Engineer Falls From Locomotive.

A. F. Haile, a freight engineer on the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio Railway, a resident of this city, fell backwards from the running board of his engine three miles this side of Schulenberg early yesterday morning and was instantly killed.

Pat Sumpson, the conductor of the train, said last night: "The train was going down a grade through a cut, and was running at a very slow speed, the stearm being entirely cut off. Some of the oiling apparatus was out of order and would not work while the steam was on, so Mr, Haile walked ut on the running board to oil the machinery while the steam was off. He evidently fell backwards and struck his head against the embankment, breaking his neck. I do not believe the train was running fast enough to have killed him if he had fallen differently." A special car was furnished by

JOINT RSOLU TION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the

SECTION 1. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Section 9 of Article 8 of the Con-stitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hernafter read as follows:

SEC. 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debts, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not exceed ing fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the hundred dollars valuation, except for payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25, A. D. 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improved ments, not to exceed twenty five cents PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; pro-vided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the coun ty voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fitteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, of the property sub ect to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

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In addition to the foregoing, cities of more than five thousand inhabitants may lay out within their corporate lin its, improvement districts in which they, by and with the consent of a ma jority of the taxpayers owning real es tate therein, may build sidewalks and charge the cost thereof against the abletting property, and may build sew ers and pave streets and charge onethird of the cost thereof against the abutting property on either side of the streets upon which such improvement are made in such district, and the amoun charged against all such abutting prop erty shall be deemed and held to be tax against and a lien upon such abut ting property, and the Legislature i required to enact laws prescribing the means for ascertaining the amoun properly chargeable against each par cel of abutting property, and providing ing for the enforcement of its collection.

STATE CONSTITUTION PROVID-ING FOR THE ESTABLISH-MENT OF A HOME FOR CONFEDERATE WIDOWS.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so is to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation. SECTION 1. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Con. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Con-stitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. 



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
