## PURDY GETS LIFE SENTENCE

Slayer of M. F. Butler Gets 99 Years in Penitentiary

## JURY OUT TWO HOURS

And Uvalde Citizens Find Verdict and Fix Punishment.

The case of the State of Texas vs John Purdy came on for trial in the District Court at Uvalde, Monday. The trial consumed only two days, and Tuesday night the jury rendered a verdict of guilty, and fixed the punishment.

Purdy is a nigger who shot and killed M. F. Butler just outside the city limits of Kerrville in September of last year.

The case was set for trial at the January term of the Kerr county District court, and was transferred to Uvalde on a change of venue.

This case has caused considerable bitter feeling, and a lynching was narrowly averted when the killing occurred.

### Died

Mrs. Willie Burks died at her home ten miles from Kerrville, Sunday, April 10th. The funeral took place the following day from the home, and interment was made at the Turtle creek burying ground.

Decedent was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Norwood, and had spent her life in the community where she died. She was prominent in church and social circles and greatly beloved by her family and friends.

### Gets Bad Cut

Aimee Real, of Turtle creek, was here Wednesday. While stretching a barbed wire fence Tuesday, the wire broke and cut three ugly gashes in Mr. Real's right hand and he came to Kerrville for medical treatment. Although the wounds are painful, they are not serious.

### County Teacher's Reading Course in History of Education

Acting under instructions from State Superintendent F. M. Bralley the work for the Summer Normals has been outlined to cover a study of Grecian and of Roman Education. For this reason the committee has thought best to confine the course for the county teachers to these two periods.

The history of a people largely determines its educational character and principals. For this reason a brief History of Greece and of Rome should be studied first, then the lives of Socrates, Plato and of Aristotle, also of Cicero and Seneca. Special time and attention should be given to Plato's Republic. Grecian and Roman Education should be studied in parallel, making comparisons and noting differences and attempting to account for them.
