### CAPTAIN THEODORE, THE NOTED BIRDMAN, IS TO MAKE TWO FLIGHTS DURING FAIR.

The West Texas Fair, which holds its eighteenth annual entertainment on the 15th, 16th, 17th and 18th of August, will offer the people of this section a new thriller this year. It has been the policy of this Fair from the time of its organization to give the very best entertainment possible, and of there was something new to get it.

## WOOL AND MOHAIR TOTALS MILLIONS

THE SPRING CLIP JUST SHIPPED SOME TOWARD THREE MILLION POUNDS.

The spring clip of 1916 wool and mohair was not only a big one, but it has been sold at large prices, and the ranchmen of the Hill Country are prosperous and satisfied. Capt. Chas. Schreiner, the veteran wool commission man of Southeast Texas, sold and shipped for growers 27 cars of mohair, aggregating 13,867 bags, or 6,893,340 pounds; six-months wool, 39 cars, 4,108 bags of 827.000 pounds; 12-months wool, 35 cars, 3,742 bags, or 3,192,000 pounds. The grand total of wool and mohair amounting to 98 cars, 10,388 bags or 2,464,827 pounds.

The news of this season of the State was never more festive and in the hands of the wool growers, and the outlook for the winter is excellent. Conditions are favorable for the wool growers, and the business is most promising.

## STATE PRIMARY ELECTION QUIET

NO CHANGE IN STATE OFFICERS. SUBMISSION AHEAD BY SOME 3,000 VOTES.

Another of those great battles of ballots that increases in violence for weeks and subsides in a single night had passed. In Kerr County the election was obedient and quiet. In the State there appeared to be marked stability in victory. No thanks were made in State officers. Ferguson won by a majority of something like 65,000. The only change in matters State-wide was in the swapping of Cyclone Davis for Daniel E. Garrett of Houston for Congressman-at-Large. It was a trade where loss was impossible. There were upheavals in some of the Congressional districts, and a few new faces will be seen in the Texas delegation in Congress.

Hon. James L. Slayden was re-nominated for Congress from the 14th District by a large majority. Hon. M. E. Blackburn was re-nominated as Representative by the Texas Legislature from the 25th district. R. H. Burney was re-nominated as District Judge of the 38th District. J. A. Rees was re-nominated District Attorney without opposition.

In Kerr County only two candidates were named for the office of County Judge. (Continued on Last Page)

You are cordially invited to attend the services, and the Epworth League at 7:30 p. m., and Sunday School at 9:45 a. m.

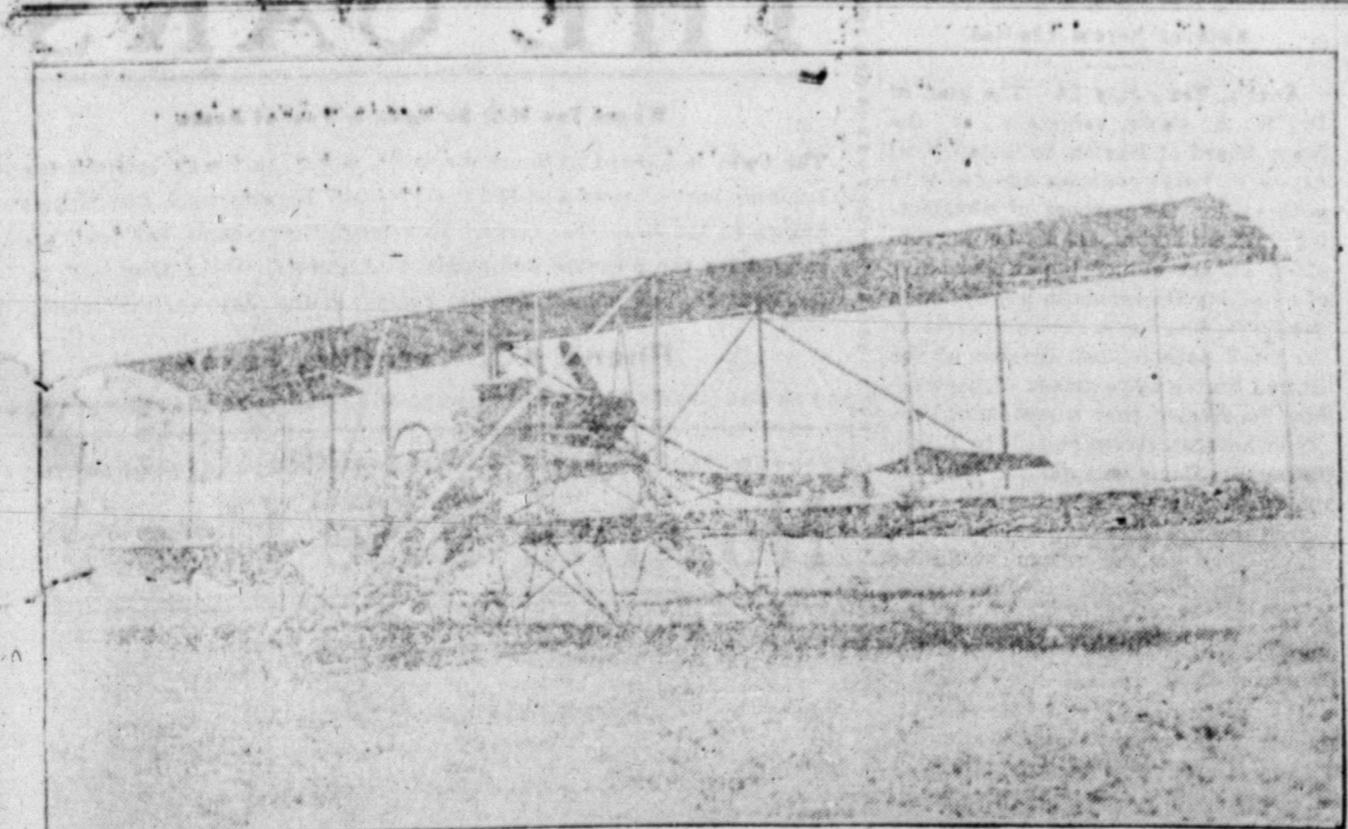
**Verdict in Depot Case.**

## STUDENTS TO RECEIVE DISCHARGE

WAR DEPARTMENT WILL PERMIT GUARDSMEN TO RETURN FOR THEIR FALL WORK.

Washington, D. C., July 28.—While the negotiations with the Mexican government for the settlement of border differences continue to lag, the War Department indicated today that it is about to make a further reduction in its force along the Rio Grande.

The department announced a policy that as soon as conditions permit National Guard organizations composed largely of college students will be withdrawn from the border to allow them to resume their scholastic duties at the opening of the year.

They will be mustered out, but according to the policy of the War Department, an effort will be made to organize them into branches of the National Guard.

The official announcement says in part:

"The organizations which are composed of students attending schools which have been employed into the service of the United States will remain in that service for the time being. These organizations which have not been sent to the Mexican border since August 1, 1910, will not be sent there unless some unforeseen circumstances should arise."

The largest base of National Guardsmen was held just a few hundred feet from camp Wednesday by Maj. Sarah Williamson of San Antonio.

Quite a large number of boys and girls between the ages of 15 and 22 are attending on the Conference for Older Boys and Older Girls, which are in session this week. The Conference for Older Girls is being led by Mrs. W. L. ## UNITED STATES TO BUY WEST INDIES ISLANDS OF ST. THOMAS, ST. CROIX AND ST. JOHN WILL BE PURCHASED.

Washington, D. C., July 28.—Only determination of a few minor details remains to complete negotiations of a treaty between the United States and Denmark providing for acquisition of the Danish West Indies by this Government at a price of \$25,000,000.

In general terms the treaty is understood to follow one negotiated in 1902 by the two governments, but which lapsed when the Danish Parliament failed to ratify it after the United States Senate had acted favorably. It is said to contemplate American acquisition of the group which lies east of Porto Rico and is regarded as of great strategic value.

The three islands of the Danish West Indies—St. Croix, St. Thomas and St. John—lie due east of Porto Rico and their value to the United States is strategic from a military point of view. The harbors of St. Thomas and St. Croix are of first importance to the American Navy, and St. Thomas itself lies in the line of shipping from Europe to the Panama Canal. Imp. Kant German, French and English mail companies have colonial stations there. The acquisition of the islands by the United States has been the subject of unsuccessful diplomatic negotiations since the Civil War. Secretary Seward began negotiations for their acquisition in 1865 because the naval operations of the United States had shown the necessity of a base in the West Indies. A treaty was made and ratified by Denmark, but the United States Senate failed to ratify it in proper time and it lapsed.

Naval officers regard the Danish West Indies as most valuable for any European government wishing to quarrel with the United States, and have urged that it was essential to keep them from falling into unfriendly hands. They have pointed out that the islands are very near the naval station at Guantanamo, only 1,000 miles from Key West and a menace to the free navigation in the Windward and Mona passages, the Caribbean Sea and the routes to Atlantic Coast cities.

### SAN FRANCISCO AROUSED OVER DYNAMITE OUTRAGE

More Victims Are Expected to Die. Police Think They Have Found a Clue.

San Francisco, July 24.—Under the pressure of a public sentiment aroused over the bomb explosion during Saturday's preparedness parade here, the authorities Monday were working with determination to run the perpetrator to earth. To the death list of six, it was expected two and probably more of the 4 injured would be added, five victims being reported in a critical condition.

Led by Mayor Rolph, who has offered a reward of \$5,000 for the arrest of the culprit, scores of citizens have volunteered their services for special aid and the entire city seems eager to lend all possible assistance.

Several definite clues were being followed with great activity. Two men who claimed to have seen the man with the suit case believed to

have contained the infernal machine described him as about 35 years old, tall and shabbily dressed. The description was sufficiently comprehensive and minute to give the police a picture of the suspect, and the city was being combed for him.

Experts retained by the police have arrived at the conclusion, it was said, that the bomb had as its principal ingredient nitro teluel, an explosive of tremendous power. This substance, they say, was compressed into a length of cast steel pipe which, judging from the fragments picked up at the scene of destruction, must have been from a foot to 15 inches long and from 6 to 8 inches in diameter. The great quantities of bullets, slivers of iron and other metal with which the pipe was loaded made it a veritable shrapnel shell.

### EIGHTY-FOUR SPOTS ON SUN DISCOVERED BY PROF. HUBERT

St. Louis, July 24.—Eighty-four spots on the sun were observed today by Brother Hubert, professor of astronomy at Christian Brothers College and he predicted Monday that the solar disturbance indicated by the remarkable sun spot activity presaged a thunder storm Monday night or Tuesday.

Ten days ago Brother Hubert observed one spot on the sun. This spot, which had a diameter of 15,000 miles, began to break up into smaller spots. Sunday 107 were visible and Monday 84.

The wireless apparatus at Christian Brothers College has been disturbed during the last few days and this is attributed to some connection between the magnetic currents of the earth and the sun spot activity.

### Forest Notes.

Coniferous timber has been found to be better suited than any other for the production of ethyl alcohol.

There are 592 consumers of tannin in the United States who use annually 625,000 cords of hemlock bark, 290,000 cords of oak bark and 380,000 cords of chestnut wood.

Experts of the Forest Service estimate that the farm woodlots of the United States contain from 200 to 300 billion board feet of lumber and from one to one-and-a-half billion cords of wood.

All of the 28 counties of Utah contain portions of National Forests and consequently all share in the 25 per cent of the National Forest receipts which is paid over to the road and school funds. This is true of no other State.

One hundred thirty thousand maps of the National Forests will be distributed to tourists this summer. These maps show the best camp sites, good hunting and fishing grounds, roads, trails, and telephone lines, and give directions how to reach points of interest.

A new kitchen utensil is a cutter for removing the cores from vegetables in the form of a long spiral that can be used if wished.

### LETTERS MAY GIVE CLUE TO FRISCO BOMB ASSASSIN

San Francisco, July 24.—Two letters believed to contain a clue to the identity of the assassin whose bomb killed six persons and maimed 44 others during a preparedness parade here Saturday were in the possession of the police Monday. One of the letters was addressed to James Woods, police commissioner and manager of the St. Francis Hotel, and declared his death would be accomplished with poisoned soup because of his activities in connection with the parade.

The other letter, written to M. Lee, head waiter at the St. Francis Hotel, begged him to poison Commissioner Woods' soup reminding him how easy of accomplishment his position made such an act.

Charles M. Fickert, district attorney, asserted Monday that the persons responsible for Saturday's outrage are connected with a Nation wide movement against government and that their activities are not confined to San Francisco.

"We expect the Federal authorities to co-operate with us in every way in this hunt," said Fickert.

### Anthrax Serum Limited.

Austin, Tex., July 24.—The plan of Dr. W. A. Davis, secretary of the State Board of Health, to install local depots in Texas counties infected with anthrax for the purpose of distributing anthrax serum, cannot be put into effect on account of the impossibility of obtaining the serum in large enough quantity. Dr. Davis recently wrote to the chief pathological division of the United States Department of Agriculture requesting that a sufficient supply of anthrax serum be sent to Texas. Today Dr. Davis was advised that the limited supply of the serum had practically been exhausted, but that 500 centimeters of the serum would be forwarded immediately for emergency purposes. The letter was from the chief of the pathological division and is as follows:

"Replying to your letter of July 11, relative to furnishing you with sufficient anthrax serum to supply small amounts to thirty-nine infected counties for emergency purposes, you are advised that on account of the great demand for this product our limited supply has been practically exhausted. It will, therefore, be impossible to

furnish you with sufficient serum for this purpose. However, there will be forwarded to you this week 500 cc. of serum for emergency purposes.

"In order that data on the results obtained from the use of anthrax serum furnished by this bureau might be available, it is requested that you kindly inform this office of the results you obtain with this product."

## JUTLAND'S SHORES DANGEROUS COAST

WATERS WERE CALLED BAY OF WOE BY EARLY DANES.

Land is Low and Sandy. Home of Cimbric Who Invaded Italy, and Has Been Reclaimed Only Recently.

Washington, D. C.—Jutland, the low-lying, sandy peninsula whose name historians probably will employ to designate the great naval battle recently fought off its shores, is the subject of a war geography bulletin from the Washington headquarters of the National Geographic Society, which says:

More appropriate than ever before seems the name Jammerbugt (Bay of Woe), which the Danes have given to the waters that wash the sand dunes of the northwestern coast of Jutland, for with the black ribs of many ancient wrecks on this dangerous coast there is now mingled the flotsam from what were once two of the proudest battle fleets that ever sailed the seas.

Jutland, the continental portion of Denmark, comprises nearly two-thirds the area of the kingdom (exclusive of colonial possessions), but with considerably less than half the total population. It compares with Vermont in size, but has a density of population three times as great. Its most striking physical characteristics are the fjords which cut into the sandy seaboard, particularly on the west coast. Of these the largest Limfjord, is today a misnomer for since 1822 it has been a sound, joining the waters of the North Sea with the Kattegat and making an island of the extreme northern portion of the peninsula which terminates in a cape called the Skaw. Owing to the character of the soil on both banks, the rapidity of the current and the violent impact of the floating ice in the spring, only a pontoon bridge spanned this sound at Talborg until recently.

The highest point of land in Jutland, which is also the highest in the kingdom, is a 564-foot "eminence" in a line of low hills near the center of the peninsula.

Jutland was the ancient home of the warlike Cimbric, a tribe which for 12 years kept Rome in a state of panic, and which was the first Germanic host to make its way across the barrier of the Alps into Northern Italy, anticipating the descent of the Visigoths by five centuries. The Cimbric came within the purview of recorded history in 113 B. C., when, after having been driven from their northern home, supposedly by North Sea inundations, and having made their way southward through the German forests, they inflicted a signal defeat upon a Roman army under Consul Papirius Carbo, at Noreia. Instead of following up their success into Italy, the victors pushed westward into the Rhine valley. Four years later, however, they practically annihilated the Romans under Marius Junius Silanus on the field Arausio, where 80,000 troops were slain. This terrible reverse sent a tremor of terror through the lawmakers on the Capitoline Hill, and the constitution was set aside in order that Marius, fresh from his triumph on African battlefields, might be invested with consular powers for five years. He was deemed the man of the hour and the only general who could turn back the tide of barbarians that had debouched from Cimbric Chersonese, the name given to Jutland. While this tribe poured over the Alps, driving the forces of Catullus before it across the Adige and the Po, Marius administered a crushing defeat at Aquae Sertiae in Gaul to the Cimbric's companions in arms, the Teutones. The consul then rushed back across the Alps and at Campi Raudii, near Verucellii, where a century earlier Hannibal had won his first victory on Italian soil, the invaders were utterly annihilated, all the men being killed or captured, while the women slew themselves and their children in preference to being borne to Rome in slavery.

Jutland's agricultural poverty dates from the beginning of the sixteenth century by which time the peninsula had been almost completely decuded of its forests. It was not until 1866, two years after Denmark had been forced to relinquish Schleswig-Holstein to Prussia and Austria, that the Danish people began an appraisal of the latent agricultural possibilities of their remaining domain to see if by cultivation they could compensate for their territorial losses. Colonel E. Dalgas, an engineer officer of the Danish army, was the leading spirit in the organization of the Danish Heath Society which began to plant trees throughout the peninsula, a movement which is still going forward and which

A 100 million dollar wage increase for men in freight and yard service (less than one-fifth of all employes) is equal to a 5 per cent advance in all freight rates.

The managers of the railroads, as trustees for the public, have no right to place this burden on the cost of transportation to you without a clear mandate from a public tribunal speaking for you.

The railroads have proposed the settlement of this controversy either under the existing national arbitration law, or by reference to the Interstate Commerce Commission. This offer has been refused by the employes' representatives.

Shall a nation-wide strike or an investigation under the Government determine this issue?

has proved to be the salvation of the land. Mountain firs were first planted and these were succeeded by red spruce from America. These trees serve as a living barrier against the fierce sand driving gales from the North Sea. The interior of the peninsula is fast losing its barren aspect, more than 2,500 square miles of heath having been redeemed by afforestation. Oats, barley, beet roots and rye are now grown profitably, cattle and sheep find good pasturage, and the forests teem with deer and wood pigeons. Typical of the growth of towns in this rejuvenated area is Herning, a thriving community with a population of 5,000.

Jutland has a familiar ring in the ear of every school boy for he remembers that the Angles and the Jutes were among the first Germanic peoples to emigrate from the shores of the Baltic and settle in Britain.

Clarke Is Confirmed.

Washington, D. C., July 24.—The Senate tonight unanimously confirmed the nomination of John H. Clarke of Cleveland as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court to succeed former Justice Hughes. Justice Clarke will take his place on the bench when the court convenes next fall.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION RELATING TO LEVYING TAX FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES.**

(H. J. R. No. 30.) HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION.

Proposing an amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem county tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the county; and authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem district tax not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the district.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

SECTION 3. School Taxes.—One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes, and a poll tax of \$1.00 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of 21 and 60 years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed 20 cents on the \$100.00 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year. The Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of an annual ad valorem county tax within the counties of the State not to exceed 50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property situated within the county; provided, a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, for the purpose of maintaining the public free schools of the county, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed, or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such districts, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns, constituting separate and independent school districts.

SEC. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby instructed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in November, 1916, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the States of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district." And those opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes, not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county, and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district."

SEC. 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary therefor, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

(Note.—H. J. R. No. 30 was adopted by the House March 6, yeas 104, nays 12. Was adopted by the Senate, with amendments, March 19, yeas 25, nays 2. House concurred in Senate amendments March 19, yeas 78, nays 19, present and not voting 1.)

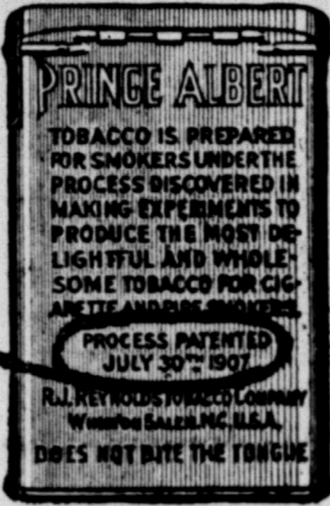

## WAR RAGES WHERE NINEVEH RUINS LIE

UNEARTHING OF RECORDS REVEALED ANCIENT STORY.

Manuscripts Catalogued in Assyrian Capital as in Libraries Today.

Elaborate Lost System Existed.

Washington, D. C.—The strong offensive developed recently by the Russian forces operating against the desperately resisting Turks northwest of Bagdad has awakened a worldwide interest in this whole region of Mesopotamia and particularly in the ruins of the great city of Nineveh lying just across the Tigris from Mosul and a probable battlefield during the Muscovite assault upon this Moslem key to the upper valley of the historic river. Concerning the ancient capital of Assyria and the manner in which its buried secrets have been brought to light within very recent years, Albert T. Cary, professor of Assyriology and Babylonian literature at Yale University, has sent a communication to the National Geographic Society.

Professor Cary writes: One of the romances of the last 75 years has been the unearthing of the remains of forgotten empires and the decipherment of their ancient records. A little over half a century ago what was known concerning the ancient peoples of the nearer East, besides that which is contained in the Old Testament, could be written in a very brief form.

Israel was then regarded as one of the great nations of antiquity. Abraham belonged to the dawn of civilization. The references to other peoples in the Old Testament had little meaning, for few appreciated the fact that the history of many pre-Israelitish nations had practically faded from the knowledge of man. The pick and spade of the explorer, however, and the patient toil of the decipherer have thrown a flood of light upon the situation; ruin hills of the past have been opened up to the light of day, out of which emerge marvelous revelations in the form of written records and other remains.

These, although written in languages and scripts the very existence of which was unknown to man for 2,000 years or more, are now forced to reveal their story of religion, politics, science and life of not a few of the ancient and forgotten peoples.

These researches have resulted in astounding revelations. Israel, instead of being one of the foremost nations of antiquity is now found to have been a small power which had thrived in the late pre-Christian centuries, and had occupied a comparatively insignificant position among the great nations of the age. Instead of the patriarch Abraham belonging to the beginning of time, it is now found that he occupied a middle chapter in the history of mankind.

Professor Cary tells of some remarkable documents found in the ruins of Nineveh's "congressional library," where manuscripts were catalogued and arranged according to subject matter, much as in our libraries of today. One clay tablet discloses the fact that "the sweetest story ever told" was told with the same naive fervor 5,000 years ago as it is today. It is a lover's plaint, thus expressed: "To Bibea, thus says Gimil Marduk, may the gods Shamash and Marduk permit these to live forever for my sake. I write to inquire concerning thy health. Tell me how thou art. I went to Babylon, but did not see thee. I was greatly disappointed. Do come in the month of Marchesvan. Keep well always for my sake."

Whether Bibea received this missive from her solicitous Gimil is not known, but she should have, for there was an elaborate post system in that day and it is known that there were regular dispatches between some of the principal cities. Among the large amount of material unearthed have been many shipping tags made of clay. These have upon them the name and address of the party to whom the merchandise was sent.

If all the atrocious charges made against the various belligerents during the present world war were true and were multiplied a hundredfold, they would not reach the limits of cruelty attained by the famous king of Nineveh, Ashur-Natsirpal III, whose own accounts of his refinement of the art of torture have been unearthed recently beneath the very plain where Turk and Muscovite are now battling for possession of the cradleland of civilization. The king wrote concerning one of his campaigns:

"To the city of Tela I approached. The city was very strong; three

"If neither the Democrats nor Republicans come out for National suffrage, we shall swing the power of 4,000,000 women voters now enfranchised to the Prohibition or Progressive parties," Miss Martin said, "or we might decide to place our own candidates in the field."

large supply of ammunition for 1,000,000 men, and when all this is done the relative protection will, doubtless, be less than the present policy protection in any of our large cities."

In another editorial, Mr. Windsor points out the great opportunity which will be presented to advance the cause of international conciliation at the end of the present war.

In a well-illustrated article on flood control, Surrle Hender emphasizes the necessity of a comprehensive plan for adequate flood protection, with the Mississippi River and its tributaries under the control of a Federal Commission.

### OAKLAND MOTOR CAR COMPANY EXPANDS FACILITIES

Announcement has been made by Fred W. Warner, general manager of the Oakland Motor Car Company, that plans for a large addition to the Pontiac plant had been approved by President W. E. Durant of the General Motors Corporation, and preliminary operations on an extensive scale will begin as soon as the buildings on the old Studebaker site have been removed.

The new buildings will be occupied by a machine shop and additional assembly departments which the Oakland Company is compelled to add in order to bring the output up to a point which will approach the demand for their new models, particularly the six-cylinder car, which has proved to be one of the sensations of the year in motordom.

Until the architects have completed their labors it will be impossible to determine just what additional space will be gained by the proposed improvements, but a very heavy increase in the factory output and the ultimate employment of a force double the proportions of the present crew is the assurance made by Oakland officials in discussing the plans for the expansion.

July 1 the company had contracts for the sale and delivery of several thousand cars over and above the total output of the last fiscal year, with agencies and ranch managers in-

sistently demanding a larger appropriation. In view of the fact that the present plant has been worked to capacity without supply the trade, it became evident that a large addition to its output would have to be accomplished immediately if the new business offered was to be accepted and the disappointment of agents and customers was to be avoided.

For several weeks representatives of the General Motors Company have been quietly making options on the property adjoining the present plant and the purchase of the last piece was negotiated Saturday.
