Mr. Heinz had been one of those who had believed the stories of starvation and death in Armenia had been exaggerated. Not until he went himself to the Caucasus did his views change. Then he was shaken to the foundation of his soul by what he saw

"Fearful! Awful! Horrible! Unbelievable!" are some of the adjectives Mrs. Egan says'must be used in speaking of conditions in the Near East, where Near East Relief, 1 Madison Avenue, New York, supported by con tributions from the American people is conducting the only organized effort to save the lives of these utterly destitute millions. Everything she saw and heard justified the necessity for quick and generous aid from America. Her story of what she witnessed re-enforces the call of the Near East Re-Hef for aid for stricken Armenia.



DAUGHTER OF AGUINALDO IN U. S. CAPITAL

> When General Emilio Aguinaldo was leading the Filipino army against the American forces twenty years ago he probably little dreamed that some day a daughter of his would visit the city of Washington and would be given a great reception at the famous Congressional Club! And that the wives of 120 members of the American Congress and two wives of members of the President's cabinet would call upon her to pay their respects!

But all this actually happened when Miss Carmen Aguinaldo, his nineteenyear-old daughter, visited Washington recently. And those wives of the American statesmen expressed themselves as both charmed and surprised at the refined, tactful, college educated young miss who greeted them.

"Miss Aguinaldo was simply delightful," was the expression of one congressman's wife. "She was very modest, yet she acted so natural and thor-

oughly at home that she captivated everybody."

On another occasion while in Washington Miss Aguinaldo was given a real ovation by a Filipino-American audience when she recited "My Last Farewell," poem of Dr. Jose Rizal, the Filipino martyr.

Miss Aguinaldo is a student at the University of Illinois, Urbana, Ill. While in Washington she was the guest of Mrs. Jaime C. deVeyra, wife of one of the resident commissioners from the Philippines. The Capitol building and the Congressional library appealed particularly to the young Filipina, while the beautiful sights from the Washington monument thrilled her with delight. When asked how she liked America, she smiled and an-

swered: "It is a wonderful country. I didn't like winter at first, but since I have learned how to skate I am having fine times. All the Americans whom I have met have been very good to me. My friends in Urbana and my classmates in the university are just lovely, but I cannot help feeling homesick at times because I am missing my father. My coming here was indeed a great sacrifice for him, for we are very close. He is so good to me.

Miss Aguinaldo is intensely patriotic. She does not conceal her resentment when she hears or reads of a misrepresentation of the Filipines. . "It is un fortunate," she once exclaimed in a voice full of sadness, "that my country and my people are hardly known, much less understood, by the people of Am-

Politics is tabooed in any conversation with this Filipino maid. She evades the topic by replying that she is too young to express opinions on things political. "Ail I can say," she declares, "is that I share with my father in the desire for independence for my native land. There is no question about our being able to govern ourselves'

Filipinos deciare Miss Aguinaldo has a "genuine Filipina temperament"-that is, she does not believe in the occidental custom of "dates" between young men and women. She does not see anything wrong in it, she says, but it is such a violent departure from the custom in the Philippines that she cannot adopt it.

"You might laugh at me," she said. "but I cannot go out with one single escort unchaperoned. I simply can't I will go back to my country with the soul of a Filipina."

"I looked closer and found the child was eating the marrow from a bone."

"Where did she get it?" I asked the interpreter who accompanied me.

"Yonder in the grave yard," he replied, after questioning the girl. This child, according to Mr. Chater, was subsisting solely on a small dole of rice furnished daily by the Near East Relief representatives in her native city, Igdir. There was not sufficient food in the town to even give one meal a day to all of the children and shortly after they had received this bare pittance of food all were searching for any bit on which they might chew to appease their hunger. They picked up beetles, straws, and one a piece of horse's hoof, says Mr. Chater

Root and Grass Diet.

Conditions at Igdir are horrible almost beyond belief. People live chiefly on roots and grass, but occasionally the diet is varied by the killing of a dog or a cat. Workers sent out by Near East Relief, the former Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief, who are furnishing the only sustenance to these people, told Mr. Chater that it was impossible to remove at once the bodies of those who had died from starvation, and when they were taken out for burial, an arm or a leg of the body had been eaten by the famished survivors.

Mr. Chater tells of a visit to the burying ground when graves were torn open and bodies exhumed by the famished inhabitants. "We had taken a short cut," he says, "toward where our car waited and by chance we were skirting the cemetery. Our guide pointed thither and said

"It is not a pleasant sight. You must understand that the Turks left this country so bare that there were not even spades. Graves must be dug with any available thing, even with human bones. If the dead has a relative strong enough to carry a weight-big stones are placed on the grave, but if nothe shrugged significantly.


