WILSON HOPES THE PROGRESSIVE FORCES OF NATION WILL UNITE TO FREE COUNTRY.

CO-OPERATION IS URGED

President-elect Issues First Statement—Replies Sent to Taft and Roosevelt—Selig Deutschmann Is an Early Caller.

WILSON AND MARSHALL SHALL WIN A DECISIVE VICTORY

DEMOCRATS OVERTURN REPUBLICAN MAJORITIES IN STATES NEVER BEFORE CAPTURED.

Wilson Will Have Over 400 Electoral Votes—Roosevelt Easy Second in Race—Socialists Are Badly Defeated.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Overturning big Republican majorities in States never before captured by Democrats in a Presidential election, the Wilson-Marshall ticket was swept into office yesterday...

Reports from Chicago indicated that the big lead held by Colonel Roosevelt late last night, gained chiefly through his large majority in Chicago and Cook County, was being steadily reduced by the vote from Democratic districts in the State-at-large...

President-elect Wilson will have behind him a greatly strengthened majority in the House and on the early returns the Democrats have apparently a chance to secure control of the United States Senate.

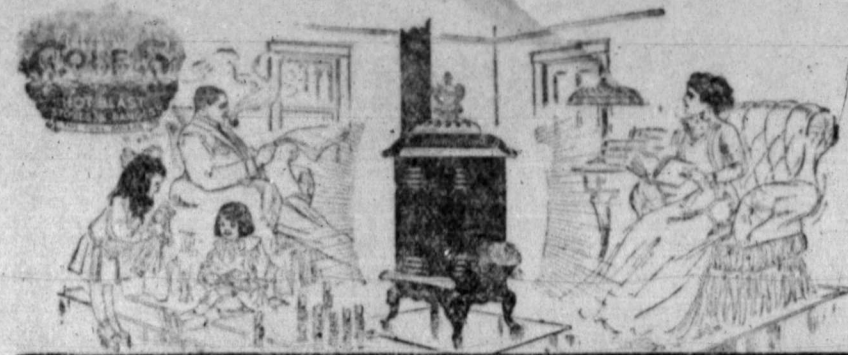
Joe S. Jennings, of Durant, Okla., has leased the Pampell Hall, and has changed the name of the theatre to the Gavety Theatre.

### Pierce Buys Stock From the Standard

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Announcement was made this afternoon that the Standard Oil interests had sold Henry Clay Pierce all their holdings in the Waters-Pierce Oil Company. This ends prolonged litigation.

Negotiations for the sale have been under way for several days, and pending their culmination the hearings through which the Waters-Pierce interests sought to oust the Standard Oil from control were adjourned from day to day.

The stock, with Pierce's present holdings, gives him complete control of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company. The price paid per share was not announced, although it is understood about \$3,000,000 was involved.

### Protect Americans in Constantinople

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Protection of American life in Turkey and especially in Constantinople, where serious trouble is anticipated if the Ottoman army is driven much further, will devolve upon the six European powers which are signatories to the treaty of Berlin and comprising the European concert, according to officials of the state department.

It was said here this morning that although some requests had been received at the state department that an American cruiser be despatched to the scene of the Balkan war, such action was impossible, but that the six powers might be requested to afford American life and property the same protection as was afforded their respective subjects.

The gunboat Scorpion, with a crew of eighty men and seven officers, is now in the Mediterranean and probably will be ordered to the eastern end to lend any assistance possible to non-combatants.

### REVISION NEARLY FINISHED

State Textbook Board Expects to soon Begin Drawing Up Contracts.

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 4.—In the opinion of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Bralley, the State Textbook Board, which is to reconvene next Wednesday, will complete the work of revision within two days and then the work of drawing up contracts and the fixing of bonds by the successful publishing companies is to begin. Superintendent Bralley today said he could not tell how long a time would be required in completing the contracts.

"We have not yet arrived upon a method to be pursued in arranging the contracts," said Mr. Bralley. "The Attorney General's Department will be called upon to give us assistance in seeing that the contracts are legally drawn and signed. I expect every member of the board to be present Wednesday morning."

### More Disturbance in Vera Cruz.

VERA CRUZ, Mexico, Nov. 3.—The revolutionary spirit in the northern part of the state of Vera Cruz is on the increase. Many small hands are causing much mischief in the rich oil district.

The United States cruiser Des Moines and the German protected cruiser—Victoria Louise still are in port. Major Stuardo Cuesta, with 185 adherents who escaped from Vera Cruz on the entry of the federals, has been seen near Oaxaca, where the natives are joining the revolutionary movement in great numbers.

Col. Diaz Ordaz, chief lieutenant of Gen. Felix Diaz, will be tried by court-martial in a day or two. It is generally believed he will be condemned to death.

BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 5.—An automobile carrying Gov. Edwin L. Norris, T. J. Walsh, democratic candidate for senator, and S. V. Stewart, democratic candidate for governor, was assailed by a crowd listening to an orator expounding socialist doctrines here last night. The glass shield of the car was smashed, Mr. Walsh's face was cut and fists were raised at the governor and Mr. Stewart. Half a dozen men seized the wheels of the car, but the chauffeur, by throwing on the power, tore the automobile from their grasp and it sped on to the auditorium, where the governor spoke.

Sheriff John O'Rourke seized one man in the act of throwing a rock at the automobile. Another who cursed the American flag and tore down the patriotic emblem, displayed at a street meeting of the democrats, was pursued by a mob. The police reserves were called to arrest him to save him from further violence after he had been severely beaten. A large crowd joined in a monster demonstration for the American flag early today.

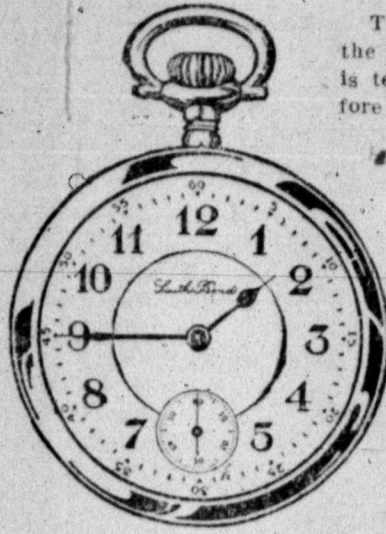

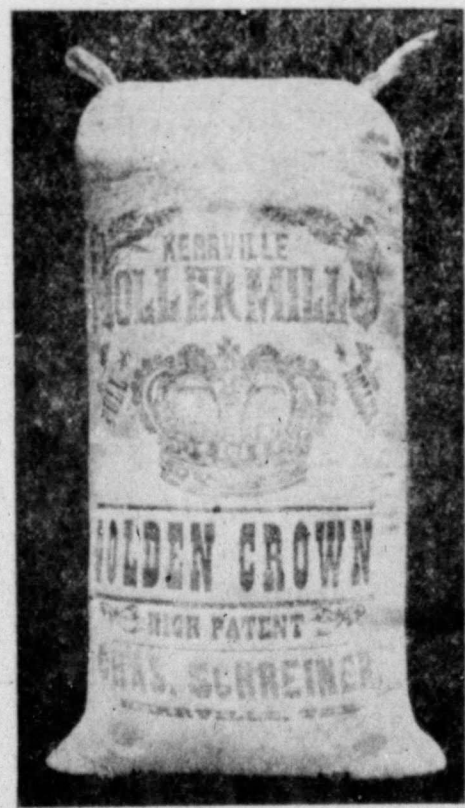

### Confesses to Two Murders; is Happy

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 3.—Declaring she is happier than she has been in years, because of her confession yesterday to having killed two women in Missouri, Mrs. Pansy Hastings-Lesh is in the city jail here tonight awaiting the arrival of Sheriff Henderson of Pettis County, Missouri, who telegraphed Chief Sebastian today to hold the woman until his arrival.

The police do not doubt the young woman's sanity, although her husband, who called at the jail today, said there was nothing in her story and that she was temporarily insane.

The young woman told her story today with utmost frankness. She showed remorse and emotion when relating the story of how she gave poison to Mrs. Eliza Coe at Sedalia a year after she had caused the death of Mrs. E. M. Quaintance at Green Ridge, twelve miles south of Sedalia.

"Mrs. Coe was good to me, although she scolded me sometimes. She had taken a baby to the poor farm through a rain and caught a bad cold. I nursed her and gave her two capsules about half full of poison. She got worse and was so good and kind to me then that I was sorry that I poisoned her, but I was afraid to tell the doctors. When she died the doctor said it was due to pneumonia poisoning.

"I never really felt bad about causing Mrs. Quaintance's death, except that I knew it was wrong. But she and her husband were not kind to me. I was only 15 years old when I was sent to them by the orphanage. Mr. Quaintance, who was about 60 years old, mistreated me and I had trouble with his wife because he encouraged me to be disrespectful to her. We quarreled one day and he took her part and maybe that is why I gave her the poison.

"I do not know why I killed either of the women. That is a question I have asked myself several times. All I knew is that I wanted to get it off my mind. I used to think about it when I was alone or got despondent. If they put me in the penitentiary I will serve my sentence gladly, be-

cause then I can start in again with a clean slate."

### Maj. Gen. O'Reilly is Dead.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3.—Maj. Gen. Robert Maitland O'Reilly, former surgeon general of the United States Army, personal physician and intimate friend of President Cleveland, died here today of uraemic poisoning. General O'Reilly, who had been ill

for some time, was born in Philadelphia in 1845 and participated in many of the stirring events of the Nation's military history in the last half century. He was in the Civil War as a medical cadet and saw hard service in the Indian campaigns. In the Spanish-American War General O'Reilly was chief surgeon of the Fourth Army Corps.

He was a member of the evacuation commission at Havana and chief surgeon of the division of Cuba during the first American occupation. He ended his active career as surgeon general of the army in 1909 when he was retired with the rank of major general in recognition of his distinguished services.

The body of the dead soldier will be buried in Arlington National Cemetery with military honors Tuesday morning.

### Stained Uniforms to Fight.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 4.—The story of how a company of American sailors, who, when ordered to stay off the firing line because of their white uniforms, stained their clothing with mud and shoe polish and joined the marines in the daring charge up Coyatepe hill, Nicaragua, has drifted up here from Central America.

For a few moments there was a scene of confusion, and when the ranks straightened out Major Butler found himself face to face with a company of "brown" clad fighters. The men had poured the water from their canteens on the dusty ground, and then plastered themselves with mud, helping out the effect with smears of tan shoe polish which they carried in their pockets.

Major Butler allowed them to join the attacking force.

### After 24 years He Tells About Murder.

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 4.—The police today made public a confession given them by G. H. Rose, asserting that 24 years ago at Covington, Ky., he killed W. H. Morris. He said he went under the name of N. W. Ingersoll when he killed Morris. Rose also said that 24 years ago, at Independence, Ky., he stole \$110 from Austain Stephens.

Rose has resided in Dallas for 23 years and is 46 years old. He married a Dallas woman. The couple have no children.

Rose has not given any details of the alleged killing. He said that while walking past a church here yesterday the sound of singing affected him that he went inside, listened to the sermon, decided to confess and went to the city jail, where he surrendered last evening.

His confession asserts that about a year and a half ago he burned a home here, obtaining thereby \$10,000 insurance.
