a crime for them to look out for the primary law, but what do you suppose the first 28 words of that

plank were put into it for? How do you construe their meaning? Can't you see that the proposed change takes care of the politician and lets the voter go to the devil? Don't this remind you of the fellow who rented a piece of land and was to give the landlord half of the corn raised on it and when he had gathered the crop and put it all into his own crib, the owner became a little bit inquisitive about it, whereupon the renter blankly informed him that he only raised a half crop? The present legislature has put in considerable time on the primary amendment, but the time is short now and I do not think there will be more than "half a crop" raised on the election law this session and that half will go into the politicians' crib. There are a lot of new members here who have figured this thing out, but they have been unable, so far, to persuade the ringmasters in the legislative circus, the men who crack the party whip, to even threaten to beat anybody to death for not enacting into law that part of the plank which effects the "dear people." That reminds me of a story that you have probably heard, how a certain financier said "the people bedammed."

Well, I have done a lot of trouble by telling this story, but I don't know of anybody that it can hurt much except "The Gentleman from Kerr," and I heard him say the other day that if there was no other politics except the kind that made a man a traitor to party platforms, or the betrayal of his own people and the interests of the state, he didn't want to work at it as long as there were any sheep to herd or postholes to dig in Texas.

Pour a few ounces of carbolic acid on the wound and apply a spoonful of Permanganate of potash immediately on the wound, wetting it with carbolic acid. Bind it there if necessary and the work is done and the patient is well.

SAWS WITHOUT TEETH.

According to Cosmos, the employment of circular disks of iron, turning with great velocity, but possessing no teeth on the edge, for sawing metal, has become common in many workshops. Among other places where such saws without teeth are used is the celebrated Krupp gun works, where armor-plate is sometimes cut in this manner. The process is not a newly discovered one. As long ago as 1824 Darrier and Colladon, at Geneva, experimented with swiftly rotating disks of iron. They found that when a disk about seven inches in diameter turned with a peripheral velocity of ten meters per second it could be cut with a steel tool pressed against it, but when the velocity was increased to 21 meters per second the iron was unaffected, but the steel tool was damaged. At a velocity of 60 meters per second the iron disk even cut quartz and agate.

MRS. A. LOGAN DEAD.

End Came at Fort Worth Thursday, March 28, From an Operation.

The many friends and acquaintances in Denton were shocked to hear of the death of Mrs. Logan, wife of Judge A. Logan, which occurred in a sanitarium at Fort Worth Thursday, March 28. Few knew that she was ill and the news of her death came as an entire surprise.

Mrs. Logan was about 48 years old and was born in Bexar county. Her education was begun in the public schools and later she graduated from the State Normal at Huntsville. In 1879 at the home of her parents she was married to Judge Logan. Up until about three years ago they lived in Fort Worth and at that time removed to Denton where they have since made their home.

Mrs. Logan was a member of the First Christian church of this city, and was a conscientious and ardent worker in all church movements. She was president of the Christian Women's Board of Missions and had charge of the primary department in the Sunday school work.

For some time she had been suffering with a fibroid tumor and this week was taken to Fort Worth to be operated on in the hope that she might gain relief. The operation was performed Tuesday evening. On Wednesday afternoon it was seen that there was little hope for her recovery and at 7 o'clock Thursday the end came.

The remains arrived in Denton on the flyer Friday morning and were met at the station by a large number of friends of the family. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. A. Dubber of Fort Worth at the First Christian church. The interment followed at the L. O. O. F. cemetery. Her husband survives her.—Denton Record-Chronicle.

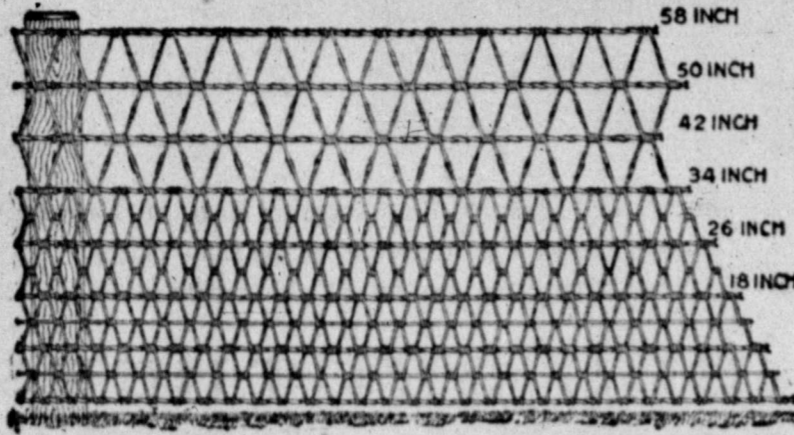

TIVY HIGH SCHOOL

Day after day we hear men regretting that they did not have the advantages when boys that pupils enjoy now. And I sometimes wonder how we who live today amid the luxury of opportunities, will console ourselves when we have grown old and yet fail to become great as others have done who stood side-by-side with us in the same struggle and with the same chance. It is sorrowfully characteristic of too many lives not boastfully successful to comfort themselves, not in lost or wasted opportunities, but in the belief that they never had them. The great trouble is that too many of us are "day dreamers" and not practical thinkers. That man may be greatest whose thoughts and life are in advance of his age, but that man will be most successful—perhaps most useful—who suits his wisdom and knowledge to the demands and circumstances of his times and yet who attempts to fashion them into something better by his intuitive foresight of what is best. The dreamer of rosy dreams may be happy in his solitude, and his soul may be stirred to transports by beautiful visions others have never seen, but he can not in pursuit of phantoms alone be worth much to humanity. I would not magnify the practical life to the exclusion of the aesthetic, for it is sweet to sit alone at night when meaning winds come from the distant fields of sleep and make music in the tree tops near our home; 'tis sweet to watch the queen of night as she climbs the archway of heaven while a myriad of starry fays twinkle in her wake; 'tis sweet to catch the odor of roses from fra-

grant lawns; 'tis sweet to listen to the notes of happy birds as they greet the breaking dawn. But sweeter than all these is the conscious belief that our life isn't being lived in vain, that all our deeds will bring fragrance to the pathway of others and make them sweet to tread, that our comforting words will add a new note of gladness to the song of the human heart.

There are, then, two extreme phases to life—the decidedly practical and the artistically beautiful. But that man's life will be most useful and beautiful who weaves the wool of one and the web of the other into the fabric of his years. We all know it hath been said we must earn our bread by the sweat of our brow, but ah, how much lighter are our toils when the heart overflows with a song of gladness. It is then the business of the teacher to prepare pupils to make the most of life and at the same time broaden their capacity to enjoy what the world has to give in return. In life there are many problems to solve. There is the wisdom of books and that to be gathered from a study of humanity. Happy is the man who can combine the two in his life. So often we forget the one in love of the other. But too many consider neither seriously. I do not believe in too much philosophy as applied to life. It often leads to skepticism. But I do believe that every man should have some definite purpose and ambition towards the accomplishment of which every act and effort of his life should contribute. What have you done today—what have you said—what have you thought—that has made you better or has added anything to your fellow man? How many good books have you read during the past year? How much of them do you

remember as being worth something towards broadening your life? Or do you let the days drift by like a passing fancy and are happy when the night closes about your dreams: In many respects youth is like the mountain stream which rushes on down its steep sides with a heedless murmur. But later it takes its peaceful flow through verdant fields which it bathes with its own waters and in return is breathed upon by the fragrance of flowers, and such should man's life be when he reaches the years of responsibility and usefulness, keeping ever in mind that life will give back to him only an image of what he brings to it.

While the world today is full of allurements and enticements; of "shams and shows," I believe that the complex, social, political and industrial conditions tend to make men and women more thoughtful. These conditions must be met, and men are studying more and more how it can best be done. One encouragement which strengthens our belief is the increased per cent of pupils who continue in school until they graduate. Not only this, but pupils are graduating younger year after year. Even in Tivy High School the average age is much lower than heretofore. This is decidedly so of pupils who have lived in town and have followed the course of study through the different grades. There is a ten years' course of study. Pupils beginning at seven graduate at seventeen. This is young enough for one to graduate in a good High School. Very few fail to pass, and if they do the fault can be easily placed.

AN ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Kerrville, Texas. SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to keep any hogs or pigs penned or confined within the following prescribed limits in the city of Kerrville, Texas, to-wit:

Beginning at Pecan street on the Guadalupe river, thence up Town creek in line with Paschal street to Barnett street, thence down Barnett St. to intersect College St. thence down College street to First street, thence down First street to Ross street, thence down Ross street to B street, thence down B street to intersect A street, thence down A street to a point on the Guadalupe river.

SEC. 2. Any person or persons violating this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be subject to a fine of not less than Five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than Twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars.

SEC. 3. The owner or keeper of such hogs or pigs in said limits, who shall fail or refuse to remove or dispose of the same after notice to do so by the City Marshal, shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each day said hogs or pigs are kept confined in said limits after such notice has been given he shall be subject to a further fine of One (\$1.00) dollar.
