New York Mayor is Receptive Candidate for Greater Honor.

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—Mayor Gaynor will not be an active candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor of this state, but the New York Times will say tomorrow on the alleged authority of several of his close personal and political friends that he is a receptive candidate.

Galveston Next to New York.

The Galveston News of Sept. 1 shows a large shipping business done at that port.

Galveston maintains its rank as second only to New York in the total value of exports.

Business conditions during the past year were satisfactory and the outlook for the new business year is good. The bank clearings for the past year were \$676,876,000.

Receipts from all sources at the Galveston custom house for the past year were \$463,055, compared with 455,883 for the preceding year.

Galveston is reached by thirty-three foreign steamship lines. Galveston enjoys a larger coastwise business than any port on the gulf or South Atlantic.

During the past year 4,784 immigrants entered through the port of Galveston, compared with 3,338 for the previous year.

Armor-plated Whales.

The remarkable fact that the earliest known ancestor, or primitive type, of the modern whale bore heavy armor on its back, in the form of strong, bony plates, has been set forth by the German paleontologist, Abel. The plates occasionally found associated with the remains of the primeval form of whale, the extinct Zeuglodon, have generally been regarded as having belonged to gigantic turtles, but Abel has shown that they were part of the skeleton of the Zeuglodon itself. They resemble in their character the impenetrable bony shells of the huge glyptodonts that formerly inhabited South America. The suggestion is made that, at the time when they carried armor, whales were amphibious creatures, living on the coasts, and needing special protection from rocks as well as from sharks.—Leslies Weekly.

BANK CALL WILL BE MADE.

Letters Sent to Institutions Asking for Statement of Average Daily Deposits.

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 4.—The Department of Insurance and Banking is rapidly getting its affairs in shape for receiving the new payments to the bank guaranty fund, which will be due January 1, 1911, and for adjusting the bank guaranty business. Banks have been sent out to all the bond security banks calling upon them for a statement of their average daily deposits, that the department may determine the amount of the guaranty fund which will have to make and whether or not they must increase their capital stock.

Tomorrow letters will be sent out to the guaranty fund State Banks organized less than a year prior to August 9, 1909, the date the bank guaranty law became effective, calling upon them for a statement of their average daily deposits.

The Department is very anxious to get from these banks as soon as possible statements of their average daily deposits, for these banks have paid into the bank guaranty fund 3 per cent of their capital and surplus. If the amount paid by them is less than 1 per cent of the average daily deposits they must pay into the fund an amount equal to the difference between the amount paid and 1 per cent of their average daily deposits. If they have paid more than one per cent of their average daily deposits it will not be necessary for them to make an additional payment, and their first payment is otherwise adjusted.

A Man of Iron Nerve.

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POLITICAL COWARDICE

The Texas legislature is very unhappy between the lashing of the governor's whip and the rumbling of the steam roller of the coming administration.

It is a deplorable state of affairs that confronts a people when political cowardice prevents public officials doing their duty. Such is the condition in Texas today. There is no use to mince matters, because the truth is patent. There is a faction of fearless men in the lower house of the legislature who are actuated by what they believe to be right and just, have fearlessly championed a reform in the matter of conducting the penal institutions of Texas. Hon. Clarence Gilmore is a man whose integrity is questioned by none and whose wisdom is recognized by all who know him. He and his co-workers have done earnest work in the premises, but it will avail little, because of the prevalence of political cowardice. There are not enough men in the Texas legislature who have the moral courage to snap their fingers in the faces of the political managers, and go ahead and do what they believe to be right, to put through any bill that has not the sanction of the machine. The democratic convention at Galveston was a boiler factory that built a political machine. Every young man in public life in Texas stands in dread of the machine. If he wants to stay in politics it behooves him to dread it and placate it; if he wants to retain his self respect he should get out in the open and do what he believes to be his duty.

Just how much prison reform needed in Texas the average citizen has no idea; we congressmen do not. The behavior of the legislature in regard to the matter at this time will impress many people with the idea that it was a ghost "raised" for political purpose, that the raisers now want laid, and that the honorable gentlemen who have done the work and borne the brunt of the fight for reform have been extricating political chestnuts from beneath the gaslog.

T. Roosevelt Esq. has been making hay during the sunshiny political weather of the west. As a press agent for T. R., the ex-president, the only living specimen is the greatest yet. Unlike Alexander the Great, Mr. Roosevelt is not sighting for acre world to conquer, but he is going to see to it that this ding-batted little ball stays bally-well conquered.

The ex-president and the vice president are occupying so much of the spotlight that Billy Taft had to buy a "star sperm candle" to go to bed by. Poor little Willie, he does not seem disposed to succeed—indications are that he will not even succeed himself.

It is another unusual occurrence that the vice president, the ex-president, and other leaders become so frightened at the political outlook as to take the stump for party nominees in an "off year."

The state and national legislatures will continue probing and investigating until there will be no chance for a poor grafter to turn an honest living.

DIAZ RECEIVES SLAYDEN.

San Antonian is Among Commissioners Present.

CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 6.—Commissioners to the Mexican centennial celebration from the United States (including Congressman James L. Slayden), Honduras, Austria-Hungary, Costa Rica, Salvador, Guatemala, Brazil, Chile, Argentina and Uruguay, presented their credentials to President Diaz and were formally welcomed by him at noon today.

Immediately preceding this ceremony a parade of 60,000 school children was reviewed by the chief executive, who, surrounded by the members of his cabinet, occupied a balcony in the National Palace.

The presentation of the Commissioners was carried out with all the formality which characterized the reception of the special ambassadors on the previous day. As on that occasion, there were present today all the cabinet members, staff officers of the army and members of the diplomatic corps.

The Americans received were Congressman David J. Foster, Chairman of the commission; Senator Lee S. Overman, Senator Coe I. Crawford, Representative George W. Fairchild, Representative James L. Slayden, Justice James W. Girard, Gen. Harrison Gray Otis and Col. Charles A. Rook.

Special ambassador to the centenary from Spain, Captain General Camillo Polavieja, and other members of the Spanish commission arrived here tonight from Vera Cruz, as did members from the Venezuelan commission, Eudoro Urdaneta, Carlos D. Cubillan and D. H. Pinago Lara, and the Portuguese envoy, Vincente Alto, minister from Portugal to the United States.

D. R. Marques de Azevedo, naval attaché of the Brazilian legation in Washington, headed the Brazilian commission which also arrived tonight.

A novel feature of the parade of school children was the repeating by them in unison as they gathered in the plaza before the President of the following form of oath:

"O, flag; O three-colored flag; O flag of Mexico; in this year and in this month in which the republic has completed her first century of independence I pledge, we promise with all our hearts to ever unite around thee as the symbol of our native country, free, ever victorious."

BEE SAYS REAL IS WRONG

He Says Power to Appoint Penitentiary Commission Should Lie With Governor and not With Other Parties.

In a statement issued Wednesday Carlos Bee, Democratic candidate for State senator, attacked Senator Julius Real's proposed amendment to the penitentiary bill. This amendment vests the power of appointing the penitentiary commissioners in the Governor, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and the presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. Mr. Bee is in favor of the power of appointment being vested solely in the Governor.

Mr. Bee said he has not yet opened his campaign because he believes the citizens of this district are entitled to a period of political rest. While Mr. Bee will welcome Senator Bailey's assistance in the campaign he makes it clear he is not uneasy over the outcome in this district, feeling sure of his election. He said:

"The Terrel Election law provides that in a primary election where the candidate for a district office has no opponent, no nominating convention shall be held, but the district chairman shall certify the name of the nominee of the primary to the county clerks in the counties composing the district in order that his name may be placed upon the official ballot. This provision precludes a nominating convention for the Democratic nominee for Senator in this district. I regret the fact because my friends were anxious to attend a convention."

"I have refrained from beginning an active canvass for two reasons, to wit: Because the people are entitled to as much political rest as possible, and because Senator Real has been prevented from making a canvass by reason of the special session of the Legislature. About the middle of September I expect to begin a canvass which will cover all portions of the district and I will fully discuss all public questions in line with my speech at Comfort July 9."

"The article in the Express this morning is, unintentionally misleading if it creates the impression that I am asking for help. I am confident of my election because this is a Democratic district and feel able to take care of myself, but I deem it as proper and appropriate for Senator Bailey, Governor-elect Colquitt, or any other democratic leader to make speeches for a Democratic nominee, as it is for Cecil Lyon and his Repub-

lican leaders to enter the contest for the Republican nominee. Personally, I shall welcome and appreciate their assistance."

Speaking of the penitentiary bill now before the legislature:

"It would be unfortunate if the amendment proposed by Senator Real, vesting the appointment of the Penitentiary Commissioners in the Governor, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and the presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, should be adopted. Our penitentiary conditions sadly need reforming, but no necessity exists for a change in our form of government on that account. The makers of our constitution were especially anxious that the executive, legislative and judicial departments of our government should be kept separate and distinct. The appointment of the commissioners is clearly an executive act."

"In addition, Governor-elect Colquitt made prison reform one of the leading issues of his campaign. He possesses the confidence of the people and is entitled to have the power of appointment of the commissioners, who shall serve during his administration. Such confidence do I feel in his honesty of intention in this and all other matters that I know that he will appoint worthy and conscientious men regardless of party affiliations, and any abridgement of his power in that respect can only be construed as a reflection upon him. If the Legislature passes a bill at this session I trust the appointment of the commissioners will be vested in the incoming administration, especially after January 1, 1911."

MAY REGULATE SALE OF SEEDS

Department of Agriculture Will Ask for Authority.

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 6.—The department of agriculture will in its report to the governor for the past two years' work recommend that the next legislature give it certain powers relative to the regulation of the sale of seed that are sold in this state.

This will constitute an effort to prevent the sale of mixed seed for the pure seed, etc. It will also be intended to prevent certain diseased seed from coming into this state and being sold.

FROM MOUNTAIN TERRACE.

Preparation Making for Opening of School. Notes and Personals

MOUNTAIN TERRACE, Sept. 9.—Vacation at Mountain Terrace is drawing to a close and preparations for opening school will soon begin.

A full corps of resident teachers has been engaged, and everything arranged for except the art work, which is yet unsettled because Miss Scofield desires this year to have a non-resident art teacher and is now in correspondence relating to this matter. It was found last year that a number of ladies and others in town who desired lessons in painting or other branches found it impossible to go out to the school, so the effort is being made to secure a teacher who will open a studio in town and also give lessons at the school, this accommodating all.

Another improvement, and one which should meet with approval, will be regular trips of a hack to and fro morning and afternoon on school days to carry the day pupils out and back. For the children a fare of five cents each way will be charged, and always starting from a certain place at the same time it will reach any corner on Water street at about the same time each morning.

The gymnasium training will be in charge of Miss Hazel Raber of Stuart, Iowa, a graduate of the University of Nebraska Normal Training School, who has already proved her ability as a teacher in Lincoln, Neb., and in Stuart, Iowa. As the school will not be large she will give individual attention to each girl, finding out what she needs for her development and instructing her in the proper exercises, as well as giving class and drill work to all who are able to take it. It is in this way that a small school has the advantage over those that are crowded. In all studies personal attention can be given by the teachers who can check here, push there, and encourage at all times, while the small classes require constant preparedness on the part of pupils who know it will be their "turn" to recite every day.

Domestic science will be in charge of Miss Sue Hughes of Childress, Tex., a graduate of the Denton College of Industrial Arts, a teacher of five years experience and fully equipped to give girls the benefit of her knowledge. She comes to us most highly spoken of by her former principals as a teacher greatly beloved by her pupils, and we welcome her to Kerrville.

German and Spanish will this year be offered without extra charge, and will be taught by Miss Elmir Tinnin, a graduate of the state University. It is hoped that many pupils will take one or the other of these languages.

Miss Agnes Keith Gordon, inspector in the U. S. Custom Service at Galveston, is spending two weeks of her vacation at Mountain Terrace and enjoys an increased appetite and energy already.

INSURANCE BILL IS PASSED

Both Houses of Legislature Finally Agree On Measure

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 3.—The conferees got together today on the insurance bill and it was finally passed in both houses. Incidentally, House members are crowing tonight that they "slipped one over" the Senate, after all. As adopted, the bill is the same as that minutely described in full in Friday's Express, with an addition to section 3 to satisfy the Senators who clamored against any of the Campbell appointees holding over into the Colquitt administration. The addition is to declare the members of the State Fire Rating Board subject to article 3528 of the revised Statutes, which reads:

"All state officers appointed by the Governor or elected by the legislature, where the mode of their appointment is not otherwise provided by law may be removed by him for good and sufficient cause, to be spread on the records of his office and to be reported by him to the next session of the Legislature thereafter."

TERMS OF MEMBERS

The terms of the members were left as published, one ending February 1, 1911, and the other February 1, 1912, but Mr. Colquitt would be authorized, under today's action to remove them, and he has said he would. But the members of the Fire Rating Board would not serve under Mr. Colquitt under any consideration, and communicated that decision to the Senate in a written communication yesterday, which was given in last night's dispatches, so that Mr. Colquitt will not be put to the necessity of removing them to make room for his own political favorites upon assuming the gubernatorial chair.

In the Senate the vote stood 22 to 2 on the final passage of the bill and in the House 77 to 20. Thus in the Senate, the storm center, the bill received two-thirds vote and in the House it failed to muster the two-thirds necessary to put it into immediate effect. As a result, it will not become a law until about December 5 or 6, provided final adjournment comes early next week. Therefore the present law remains in force and the members of the board will not have the materially increased powers until early in December and will exercise them only about six weeks, as the new administration will be inducted into office about the middle of January.

The bill contains the maximum rate provision but the House thinks it has loosed a bomb and hid under a chip, in that the provision of the bill requires the new board to make all general basis schedules and empowers it to alter or change them at will. The House thinks that this provision will enable the board to prevent discrimination in every instance, in connection with the requirement that whenever the rates are cut under the maximum full publicity must be given by notice to the board and a file with the city secretary or county clerk. They reason that when the board receives notice of a reduction under the maximum specific rates and it has any appearance of discrimination, it can amend the basis schedules so as to effect all risks in the class which the reduction was made, and cause the general rates in that class to be reduced to the extent of the notice filed with the board. However, a few reductions in some towns would not justify the board in making wholesale reductions in that same class over the State. But the House thinks it put a good one past the Senate and is elated. The Senators are not aware of the boast, as yet.

WEAPON FOR THE BOARD

Accompanying the report of the conference committee in the House was a special report from the House conferees explaining the changes made in the bill, as heretofore given in detail in these dispatches, and containing no argument to show that the maximum rate provision is safeguarded to prevent discrimination and that the power to amend the basis schedules is a weapon in the hands of the board.

There was an unimportant discussion in the two houses over the bill as presented by the committee, but it was of short duration in both branches and the finishing touches were soon put to the measure.

There was a disagreement in the Senate over the noon adjournment, and a tilt occurred between Senator Hudspeth and Senator Peeler in this connection, as a result, supposedly, of the break in the ranks of the "immortal sixteen." Senator Peeler moved that a recess be taken until 3 o'clock p. m., and said "not a Senator will be here at 2 o'clock." Senator Hudspeth moved to table Senator Peeler's motion, and added: "Right after dinner I'll introduce a ten-mile law—you'll be back, all right." The Senators glared at each other across the Chamber as Senator Peeler's motion prevailed and the Senate recessed.

CHILE IS AGAIN BEREAVED.

Vive President Follows President Montt in Death Within Less Than a Month.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Sept. 6.—After an illness of six days with pneumonia, Vice President Elias Fernandez Albano, who has been acting President of the Republic of Chile since the death of President Pedro Montt at Bremen, Germany, August 16, died today. Immediately after his death a decree was signed appointing Minister of Justice Emiliano Figueroa acting President.

On the eve of the centennial celebration of its independence the Republic of Chile is in mourning for two executives whose deaths occurred within the last three weeks. President Pedro Montt had been ill for some time, and, going abroad for his health, died immediately after his arrival at Bremen, August 16.

Upon the departure of President Montt, Fernandez Albano temporarily took up the duties of acting President. He continued in that office after Mr. Montt died, pending the election of a President.

According to the laws of Chile, when the office of President becomes vacant through resignation, inability, death or otherwise, the senior minister, under the title "Vive Pres-

ident of the Republic," assumes the duties of President until the President resumes his office or an election is held.

KERRVILLE SCHOOLS OPEN

The Kerrville public schools opened Wednesday with the largest first day's attendance in the history of the institution, about 400 pupils present. Superintendent H. W.
