



The color of red grapes is derived from a compound of tannin present in green grapes of all varieties by the action of the oxygen in the air. This is shown by the fact that when solid matter from unripe grapes of any kind-whether red or green when ripe-is artificially oxidized, as may be done by heating them under pressure with muriatic acid, an intense wine-red color is produced. The coloration seems to depend on the combined action of air, light and heat.
