TELLS OF TEXAS

The New York Commercial, the Most Conservative Newspaper in America, Becomes Enthusiastic

NO PAPER CAN TELL THE STORY

Says That Dignified Journal, But Many Books Would be Required to Perform that Task

In the introductory chapter to his "Tale of Two Cities," describing the period in France just prior to the Revolutions and noting the conditions that then obtained, Dickens says that the industrial and social contrasts of the time were marked and that some of the noisiest enthusiasts of the period insisted that it be received, for better or for worse, in the superlative degree of comparison only. To him who would speak of the great State of Texas as it exists in this year of grace 1909 comes always the temptation to indulge in superlatives, but never so in anything to her detriment—to call her territory the largest, her lands the most fertile, her climate the most salubrious, her forests the most valuable, her scenery the finest, her industries the most diversified, her business the best conducted, her institutions the soundest and most beneficent, herself the best governed, her people the most hospitable, her men the bravest and her women the fairest the sun ever shone on. And when all this, and much more, has been said something very close to the strict truth has been uttered. In fact, whoever "knows his Texas" and knows it right, whether he be a Texan or only a stranger within her gates, is confronted with an "embarrassment of riches" when it comes to talking about her.

Texas, as all the world knows, is territorially the largest of all the forty-six States in the Union. If it should ever want to cut itself up—from which desire may it ever be spared!—it would make two hundred and thirteen Rhode Islands; six States the size of Virginia could be cared out of it, and there would still be enough territory left over to construct another Rhode Island; Illinois, which considers herself "some pumpkins" and with good reason, too, would have to multiply herself by more than four in order to be in the Lone Star class of States; and even New York, the great Empire State of the sisterhood, is only about one-fourth of the size of Texas, no matter how big she may feel. If these comparisons lack impressiveness, let it be mentioned that Texas has two hundred and forty-six counties and in consequence must have more of local government and more politics to the square yard than any other State in the Union—and politics is far from being the worst thing that a State may possess in abundance.

In history-making, Texas is one of the most important and the most romantically interesting sections of the United States. It has been settled only about two hundred and twenty five years. As a state of Mexico it shed its blood for freedom and independence seventy-three years ago—and gained both; and since then it has twice been turned into battlefields and has felt the devastation of war. It has been in the Union only since 1845—about sixty-four full years—and since its first census in 1850, when its population was only 212,592, it had increased its people to 3,018,710 in 1890; and, if the increase since then has been at all proportionate to that of the previous decade, its population by next years census will show up around 4,500,000, possibly 4,750,000; Texas has thus increased its people about twenty-five fold since it was admitted as a state and it is today exceeded in population by only five states in the Union—Illinois, Missouri, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania, with possibly Missouri already dropped out of position and trailing behind the Lone Star. Altogether, a wonderful

VOTE ON THE AMENDMENTS.

The people of Texas will vote on three amendments to the State Constitution next Tuesday, August 3. As a rule citizen say, "Oh, I don't know anything about those matters," and fail to vote. That is not a fair performance of the duties of citizenship.

The people are the State, and the government is theirs. The proper performance of governmental functions requires proper adjustment of governmental machinery. That adjustment can best be made by amending the constitution. In making amendments to the constitution of a State grave errors may occur. It is the duty of every citizen to inform himself on these matters, and to vote according to his judgment. If an amendment is good, it behooves all good citizens to aid in its adoption; if it is bad it is likewise a sacred duty of citizenship to assist in defeating it.

Seemingly, at least, the most important of the amendments to the constitution now under consideration is that regarding public school districts, the chief feature of which is the validating of public school bonds. The free schools of Texas are the bulwark of her strength, the sheet anchor upon which her hope of future political, commercial and social supremacy is based. The stability and absolute validity of the bonded debt of independent free school districts is necessary to their success, and therefore, in our judgment, it is essential to the advancement of educational interests in Texas that this amendment be adopted. The following will give a clear insight into the matter:

Section 3a, Article VII., of the Constitution as it will read if amended:

Sec. 3a. Every school district heretofore formed, whether formed under the general law or by special act, and whether the territory embraced within its boundaries lies wholly within a single county or partly in two or more counties, is hereby declared to be, and from its formation, to have been, a valid and lawful district.

All bonds heretofore issued by any such districts which have been approved by the Attorney General and registered by the Comptroller are hereby declared to be, and at the time of their issuance to have been, issued in conformity with the Constitution and laws of this State, and any and all such bonds are hereby in all things validated and declared to be valid and binding obligations upon the district or districts issuing the same.

Each such district is hereby authorized to, and shall, annually levy and collect an ad valorem tax sufficient to pay the interest on all such bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to redeem the same at maturity, not to exceed such a rate as may be provided by law under other provisions of this Constitution. And all trustees heretofore elected in districts made up from more than one county are hereby declared to have been duly elected, and shall be and are hereby named as trustees of their respective districts, with power to levy the taxes herein authorized until their successor shall be duly elected and qualified as is or may be provided by law.

The other two amendments are in regard to "The Formation and Taxing Power of Independent Free School Districts," and "Authorizing Cities and Towns of 5,000 or More Inhabitants to be Incorporated by Special Act of the Legislature." It is your duty to inform yourself on these matters and to go to the polls and cast your vote either for or against the amendments.

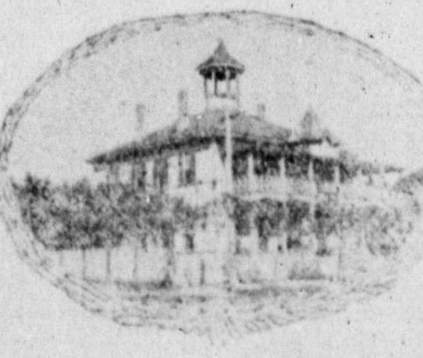



Cuero, Texas, July 28.—Dr. E. F. Jarrell, state veterinarian, after a thorough investigation of reported cases of charbon here, says the deaths of cattle were not due to charbon and no cases of the disease exist in this section of the state.

College Station, Texas, July 28.—Enrollment at noon today at the Farmers' congress was 550. Increased interest is shown this year among the corn growers who have packed the hall. The attendance of the Dairymen's association and the swine breeders is smaller than last year. The feature this year is the increased attendance of ladies. Talk among the delegates and visitors is of poor cotton prospects. Rice growers report serious losses in the recent gulf storm.

New York, July 28.—Tommy Adams, inventor of the rogues' gallery, has retired poor from the police force. He joined the department in 1872 when he was 25 years old. He is broken in health. Superintendent Byrnes placed him on the detective force in 1883. Soon afterward Adams originated the gallery and invented the frame in which the pictures are held. This particular appliance is used in many cities but Adams made little money out of it as the sale was not large.

New York, July 28.—Since the high power wireless station was installed at the Brooklyn navy yards there has been a decided interference with the efficiency of telephone and other wire service in the vicinity. Experts who have been investigating the matter believe that the electric waves sent out from the navy yard wireless station are absorbed to a certain extent by the telephone and other wires carrying the electric currents and that this acquisition of a foreign current has interfered with the wire service. No solution has been found.

This will be a cross-country flight to Alexandria from Fort Myer and return. No other cause than possible unfavorable weather conditions is expected to interfere with the plan for the flight which will probably be undertaken late in the afternoon as has been the custom of the aviator because the wind usually is stilled at about sunset. Yesterday's having been an endurance test, today's will be for speed. The course measures ten miles and lies above hill and dale. For much of the distance it is thickly wooded, offering no landing place for the aeroplane in event of emergency.

Why Not Close Early and Save Money and Men?

What are you doing about this early closing proposition?
Have you thought over it? Are you giving your fellow workers a bit of fresh air or keeping them standing around until you can't decently keep open any longer?

You say the fellow next door won't close early? Well, if you can't get him into an agreement and make him keep it, go ahead and run your own business independently of him. You'll win out. It is usually feasible to get every merchant in your line to sign an early closing agreement, especially in the summer months. It pays more ways than one.

Figure the amount of your summer's business. Is your store ever so busy for twelve hours that you couldn't have handled every customer in eight, if they had been there in time?

You can get them to come in time if you stick to short hours in summer. You don't hear of people quitting banks because they close at 2 o'clock, do you?

Close at 5 o'clock every afternoon, unless local conditions demand your staying open on Saturday nights. In the big cities the department stores are closing at noon on Saturdays, but this is impracticable in many towns especially those where Saturday is "pay day."

You save light bills, and that's no small item. You save men and women, and that's bigger.

The clerk who stands all day on his feet through the hot summer weather—he'll appreciate a chance to go for a trolley ride or a stroll with his wife, a chance to "clean up" before supper and change into different clothes from his working suit. That worn-out saleswoman needs fresh air badly, and she is too tired to go after it after late hours in the store.

And there are other ways you can help your sales-people, too. When it's dull all the afternoon and your force is not all needed, let a fellow off for the ball game sometimes. If you see an especially weary saleswoman, give her a cheerful word and suggest it would be a good idea for her to run out to the park or whatever attractive place your town may offer her.

It will pay you. Fresh and energetic salespeople and bookkeepers are worth more than tired wrecks. They'll give you work and enthusiasm enough to more than repay you. And the beauty of it is that it doesn't cost you one cent.

And here's the point to remember:—while you are closing early and letting your assistants off for fresh air, don't stay in the store and worry yourself into a fever. Get out and see a ball game yourself, take a drive or spin in your automobile if you have one—a trolley is just as good if you haven't. And you'll find yourself feeling a lot better next day.—The Progressive Retailer, Atlanta, Ga.
