DAVIDSON ANNOUNCES

Attorney General Issues Formal Statement That He Will be in Race for Governor to Finish

OPPOSES STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION

But Favors the Submission of a Prohibition Amendment to the Constitution of Texas

Austin Tex., Nov. 15.—After a conference with his friends and office assistants tonight, Attorney General Davidson prepared and promulgated an address to the Democracy of the State announcing formally his candidacy for the Governorship. At the same time, Mr. Davidson declares that he will resign the office he now holds January 1, to attend to his candidacy, basing this decision upon the broad proposition that he cannot consistently "eat the people's bread and not give a fair return in honest service."

Mr. Davidson announces against State-wide prohibition and in favor of submission, but more important far is his sturdy declaration for the promotion of the State's vast industrial and commercial resources, and the announcement in favor of the administration of the State's penal institutions upon a basis of broad humanitarianism. The Attorney General's address, in part, follows:

WITHOUT RESERVATION.

In view of what I believe to be a wide-spread demand I now make this definite announcement of my candidacy for the Democratic nomination for the office of Governor of Texas.

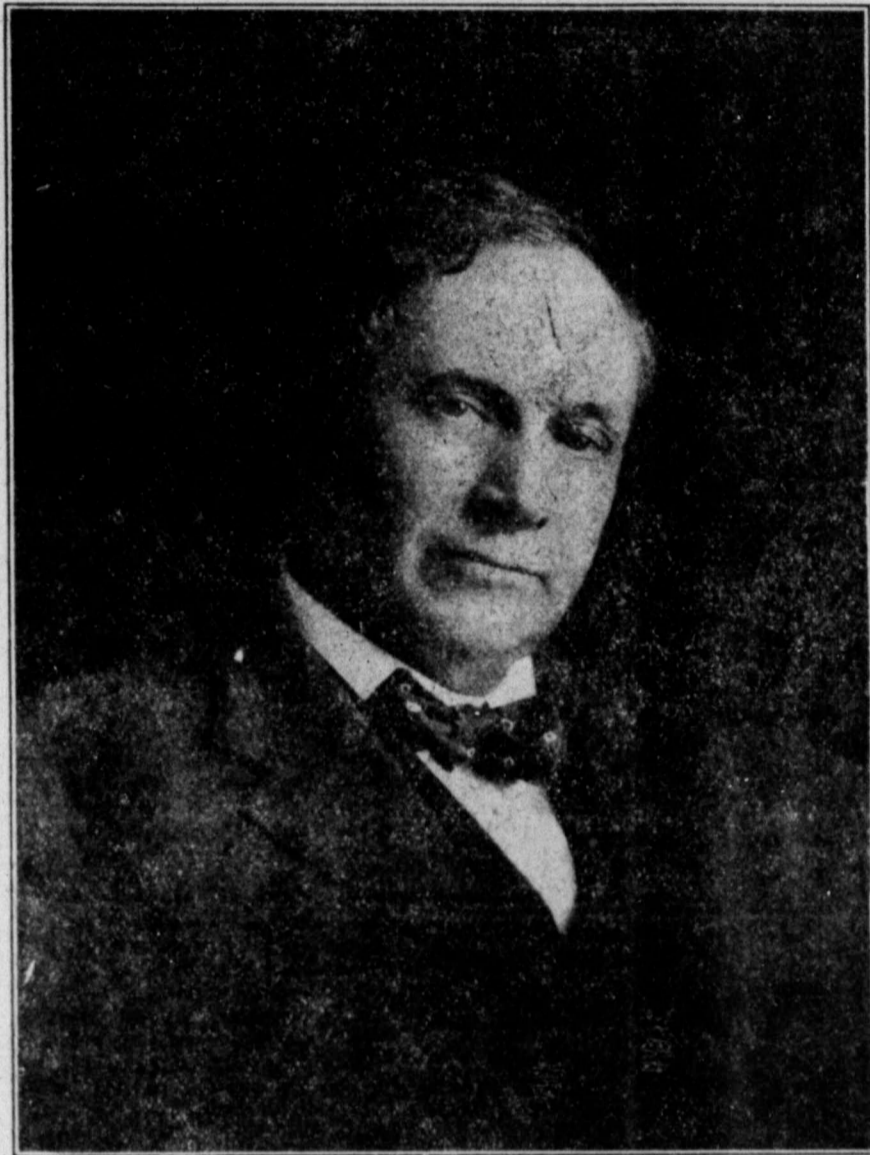
I enter the contest free from any ill feeling and with good will towards the distinguished gentlemen who laudably aspire to serve you as Governor. My announcement is made without any reservation. I am in the fight to a finish, feeling assured that the principals of sound government which I shall advocate will meet with the approval of the Democracy of Texas.

I have given no public expression upon political questions for the reason that I did not believe it was the wish of the people to become embroiled in a political campaign a year in advance of the election, and for the further reason that the duties of my official position have been such that I did not feel that I could, with fidelity to the people's interests engage in such a campaign.

I shall not become the candidate of any ring or faction, nor shall I predicate my candidacy upon any single idea or issue, but regarding every section, I confide the fortunes of my candidacy to the great masses of freemen and sovereign citizenship who cannot be herded and delivered to any man.

NOT A CANDIDATE OF ONE IDEA.

Texas has immense and varied inter-

ests of a commercial, industrial, economic and moral nature, and the man who ignores any of her vital interests and bases his claim to political preferment upon a single idea, whatever that idea may be, does not comprehend either the importance of the office he seeks or the needs of the people.

Among the many important subjects which should receive our careful consideration at this time may be mentioned:

1. The proper care and support of the veterans of the Civil War, and the establishment and maintenance of a home for their wives and widows, and women who aided in the Confederacy. We have a great State, rich beyond imagination, and it is not only our duty but should be the earnest desire of all our people to provide more liberal allowances for the support of these heroic men and women who sacrificed so much for their country's cause.

2. The enlargement and improvement of our eleemosynary institutions, and suitable provision for the care and treatment of tuberculosis patients and the eradication of that dread disease, which is making such inroads upon the health and happiness of our people.

NO MENTAL RESERVATION.

I believe that it is contrary to the fundamental principles of democracy to say that a public official has a right to accept a position of public trust with a mental reservation that the will of the people shall be carried out only so far as it meets with the approval of his conscience. Such doctrine is subversive of representative government and is destructive of a pure democracy, which is a government "of the people, by the people and for the people."

If the platform of our party is not binding upon our public servants then the assembling of the party's representative in a convention to frame a platform is a travesty and a farce, and the pledge of such a platform is a fraud and a delusion. Why the necessity of enacting political platforms if they are not binding upon those charged with the duty of carrying them into effect? If such platforms are to be honored more in the breach than in the observance then we should dispense with them altogether and leave our public servants to conduct the affairs of this State according to their own wishes rather than in obedience to the conscience of the whole party as reflected in its platform.

To disregard the solemn commands and instructions of our party is to strike a blow at party integrity and destroy the confidence of the masses who hold allegiance to that party. Every special

interest in this State desiring legislation through which it may enjoy some special advantage to which it is not entitled endorses the abhorrent doctrine that a public servant may, with impunity, repudiate and defy the expressed will of the party.

Every lobbyist who plies his nefarious trade is strongly in favor of the right of repudiation. Every unholy alliance that is in conspiracy against the people's interests stands for the right of repudiation of the party's demands. The conscientious public servant whose heart beats in sympathy with the masses is willing to obey the instructions which they give him. He realizes that he was not elected to carry out his individual views, but that he holds his commission as the people's representative and is under a solemn duty to carry out his instructions, unswayed by a single act of repudiation. This is the people's government and they are entitled to have its affairs administered as the majority may decree.

BELIEVES IN LOCAL OPTION.

Individually, I do not favor State-wide prohibition. I believe that the local option system provided by our Constitution, where by any county, justice precinct, city or town, may determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited within such districts, is a wiser policy than the enactment of State-wide prohibition when many sections of our State by large majority of their people do not desire it. This view has been a life-long conviction. A large portion of our State has already adopted local option and now enjoy the benefits of prohibition just as completely and just as effectively as if State-wide prohibition were in force. Local selfgovernment has ever been one of the fundamental and cardinal features of a Democratic form of government. Many of our most eminent men, differ widely on the expediency of the party undertaking to establish such legislation when such a large percent of the people object to it and when they have a remedy at hand which seems to be a most satisfactory one.

If elected Governor of Texas I here and now pledge myself to carry out the will and expressed wish of my party on that as on all other issues. If we are to recognize the right of a majority to control the affairs of the Democratic party, then we must acquiesce in the result of their will solemnly expressed. For this reason I am in favor of the Legislature submitting a constitutional amendment on the question of State-wide prohibition. The mere fact that I am individually opposed to adoption of

such an amendment affords no sufficient or logical reason why I should oppose the right of the people to pass upon the question.

LIGHTFOOT NEXT IN OFFICE

AUSTIN, Texas, November 15.—Attorney General Davidson's announcement that he will resign January 1 to attend to his campaign for Governorship, directs speculation to the probable successor for his unexpired term.

It is regarded as a foregone conclusion that Jewel P. Lightfoot will be appointed to succeed his present chief.

There is but one other person who is regarded as a possibility, and that is Felix J. McCord, Assistant Attorney General. But it is probable that Mr. McCord, who is a candidate for the seat on the Court of Criminal Appeals to be vacated by Judge M. M. Brooks, will prefer to continue his race for that office, and thereby eliminate himself from consideration.

Mr. Lightfoot is notably a favorite of the executive office and is universally regarded as one of Texas' most brilliant sons. His candidacy for the Attorney Generalship will receive powerful impetus should he be appointed to General Davidson's unexpired term.

Death of W. G. Prisch.

W. G. Prisch, who came to Kerrville about two years ago from Minnesota, in quest of health, died at his home on Main Street, Saturday, November 13. The funeral took place from the Baptist church the following day, Rev. H. B. Clapp officiating.

AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE, prescribing and defining the fire limits within the City of Kerrville, and to regulate the erection, enlarging and repairing of buildings, tents, and other structures within said limits and prescribing penalties for the violation of the provisions thereof.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Kerrville:

SECTION 1. That the following shall be and are hereby declared to be the fire limits of and within the City of Kerrville: Beginning on the Guadalupe River at A Street, thence up A Street to North Street, thence south on North Street to College Street, thence up College Street south to Barnett Street, thence northwest on Barnett Street to Hays Street, thence southwest on Hays Street to the Guadalupe River opposite Hays Street, thence down the Guadalupe River to the place of beginning.

SEC. 2. Within the fire limits designated in Section 1, above, it shall be unlawful for any person to erect any building, tent, or other structure whatever with lumber, cloth, or other combustible material, or to repair or make addition to any building or other structure already erected to the extent of twenty-five per cent of the value of said original building, said valuation to be determined by the Building Committee, with lumber, cloth, or other combustible material, without first securing the permission of the City Council of said City of Kerrville; provided, that the premises shall be first inspected by the Building Committee, and permission, if any, then granted by said City Council; provided, however, that no permit shall be granted for any such building, repairs, or addition until plans and specifications for such building, repairs, or addition have first been submitted to said Building Committee and by them approved, and the person or persons granted any such permit shall conform such building, structure, repairs, or addition strictly with plans and specifications so submitted and approved. Any person who shall within said fire limits set out in Section 1 hereof, above, erect, repair, or add to any building, tent, or other structure or begin to erect, repair, or add to any building, tent or other structure without complying with the provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of an offense and shall be punished therefor by a fine of not more than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars and not less than Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars and each and every day he continues to erect, repair, or add to such building, tent, or other structure, or allows the same to remain, contrary to any of the provisions of this Section shall constitute a separate offense.

TERRIBLE TRAGEDY

Will North Age 26 Years, Kill While
Hunting Last Sunday

MISTAKEN FOR DEER

His Companion Shoots Him With
Fatal Effect—Death Occurred
Wednesday

It seems that this section of the country must each year furnish its quota of fatal accidents to hunters. On last Sunday Will North a young man, 26 years of age, was fatally shot by his companion, Henry Summers, while out hunting, death resulting from the wound on Wednesday.

The fatal accident occurred in the following manner: The two men went into the woods early Sunday morning to hunt deer. About nine o'clock, while the men were together, they saw a trail deer track. Their dog took the trail, which led down into a canyon. Young North had no gun, so he went with the dog down into the canyon to run the deer out. Summers stayed on the hill, and ran to place at the head of the canyon where he thought the deer would pass. He fired, and was horrified at the cry of his companion whom he had shot.

The wounded man was taken to the home of his foster father, J. A. Rawlings, and physicians summoned. It was found that the ball had entered the left breast passing through the lung just below the heart and coming out at the back. All possible attention was given the sufferer, but of no avail, and death resulted as above stated.

The funeral took place at the Nichols burying ground, near Ingram, Wednesday afternoon.

Decensed is survived by a wife and three children. The entire community is shrouded in sadness at the death of an estimable young man just on the threshold of life, while the unfortunate young man who inadvertently caused his death, is prostrated with his burden of sorrow and unavailing regret.

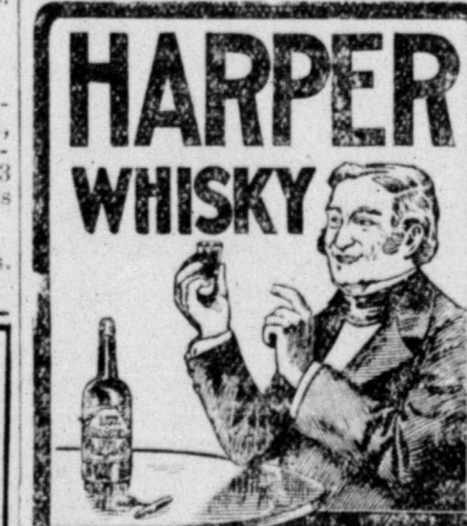

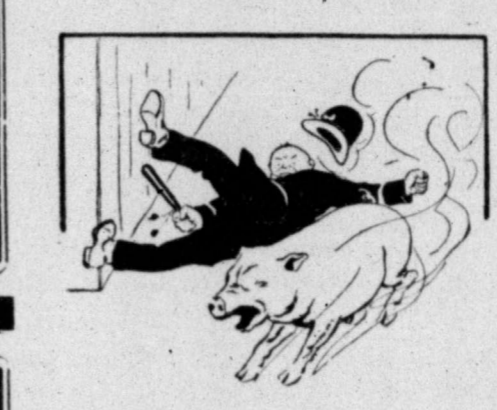

DAVIDSON FOR GOVERNOR

In its issue of April 24, last, THE SUN, under the above heading formally nominated Robert Vance Davidson as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor of Texas. On the 15th instant Mr. Davidson issued a statement declaring himself a candidate for that honor. The attorney general states, also, that he will resign from that office on January first, because he does not think it just and fair that he eat the peoples' bread while looking after the matters pertaining to his candidacy.

Robert Vance Davidson is the logical candidate of the Democratic party for Governor of Texas. He is pre-eminently the best qualified man in the state for the position. His fidelity to public trust while attorney general of Texas has not been excelled by that of any official in the history of the state. Among the reasons why the people of Texas should honor Attorney General Davidson by making him their chief executive, are these two, which are sufficient in themselves:

1. He has never betrayed a public trust.
2. He has made Texas the best attorney general in the history of the state, with the possible exception of James Stephen Hogg, is a lawyer of unquestioned ability and is therefore eminently qualified for the office of Governor.

We know that the announce-

ment of Mr. Davidson is the signal for the beginning of the fray. It has never been the custom for this paper to "lay down" when there are things doing. When we announced for Mr. Davidson last spring, we felt that he was entitled to be governor of Texas, and believed he would be. We shall not change until the primary is over and we are permitted to celebrate, or the other fellow say, "I told you so."

LYNCHING

We are to presume that the actions of all courts, and especially of the federal courts, and other high tribunals of the land, are correct in their findings, but some decisions call forth question in the minds of the people. The United States Supreme Court, on the 15th inst., imposed a sentence of ninety days in jail upon Captain Joseph Shipp, for contempt of court, charging that Shipp, while sheriff at Chattanooga, Tennessee, in 1906, did not prevent the lynching of a nigger, who had been tried for the most heinous crime that can be committed, found guilty, and sentenced to death, but whose sentence and execution had been staid by said supreme court. The contempt, it appears, was not in permitting the lynching, per se, but in permitting the mob to take the law into its hands, after the highest tribunal in the land had consented to hear the cause.

There can be no doubt that insubordination must be punished, or there would be no observance of law. After the Supreme Court had decided in March, 1906, to hear the case, it was no doubt the duty of inferior courts and their officers to respect that decision. But the question that arises in the minds of the people, is, why should the supreme court hear such a case? Again, why was this aged Confederate veteran held responsible for the actions of a mob that no power on earth could have restrained? In its findings the court is reported as quoting a part of a statement made by Captain Shipp and published, as follows:

"The people of Hamilton county were willing to let the law take its course until it became known that the case would not probably be disposed of for four or five years by the supreme court of the United States, but the people would not submit to this, and I do not wonder at it."

In these few words, quoted from the remarks of the veteran sheriff, is the complete text of the reason for the prevalence of lynching in the South.

When a man, black, white or intermediate in color, is convicted of that crime by the district court of any state, there is little warrant for continuances, rehearsals and

appeals. The dallying of the courts of the South gave rise to the most unhappy and unfortunate custom of lynching. It began at a time when justice, in the South, was dispensed by carpetbaggers whose idea of loyalty to the federal government was to uphold a nigger against a southern white man, no matter what might be his offence. Complaints may be lodged against southern citizens for lynchings. Fines may be imposed and punishments inflicted, but the fact remains, incontrovertible, that the custom of lynching had its inception in the dilatory action of the courts at a time when they were no protection to southern white people against the crimes of niggers, and the continuance of lynchings, even at this time, is largely due to the fact that due dispatch is not had in such matters.

WELL! Guess that Billion Dollar Trust formed by the telephone and telegraph people will put it up to some other concern to raise the stack a little bit higher. That's about the biggest yet, isn't it?

H. CLAY PIERCE is said to be sore at Texas because of the enforcement of the anti-trust law. Away back in the frontier times we can remember when horse-thieves who were overtaken by officers sometimes became angry and killed the officers.

H. CLAY PIERCE says if Texas does not quit enforcing the law it will have a bad effect on foreign capital that might come here to invest. There is no danger of honest capitalists becoming frightened. We don't want any more dishonest ones.

SPEAKER JOHN MARSHALL, of the 31st legislature, says he cannot afford to neglect his business to serve his people in that capacity. Mr. Marshall is right. No honest man can afford to serve in the legislature, if he is dependent upon his own exertions for a living. Every time a man is elected to the legislature he makes a sacrifice that is never appreciated by his constituents.

THE passing of Dan Stuart, who died in New York on the 14th inst., recalls the notoriety of that sportsman in connection with the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight, which Governor Charles Culbertson called a special session of the Texas legislature to prevent. Stewart was born in Vermont in 1857. His real name was not Stewart, but Meehan. He ran away from home when 12 years of age, on account of punishment inflicted by his father, and changed his name in consequence of his rebellion against paternal authority. Dan Stuart was known throughout the United States as a "square" sporting man.

Hooks, eyes, strings, little bits one way, little bits the other way, like the rigging of ships—those Turkish ships with many small sails that go up the Bosphorus, you remember? And it is all behind, as if one had no front! Gula knows how it is done. But if I were alone, without her help, Allah is my witness, I would tie the things all round me decently and sit very still for fear they should come off! That is what I should do!"
