> Loyd Clark, the eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Clark, of Ingram, died at the home of his parents, Wednesday, January 27, at 3 o'clock p. m. The funeral took place the following day.

About a week before his death the little tellow was hurt while playing at school. Running around the corner of the school house he met one of his playmates and their heads struck together violently. After a short time the little fellow quit complaining of the pain, but a little latter he became seriously ill, and growing rapidly worse, died as above stated.

Physicians who attended him think the shock caused a slight abrasion of the tissues uside the skull, and a slow hemorrage, which caused accumulated blood until compression resulted,

Favorable Reports on Court Bills.

Austin, Tex.-The House Committee on Judicial Districts reported favorably the bill of Mr. Crawford, providing for an additional district court for Falls county.

The Senate bill restoring criminal jurisdiction to the county court of Brewster county reported favorably.

A bill by Mr. Rayburn changing the term of the district court of Fannin county from a term of nine weeks to seven weeks was reported favorably.

Penitentiary Bills Favored.

Austin, Tex.-House Committee on Penitentiaries reported favorably bill by Ralston providing that all convicts shall be returned to the penitentiaries to be discharged. The bill requiring lessees of convicts to work the same at least two days upon county roads of that county was also reported favor-

Fee for Loan Companies.

Austin, Tex .- Senate Committee on Finance Tuesday acted favorably upon Senator Ward's bill providing that \$1,000 shall be the minimum permit fee to be paid by foreign loan companies. The permits of some of these companies are about to expire, and they have signified their intention to quit the state if they have to pay fees under the act passed by the Thirtieth legislature.

Exemptions of Countles.

Austin, Tex.-The House Committee on Counties and County Boundaries reported favorably the bill by Mr. Ballengee exempting Jack county from the provisions of the county road and manner in which the election shall be superintendent law. Much Damage From Wild Animals.

W. P. W. Holmes, whose ranch is on the head of the Frio, in the upper part of Kerr county, was in Kerrville on business Monday, having also brought Mrs. Holmes to the city to spend several weeks with friends here. In discussing the outlook for stock, and general conditions of the ranch business Mr. Holmes said:

"Cattle have stood the winter fine, and are in excellent condition for the time of the year. Goats are also doing well."

Continuing, Mr. Holmes discussed the matter of a scalp bounty law for Texas, and the great loss to stockmen, and indirectly to the state revenues, from the ravages of wild animals. "It is my opinion," said he, "that the loss of taxes on the stock actually killed and destroyed by wild animals, would in an incredibly short time, repay the outlay called for in the scalp bounty bill as passed by the 30th legislature, and vetoed by Governor Campbell. I am pleased to know that there is a strong probability that the present legislature will afford the stock interests of Texas some much needed protection along those lines."


