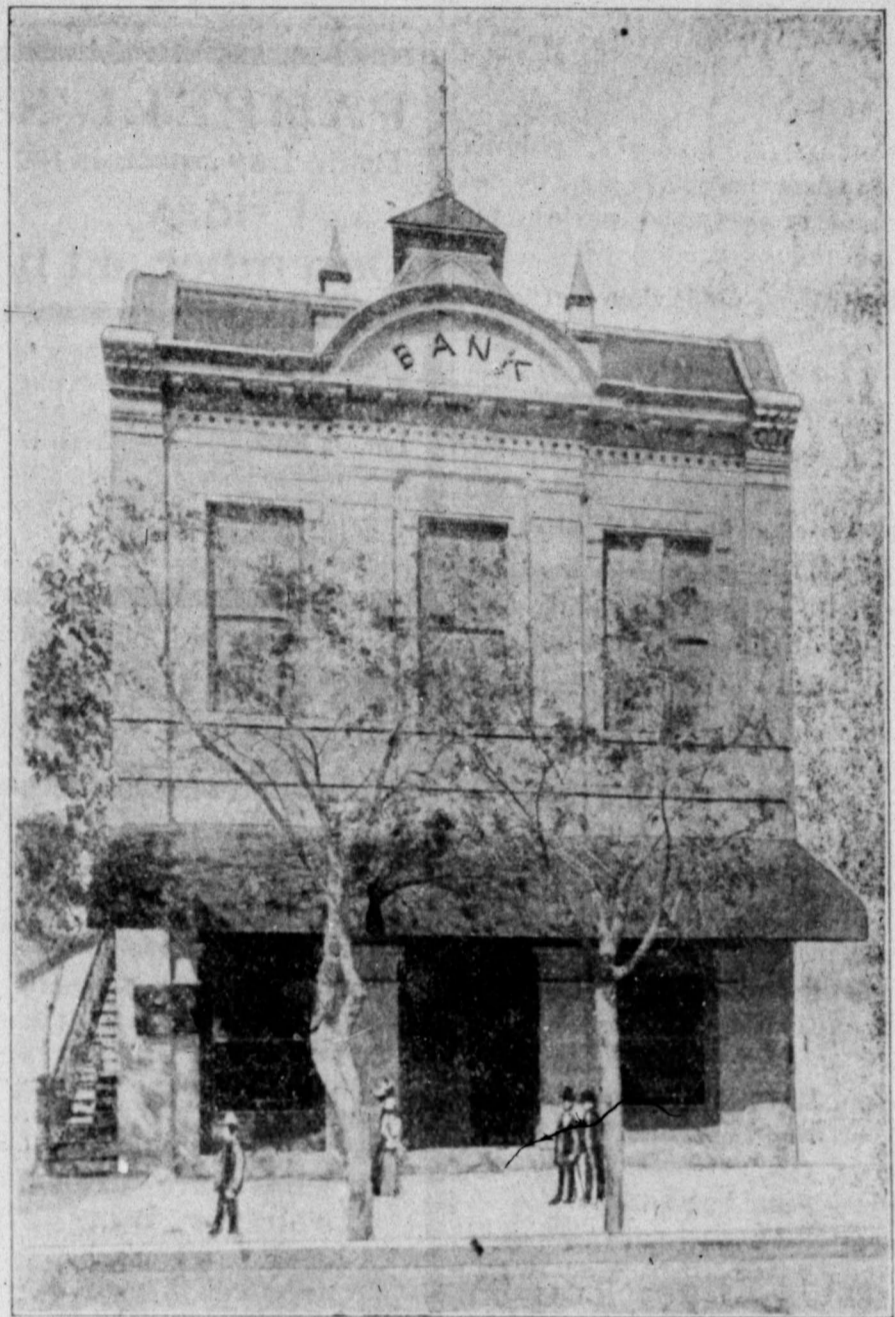
"Jack, do you spose Santa Claus will come to-night?"

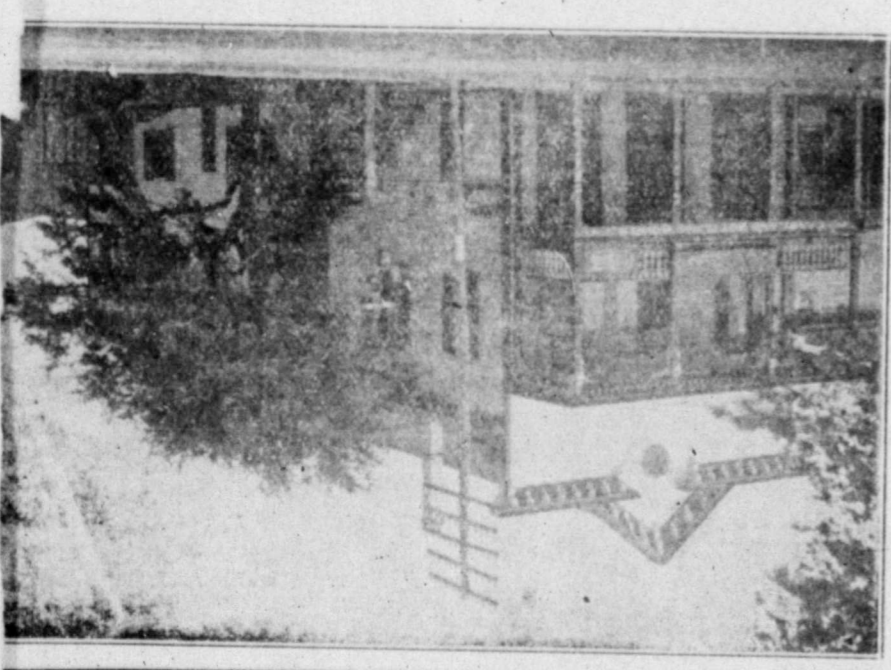

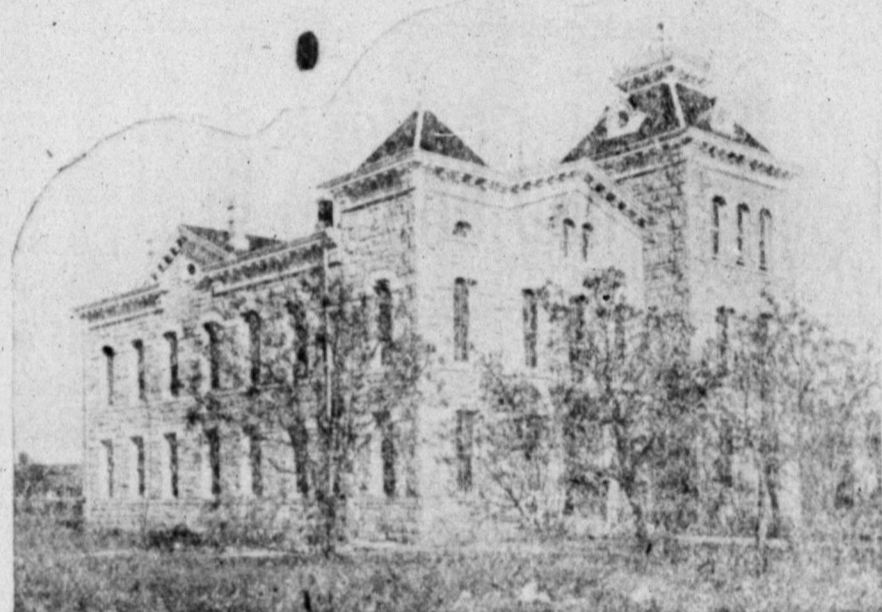
CHANGE OF ADMINISTRATION.

Today the newly elected county officials will qualify and take over the reins of government. There are four new members of the official family. A. H. Moore, who succeeded J. M. Hamilton, as clerk; A. B. Williamson, who succeeds J. L. Vining, as treasurer; Hugo Wiedenfeld, who succeeds Herman Schulze, as commissioner of precinct No. 3, and Gus Sproul, who

Kerr county soon after the county was organized. He has spent his entire life in Kerr county, and is too well known, both as a citizen and a business man to warrant comment by this writer.

A. H. Moore, the county clerk, came to Kerr county from Tennessee in 1895. For several years he taught school, and in 1901 he was admitted to the bar. In 1902

succeeds J. J. Denton, as commissioner of precinct No. 4.

The official family of the county, the "housekeepers" at the court house, for the next two years, at least, are:

Leop. Wallace, county judge; C. C. Lockett, county attorney; A. H. Moore, county and district clerk; A. B. Williamson, county treasurer; J. T. Moore, sheriff and tax collector; F. A. Karger, commissioner precinct 1; John Rees, commissioner precinct 2; Hugo Wiedenfeld, commissioner precinct 3; Gus Sproul, commissioner precinct 4.

There is not among the newly elected officials who needs an introduction at our hands. Those who hold over on re-elections are well known, both personally and officially.

The new treasurer, A. B. Williamson, is a son of Mr. A. L. Williamson, who was sheriff of

Mr. Moore was elected city attorney of the city of Kerrville, and was re-elected in 1904. During the almost fifteen years that he has been in Kerr county he has achieved the popularity that resulted in his election.

Hugo Wiedenfeld, the new commissioner from precinct No. 3, is a son of Theodore Wiedenfeld, who was one of the early pioneers of this part of Texas, founder of the town of Comfort, and at one time county clerk of Kerr county. Hugo Wiedenfeld is a farmer and a man of broad views and good business judgment.

R. A. Sproul, the commissioner from precinct No. 4, is a young ranchman, a Texan and a Kerr county boy, in a word, a man who couldn't have more friends unless he knew more people.

The county's affairs are in good hands, and no one need feel uneasiness as to the public welfare. Among those who go out of office at this time is J. L. Vining, who was defeated by Mr. Williamson for the office of treasurer. Mr. Vining had served two terms and was an efficient officer.

Of all those retiring from office none will be missed more from the courthouse than Jack Hamilton. For fourteen years he has been county and district clerk of Kerr county. During all those years he has had opposition for re-election but few times, and in no contest has the change in efficiency ever been made. Mr. Hamilton retired from the office of his own accord. During his incumbency he served a term in the highly honorable position of president of the State Clerks' Association. To sum up his service and his character—his enemies could never truthfully say aught that impugned, and his friends could not discuss him without saying that which would be flattery if spoken of most men.

The newly organized court will proceed to business. The little ripple that the change has caused is widening and soon the new officers will be old officers. It is the duty of all good citizens, whether they supported the new officials in the recent election or not, to hold up their hands and give them loyal support in the administration of public affairs and the citizens of Kerr county can always be relied upon to do their duty.

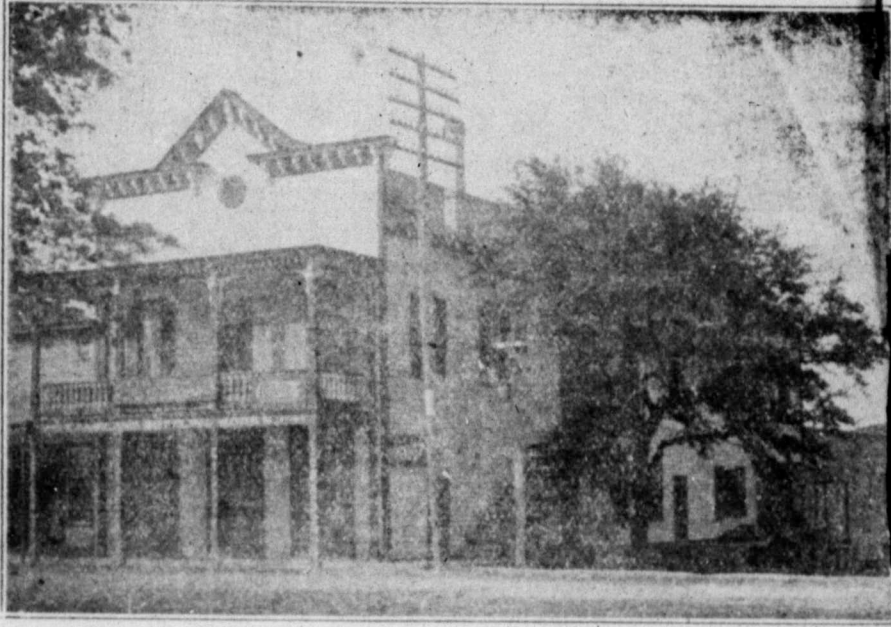
