**Will Be Candidate for the Democratic Nomination for State Senator for 24th District**

Carlos Bee, of San Antonio, one of the ablest members of the San Antonio bar, is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for State Senator for the 24th Senatorial District of Texas. Mr. Bee is a man of such prominence that when the statement is made that he seeks the Democratic nomination for Senator, it virtually means that he will be the Democratic nominee. In fact no opposition to his nomination has developed and it is not probable that any will. The contest for the office will be between Mr. Bee, as Democratic nominee, and Judge Julius Real, the present incumbent and Republican nominee, at the November election. That election is too remote for reasonable conjecture as to result, but Mr. Bee is a very able orator, and will no doubt make the senatorial campaign a matter of general interest.

**KERRVILLE'S FOURTH  
SUMMER NORMAL**

Many Inquiries Now Being Made About the "Hill Country," Normal, and a Very Large Attendance is Promised

**JUNE 20 TO JULY 23**

Is the Date for Holding the Normal. Much Interest is Taken in the Tenting Feature

The Fourth Summer Normal for Kerrville promises to be a pronounced success. The unusually attractive advertising matter sent out by the management has had a very gratifying effect, and inquiries are coming from all parts of the country. A party of twenty teachers is promised from a single county. Every educational move that is made for Kerrville should have the staunchest support from all the people. We are going to have a fine Normal this year, and each success is so much good work toward making the Kerrville Summer Normal a permanent State summer normal. Every citizen of Kerrville who can possibly do so, should arrange to furnish a room for one or more Normal students. The Normal occurs at a time of the year when the town is full of tourists and the hotels and boarding houses, while they can feed a multitude and feed them well, cannot always lodge the crowds. Citizens do not wish to take boarders, perhaps, but for the good of the town and the success of the normal they should do it, when possible.

It has been evident, for some years, to citizens of Kerrville, that the ancient reputation of Kerrville as a resort for consumptives was hurting the town. While this condition does not exist today, and while the idea has been in a measure removed from the minds of people at a distance, still it does exist to a greater or less extent. Inquiries are being made by teachers as to whether they can secure lodging where there are no sick people. Answer is they can. The fact is it would be difficult to secure lodging where there are sick people. The hotels and boarding houses will not take sick people at any price, and the private houses of Kerrville are now guarded against consumption as they would be against any other plague.

Students who contemplate attending the Summer Normal may rest assured that they will find highly sanitary conditions in Kerrville.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 2.—Resolutions favoring the establishment of a public health department similar to the present Government departments, and opposing the Oklahoma State Medical Examiner's ruling excluding from practice there all physicians who have suffered from tuberculosis, and the Nebraska law compelling indigent tubercular patients to take the serum course of treatment, were adopted at tonight's session of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, which began a two days' session in this city today.

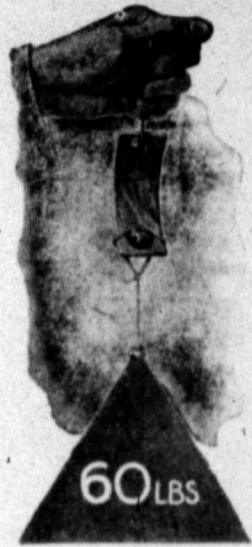
