**A SANE ELECTION**

Every man in Texas, who is a candidate for a big job, was at Galveston last week to assure the labor organizations that he was ready and willing to die for the laboring man. The "labor vote," that is so much talked and written of, is not a "solid block" proposition, as it once was. The last decade has witnessed the final emancipation of the American laboring man. He is an intelligent, fearless citizen, who does his own thinking and votes his convictions. Texas has never had an election in which so much intelligent voting was done, as will characterize the 1910 elections. The partisan press and the political mountebank have been making frantic efforts for some time to secure a "line up" of different factions, but at this date no such result is in evidence.

The people of Texas are at last beginning to realize that merit should win in a political contest, and that the seeker of public office who attempts to exploit factional quarrels, to his own political aggrandizement is not worthy of confidence. A month ago there was talk of combinations, of

what this, that and the other faction in the Texas political field would do, but; as time passes the probability of a factional "knock down and drag out" over the governor's race becomes more remote. Those who had hoped to win in the heat of such a disturbance in the social and political world of Texas, are each day becoming more and more unhappy. Few people will refuse in the coming election to vote for a man of high character and evident ability, merely because there are some matters upon which the two do not agree. It is time for Texas to have a sane election, and we trust and believe it will happen this year.

**Texas and Southern Cattlemen Get Good Market. While the Hog Market is Threatened With the Toboggan.**

Kansas City Stock Yards, April 18, 1910.—A big drop in cattle receipts last week after Tuesday proved good tonic for the market, and the loss of the first two days was more than recovered by the close of the week on everything except heavy steers, but they also made some gain, 10 to 15 cents. Quarantine arrivals last week here amounted to 105 car loads, previous week 32 cars, same week last year 102 cars. The feature last week was the sale of a shipment of South Texas cattle, from vicinity of Hempstead, containing the top steers of the week, at \$8.00. The cattle run here today is moderate at 7000 head, and only 19 cars of quarantine cattle are included today. All the markets are moderately supplied with cattle today, with the single exception of Chicago, where the run is excessive, and prices there are 10 to 15 lower, whereas the market here is an anomalous condition in the cattle trade, and will no doubt be collected before the end of the week, with a better distribution of receipts. The quarantine supply today was chiefly Oklahoma fed

steers, ranging in price from \$6.85 to \$7.75, and in weight from 970 to 1225 pounds. Choice heifers were included today at \$6.15 and \$6.50, cows at \$5.50, bulls at \$5.40 and veal calves, at \$7.75, the offerings being well finished in each class. Medium to common South Texas grass steers sold here last week at \$5.20 to \$6.30. Rumors of prospective importation to this country of beef from Argentina and of mutton from Australia, in an effort to lower cattle and sheep prices are causing some comment, but are not regarded as an imminent danger to American producers.

The hog market is about \$1.50 lower today than the best time a few weeks ago, including a loss of 25 to 35 cents today. The decline last week was 75 cents per cwt., and traders feel themselves slipping today when they contemplate the market prospects for the balance of this week. Packers have the upper hand, and promise to do all sorts of things to the hog market right away, and if the big break starts a flood of hogs to market they will accomplish the big end of their purpose. The run last week was 51,000 head here, same week last year 58,000, the smallest decrease from last year of any week since the first of January. ## Minute Measurements.

Because the balance wheels of watches expand and contract with changes of temperature they run slower and faster, according to circumstances. By making them of different kinds of metal, having different degrees of expansion with increase of temperature, the effect of their changes on the running of watches may be almost entirely eliminated.

But in dealing with such a problem it is necessary to know the expansibility of the metal employed.

A means of measuring it is furnished by an instrument called a dilatometer, in which a system of delicate levers or a chain of gear wheels magnifies the motion of a pointer over a graduated scale hundreds of times. At a meeting of the Physical Society in London not long ago a dilatometer was exhibited which had a magnification of 1,500 times, so that the change in the length of a piece of steel caused by a single degree of rise or fall of temperature was clearly measured by it.

## Unwarranted Assumption.

A youth from the Horton neighborhood went to Nevada and got a marriage license. He supposed he was the girl's first choice, although he had never come to any definite understanding on the subject. The Sunday following the purchase of the license the couple went to church, and during the progress of the service the young man unfolded the certificate and, showing it to the girl beside him, said: "Let's go up after the preacher gets through and get married." The young woman was so shocked that she could not speak for a few moments. Then she told him he had spent his money foolishly and asked that he never speak to her again. The sympathy of the community is divided.—Kansas City Star.

### HOME COUNTY OF R. V. DAVIDSON ISSUES ADDRESS TO THE DEMOCRATIC VOTERS OF TEXAS
