FURLOUGHS PLANNED TO HELP WORK ON FARMS

For the purpose of augmenting agricultural production it is in the ntention of the War Department to grant furloughs to enlisted men to

Furloughs may be given by concantonments, divisions, and departments. They will be for short periods, largely for seeding and harvesting time. They will not be granted to enlisted men of or above the grade of first sergeant, nor in an or ganization that has been ordered to mobilization or training to a port of embarkation. All furloughs granted will be recalled and the men ordered to their organizations when they have received preparatory orders for

Farloughs granted for farm work will be without pay and allowances, except that enough pay will be retained in each case to meet allotments in fcree on the day of . the order, war-risk insyrance, and pledges on Liberty bonds.

For specially qualified experts in agriculture furloughs may be granted by the Secretary of War upon application by the Secretary of Agriculcure, providing such furloughs are voluntarily accepted by the persons or whom application is made.

Individual applications for furoughs submitted by relatives will be on a form to be furnished by loca! draft boards. Two sections are to be nade out and presented to the local oard, which will complete the form.

If the furlough is granted the application will be filed by the commanding officer and a certificate furnished the soldier. If not granted, the application will be returned with easons for disapproval.



New Wheat Saving Program Demanded - Allied Food Shortage Increases-America Must Feed Fighters.

Explaining the United States Food Administration's new 50-50 wheat regcan grocer has gladly shouldered. Many stores are already displaying their Food Administration wheat saving pledge cards, that they have signed, agreeing to carry out the new

Each flour customer is now requir ed to buy one pound of cereal substitute for every pound of wheat flour. The substitute may be of one kind or assorted. This 50-50 sale is made by modities. There is, of course, no regulation demanding the consumer to buy wheat flour at all.

A wide variety of substitutes has been provided: Cornmeal, corn flour, edible cornstarch, hominy, corn grits, barley flour, potato flour, sweet potato flour, soya bean flour, Feterita flour and meals, rice, rice flour, oatmeal. rolled oats and buckwheat flour.

Graham and whole wheat flour constitute an exception to the national regulation. Either of these commodities may be sold at the ratio of three pounds to five pounds of wheat fourthat is, five pounds of graham or wheat flour counts the same as three

tion. Where any flour contains 50 per cent, or less of wheat it may be sold without any substitutes. Where other ingredients an additional 20 per

None of the substitutes should be considered as a waste purchase. There are many household uses for each. The eight pounds of cornmeal can be made into combread, corn muf-

In the meantime America's meat supply has been greatly increased for some months to come by the unprecedented shipping to market of hogs that averaged 232 pounds each instead of 203 pounds-the nor-

The United States Food Administration, endeavoring to adjust the international food balance, promptly removed certain restrictions in this country on the use of meat and at the same time asked for a smaller consumption of breadstuffs.

We are asked to observe only one meatless day each week-Tuesday. We will have larger meat stocks for awhile, But our bread ration must be held to a minimum.

In altering its food conservation program the Food Administration emphasizes that the food situation is of necessity. subject to radical changes. caused by crop conditions at home and abroad and by the precarious transportation problem, both in overseas' shipping and in America's overburdened

transportation system. The Food Administration will keep the American people fully and frankly advised of each change in the developing situation that they may know defi-nitely the part their food sacrifices play in the world war.

The Honor Flag measures 36x54 inches. It has a red border and a white center, and three vertical blue stripes. 

which little, is known is that of Ci vilian Relief. It bears that name to distinguish it from the Military Relief but the work it does is closely akin to military relief because it always has a khaki-clad figure in the background if not directly to the fore.

The Civilian Relief Division is pri marily aimed to help the soldiers in their private affairs, to aid them by aiding their families, to relieve mental distress and to solve domestic prob iems so that the soldier can proceed without being bothered by thinking of what is happening at home.

The importance of the work of ci vilian relief is readily understood when one knows what it does. When the next call for soldiers is made every one of the hundreds of thousands of young men who are called from their homes will receive a letter from the Red Cross. This letter will say, in effect

'Is there anything we can do for you? Are there any questions concerning insurance, allotment of pay provisions for those left behind that we can answer? Do you want advice Call on us and we will help you."

Local Addresses Given. These letters will give the local addresses and the names of those hav ing the work in charge. These ind viduals have been furnished with handbooks explaining in detail all the rules and regulations of the govern ment on the subjects interesting to the recruits, and, armed with these handbooks, the Red Cross worker can answer as correctly as the Attorney-General of the United States. This in-

On his arrival at camp the recruit finds notices posted giving the name and location of the camp headquarters of the Red Cross, and he is invited to write or call if he has any troubles. The persons in charge of these camp offices are trained social workers sympathetic and of a character inspir ing confidence. The soldier tells his troubles and advice is tendered and assistance is given if it is needed. When the interview closes the Red

Cross person asks: "Is there anything else we can do for you?"

That question, with its "anything else," often brings out the real purpose of the visit, a purpose that diffidence or some other feeling may have kept unspoken. When the "something else" is mentioned it is often a matter that the Red Cross finds easily adjusted, a trifle in itself but of vast importance to the persons most con-

#### Tragedy of the War Brides.

In the towns adjacent to every camp and cantonment are scores of relatives of young soldiers who have followed to be near their loved ones as long as possible. Often a bride follows her husband, only to find that his stay in the camp is about completed, his period of training is over and be is leaving for the front Living in these camp towns is expensive, the population has doubled or trebled within a few months, rents are high and the cost of food soon exhausts the slender means the bride brought with

Perhaps she is looking forward with mingled feelings of joy and anxiety for the advent of a little stranger who may never see his soldier father. Perhaps she married against the advice of her parents—girls are prope to do that sort of thing and does not like to appeal to ber relatives. What can

She can come to the Red Cross and tell her story, and right there her anxiety may end. (Continued From First Page) about this lesser treason, or "misprison of treason," as it is called, and

it applies to all persons living in the United States, whether native-born, naturalized, or not naturalized, for they all owe allegience:

"3. Whoever, owing allegiance to the United States, and havink knowlrdge of the commission of any treason against them, conceals, and does not, as soon as may be, disclose and make known the same to the President or to some judge of the United States, or to the Governor or to some judge or justice of a particular State, is guilty of misprison of treason and shall be imprisoned not more than seven years and fined not more than one thousand dollars."

#### Follow the Safe Path.

So in these times the safe path for native-born, naturalized, and the alien is not only to avoid treason one's self, but, if one learns of it, to either go in person or write some of the officers named in this statute and By the method of "spare the rod?" tell him what one knows.

It is not necessary for me to tell you the many forms treason may take, for treason will always find a hundred different secret ways in which it can give aid and sympathy to the enemy. But right can take but one plain course. Be loyal, true, straight, and square to the Government, and you will be sure you are not committing treason. I am not trying to tell people how near they can approach the line of treason without crossing it. I am telling them how far they can keep from the line by simply being loyal to the flag and to America.
