

"The remark fastened itself on the artist's mind. The death of Christ had appealed to him only as a pictorial tragedy. The divine life of Jesus had never touched him. The ignorant Bohemian girl had presented the subject to him in another way and it would not let him rest till he sought religious counsel, and ultimately became a servant and a worshiper of the crucified.

"Under the inspiration of a new love he finished the picture, and it was hung in the Dusseldorf gallery, with this inscription: "I did this for thee; what hast theu done for Me?" Sometime afterward he met his former model there, weeping in front of the painting. This time he could speak to her as a Christian.

"Master," she said, "did He die for the poor Bohemians, too?" "Yes." And the Man of Galilee had one disciple more. Years afterwards a frivolous young noblebleman looked on the same picture, and the study of it, and the rebuking pathos of its inscription so moved and influenced him that he consecrated himself to the service of God.
