Schreiner, was appointed to communicate with the state fish and game commissioner in an effort to secure the appointment of additional game wardens for Kerr county, and to take such other steps as in their judgment is best, in regard to the prevention of the shooting game out of season.

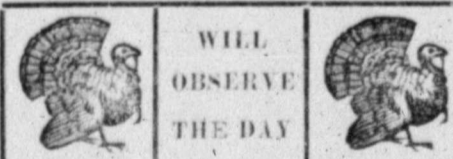
Will Build a New Home.

HORRIBLE TRAGEDY

Kerr County Young Man Loses Life by Frightful Accident

ALEX MOSEL DIES OF INJURIES

Terribly Mangled, Young Man Suffers Intense Agony for Hours Without Help

The death of Alex Mosel, which occurred at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Mosel, near Ingram, Sunday, November 7, was a most tragic one.

The young man, who was about 18 years old, was running a pump-jack on the Schreiner ranch, on South fork. On Friday morning of last week he went to a well at a distance from the ranch house, to begin his work for the day. About 11 o'clock, while working about the machine, the young man got his knee caught in the cogs. He called to the team, but could not stop them. The foot and leg were drawn into the cogs and crushed to the knee. When the large bone, above the knee, struck the cogs, it locked the machine and stopped the team.

The victim of the accident was alone, and no one was in calling distance. He could not extricate himself, and so from 11 a. m. until 5 p. m., he lay imprisoned where he was fount at the latter hour by ranch hands who were passing near the well. It was necessary for the men to take the machine apart in order to remove the terribly mangled limb.

The sufferer was taken to the home of his parents, a few miles from the scene of the tragedy, and physicians were summoned, but the patient was so reduced from loss of the blood, from the shock and long exposure, that nothing could be done, and death came to relieve his suffering Sunday afternoon as above stated.

The funeral occurred Monday from the Kerrville Catholic church and interment was made at Glen Rest cemetery.

IN MEMORIAM

A gentle life, closed by a most cruel and unexpected death, was that of Alex Mosel, who died at the residence of his parents, Sunday, November 7th. Those who knew him best realized how quietly and tranquilly pursuing his way, doing the duties that came to him conscientiously and carefully, in his gentle manner, filling a space, the magnitude of which was never realized until measured by the void caused by his absence.

The funeral took place from the Catholic church, of which deceased was a devout member. Rev. Father Schnetzer preached a sermon, who, in his tribute over the remains, spoke particularly of his beautiful Christian life, and how he was loved by all who knew him. Those consoling words could not help making his sorrowing parents say with resignation, "Thy will be done." A long procession of sympathizing friends followed the remains to Glen Rest cemetery, where the last absolution was pronounced by Rev. Father Schnetzer. "May he rest in peace." A CATHOLIC.

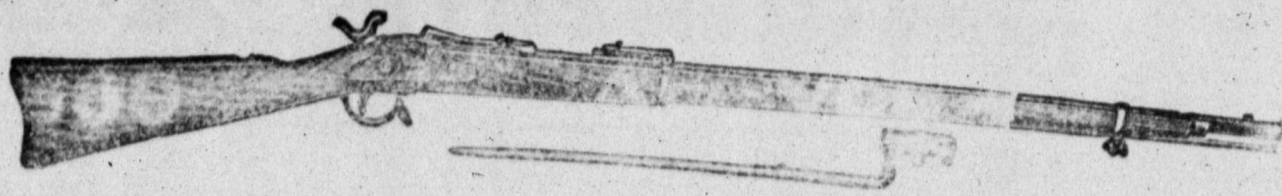

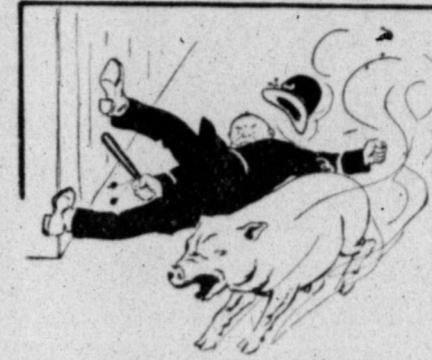

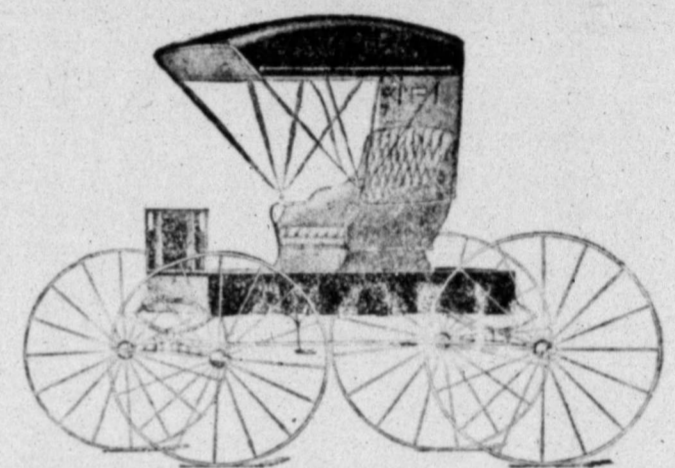

THE PRESIDENT'S FRANKNESS

President Taft is sometimes unconsciously frank in his speeches. He let the cat out of the bag at Seattle when in urging ship subsidies, he said: "Of course, we are familiar with the argument that this would be contributing to private companies out of the treasury of the United States; but we are thus contributing in various way on similar principles in effect, by our protective tariff law, by our river and harbor bills and by our reclamation service." Here you have a frank admission that the protective tariff in effect reaches into the public treasury or into the pockets of the people and takes money for the benefit of private companies. This has always been the contention of democrats but has been strenuously denied by the tariff advocates. But now the high priest of the republican party publicly admits that the democratic view of the case is the correct one.—Fulton, (Ill.)

Mr. Taft has told us nothing new. Some day the people will wake up and realize that they are paying the freight; then they will be like the old maid at the church trial, who said she had been doing more than her share of forgiving.

They are merely the result of Eastern people practicing upon their neighbors, what Taft did to Crane. It don't hurt much to be skinned, but it takes a little time to heat up and hair over.

SOME of the big dailies have recently published pictures of King Menelik, of Abyssinia. We are not personally acquainted with his majesty, but if the pictures are not libel, he ought to be suppressed.

KING EDWARD of England had a birthday Tuesday. He was 68 years old that day. The papers all printed his picture and said, "he has been" a successful Monarch. They don't say when he was a successful Monarch, but we, presume they "mean" that his reign has been, so far successful. Edward of England, as King, has, as far as we are informed, made a very decent figure-head for the British government, as Prince Edward he was a "thoroughbred," an all-round gambler, and roue, and had he been other than a prince, would have been a rake. Kings, Presidents, and all the bunch are just men. Absolute Monarchy and divine right of Kings is a relic of semi-barbarism. The people of the British Empire are, no doubt, less disposed to toady to the king than the people of America are.

AN eminent eastern divine use to tell in the pulpit that he never saw a convict but what he was constrained to say to himself, "There, but for the grace of God, goes I." The revelation of cruelty and heartlessness coming to light in the investigation now under way of Texas penal institutions savor more of the 18th than the 20th century. Strange that the idea has never occurred to some philanthropic millionaire to endow a school for the enlightenment and civilization of convict guards and keepers.

ONE question that ought to concern the mothers full as much as "Where is my wandering boy tonight?" is "Where is my gadding girl tonight?" True it is that girls from sixteen years old have altogether too much liberty and are allowed to roam the streets day and night, thrown often into bad company and contaminated by evil associates.—Fulton (Ill) Journal.

THE penitentiary investigation will no doubt disclose the fact that the facilities of the State of Texas for properly handling its convicts, are inadequate. Both sides of the controversy will make statements that they will later be ashamed of. Governor Campbell's statement that in his opinion "there is not the least abuse existing in the penitentiaries," is ridiculous. There is not a penal institution in the world, we believe, in which abuse is not committed. A man who accepts the position of convict guard is usually of such a character that a little authority deprives him of his reason and judgment. The modern idea of State's prisons is that they are a place in which to confine bad people in order to restrain them from making abrasions of the law and of the rules of society. The penitentiaries of Texas are, no doubt, as far behind modern ideas upon the subject of penal servitude, as their capacity and equipment is short of the present demand.

There is, no doubt, ample need of prison reform in Texas. There can be no doubt that Governor Campbell knew that to be true when he made his ridiculous statement. On the other hand, there is a certain element of the press and the people, that unless they have a care, will go to the other extreme in the premises.

It is a peculiarity of history, that no great reform has ever been accomplished without the reformers going to extremes that appeared absurdly ridiculous to those who lived a century later.

As a democrat who voted for Mr. Taft, Mr. Crane, the near-minister to China, probably thinks that he deserved better luck.—Fulton, (Ill) Journal.

Mr. Crane got just what was coming to him. The man who turns his political coat to secure office, is not entitled to consideration and he seldom gets it.

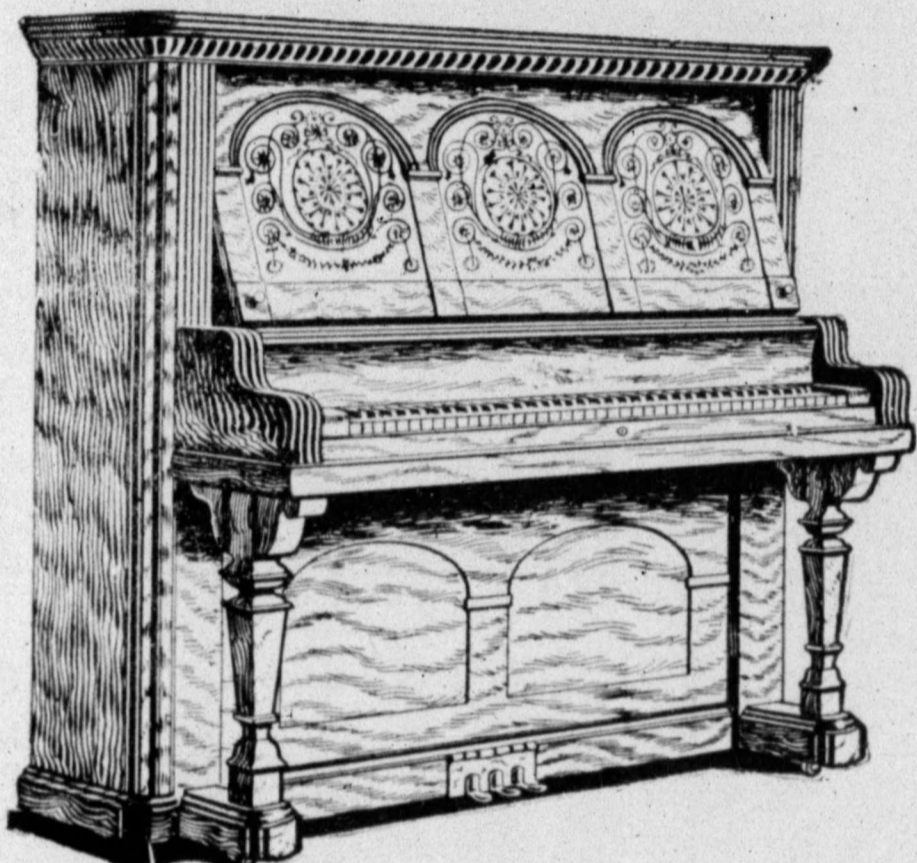

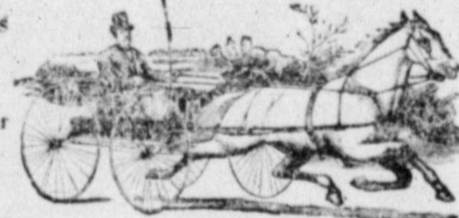
