Kerrville Wools.

The fall clip of wool is coming in very slowly. The clip is unusually light. This condition is due to two causes. In the first place the market was rather weak in tone. Then again it has been almost impossible for sheep men to secure shearers. The scarcity of hands is largely due to the fact that a very heavy crop of cotton was grown throughout the State and the prevailing high prices paid for picking has drawn the laboring element away from the ranches to the fields.

Speaking of the wool clip to a Sun reporter Capt. Chas Schreiner said:

"So far we have sold no fall wools. Some representatives of the Eastern wool factors have been sampling the product, no sales have been made. The fall clip is light, but is of splendid quality. Many ranchmen have failed to shear this fall for various reasons, and I expect a record clip next spring."

TAFT WINS.

WILL RECEIVE ABOUT 300 ELECTORAL VOTES.

TEXAS FOR BRYAN. 200,000 MAJORITY STRONG.

CAMPBELL'S VOTE FOR GOVERNOR OR ABOUT THE SAME AS BRYAN'S IN TEXAS.

EVERY TEXAS CONGRESSMAN IS A DEMOCRAT.

REPUBLICANS WIN THREE SEATS IN STATE LEGISLATURE. JULIUS REAL IS ELECTED STATE SENATOR FOR 24TH DISTRICT. TWO REPUBLICAN REPRESENTATIVES ALSO ELECTED.

The best estimate of election results obtainable from the daily press reports show that Wm Howard Taft is elected President of the United States. He has about 300 electoral votes, out of a total of 483—giving Taft a majority of 117 electoral votes.

Texas, as expected, went for Bryan and the democratic ticket, including Campbell for Governor, by about 200,000 majority.

Every Texas congressman is a

democrat, in the 15th district, where Garner was supposed to have some opposition, the result was a most gratifying majority for Mr. Garner.

About 300,000 votes were cast in Texas, although the voting strength of the state is estimated at 500,000.

Uncle Joe Cannon of Illinois, was re-elected. There seems to be some question still as to the political complexion of the next congress.

Julius Real, republican, was elected to the state senate from the (24th district) by a majority of something like 3,000; having carried every county in the district.

Sam O'Bryant, of Bandera county, democrat, was elected representative of the 98th district by a good majority over H. H. McFarland, independent republican. Judge R. H. Burney, independent democrat, was re-elected judge of the 38th judicial district, defeating the democratic nominee, W. D. Love, by more than 2,000.

C. C. Harris, independent democrat, of Montague, defeated the republican nominee, J. J. Starkey, by a majority.

Kerr county would be shown by table on this page, except for precinct officers. A. Karger, commissioner of the first and John Rees, of the second precinct were re-elected. Hugo Wiedenfeld, was elected commissioner in the third, and Gus Sproul, in the fourth. In Justice Precinct, No. 1, E. H. Turner was elected justice of the peace, and Henry Standt, constable. In Justice Precinct No. 4, W. D. McBryde was elected justice of the peace and M. F. Butler, constable.

STATE TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL BOOMED.

Fort Worth, Texas, October 29.—At a conference of leading physicians from all over Texas held here today a movement was launched to secure from the next legislature an appropriation of \$200,000 for a state tuberculosis hospital.

The last legislature was asked to appropriate money for this purpose and the bill came very near passing, being killed only because of the fear of a deficit. It was especially championed by Representative Grinstead of Kerr county, who introduced it, and it had the endorsement of physicians generally.

The campaign started today it is thought will result in success.

Austin, Tex., Oct. 24.—The Interstate Comm. a pro-nomination refuses to change this announced intention of convening at San Antonio on Nov. 17 instead of in Austin, as stated at St. Louis. A telegram was received from chairman Knapp stating that all arrangements had been completed to hold the session at San Antonio, that it was easier to reach from Washington and for other reasons it adhered to its announcement to sit at San Antonio.

KILLED ACCIDENTALLY.

**PROMINENT YOUNG RANCHMAN
LOSES LIFE WHILE HUNTING.**

GIRARD PERIL

UNIVERSALLY LOVED AND RESPECTED WAS FOUND DEAD THURSDAY EVENING IN THE WOODS NEAR HIS HOME TWELVE MILES FROM KERRVILLE.

Deepest gloom and sorrow pervade throughout this section at the accidental and untimely death of Girard Peril, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Peril, whose home is in Gillespie county, twelve miles from Kerrville. News reached this city yesterday to the effect that the young man had been killed while out hunting.

The meagre details we were able to glean before going to press are as follows:

Early Thursday morning the young man left the house for a morning's hunt, and was never seen again alive. About nine o'clock in the forenoon Mrs. Peril heard a shot, apparently near the house. Time wore on, noon came, and still the young man did not return. Some time in the afternoon Mrs. Peril became anxious and sent a man who was employed on the place, to look for her son. The man returned to the house without finding any trace of his employer, but taking one of Mr. Peril's favorite collies with him he returned to search and about sundown the faithful animal located his master's body about a quarter of a mile from the house. The body was lying upon one side of a log and the rifle he had carried on the other. Nothing, of course, can be definitely known of the exact manner in which the young man met death, but all indications are that it was from the accidental discharge of his gun. The bullet took effect in the head just back of the ear.

No sadder occurrence has transpired in this section of the state in recent years than the death of this estimable young man. The funeral took place at the Peril home yesterday afternoon.

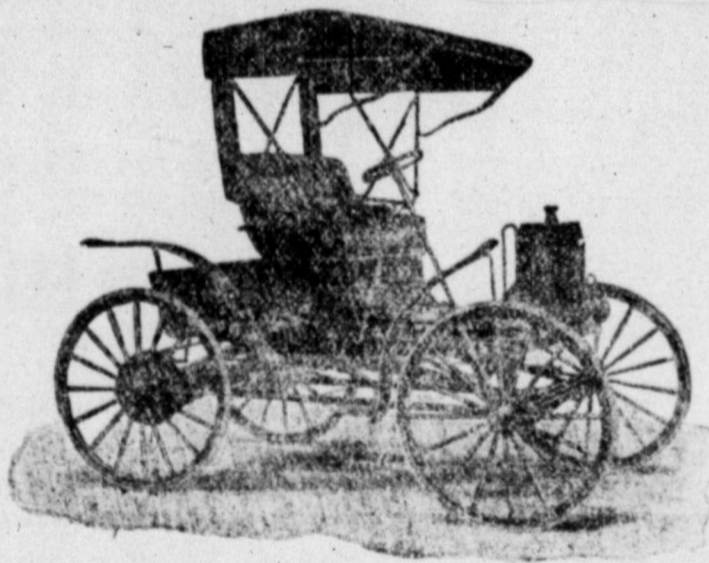

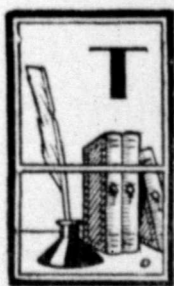

place you occupy can be expressed by deviding the untold billions who have gone before you by the pitiful unit. Your duty is to make the atom you represent as large as possible by making yourself valuable to the community, so that you will get the most possible out of life.
