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

There's nothing you can put your finger on yet, but there's quite a bit of talk about a new rodeo arena for Bull Town. Backers of the idea figure that the community has about outgrown the present one. Also, they figure it is too far from town to best serve the purpose. Another drawback to the present facility is that it isn't on a paved road.

We've noticed that people here are able, financially, to obtain the goals that they really set out to reach. Sometimes it takes a while, but they'll get it done. Being considered in connection with the roping/rodeo arena is a showbarn, too, which could be used for FFA-4-H livestock shows on an annual, or more often, basis. The barn could work in nicely with the arena and could have multiple uses including the aforementioned. Such a set-up should appeal greatly to horselovers who live in town and have no place to keep their mounts. Stalls could possibly be rented to these people when the barn wasn't otherwise in use. Promoters of the new idea, too, believe that an arena, with nearby stalls, would do still more to increase the interest From City -in horses and horsemanship here.
