

## WHITTLIN'

We read somewhere years ago when we were even more inexperienced in the newspaper business in general and sports writing in particular that the first thing that a sports reporter needed to know, remember and practice is that he is not a coach.

"Just report what happened and leave the coaching to those who have such responsibilities" is the theme of the advice. We've tried, successfully or not, to practice that theory and have no intention of changing our way of doing at this late date.

However, it would give us tremendous personal satisfaction to witness the defeat of a Farwell football varsity team by a Bovina team.

The Mustangs, while enjoying their share of success on the gridiron down through the years, haven't defeated the Farwell Steers since 1954. We started watching Bovina teams play Farwell in '55, haven't missed a game between the two during the 13 years since and have yet to see the Maroon and White emerge victorious.

We keep telling ourselves we will be privileged to witness such a victory . . . if we live long enough.

Most of those years that Farwell has been winning the traditional Parmer County battle between the two schools, the two teams haven't been in the same district. The Mustangs and Steers were competing on the same level at the beginning of the current Bovina win drought. Then Farwell advanced to Class A several years before the Mustangs made that step up from good, ole comfortable Class B competition. The Mustangs were promoted two seasons ago, in '66, but the Steers have continued to come out on the top end of the score.

The Steers, while traditionally being strong in the sport of football, haven't always, in our opinion, had the better team. Sometimes, the Mustangs just seemed to be "snake bit." And that can happen to the best of teams, like the Dallas Cowboys . . . and the Texas Aggies, for instance.

Last year, for instance, the Mustangs pretty well outplayed the Steers but came out on the short end of a 7-6 score. Bovina went for two points after its touchdown and through a mix-up had only 10 men on the field for the double extra point attempt. It could have worked. But it didn't. The Farwell defender who made the tackle on the Mustang ballcarrier was, you guessed it, of course, that lineman who had no one whatsoever to block him. He had a clear, unhindered shot at the Bovina boy with the football and took advantage of the situation. Except for that, the Mustangs could possibly have had two points and an 8-7 win instead of a 7-6 loss.

Then a few years further back than that, the Mustangs, admittedly outclassed, played an inspired brand of football and came out with only a 6-0 loss. At that time, it was considered a moral victory just to hold the mighty Steers to such a close score. It was quite an accomplishment. But now, years later, it looks on the record as just what it is --- another win for Farwell.

As a rule, the Mustangs play an inspired game against the Steers, but for the past 13 years they just haven't managed to get in the win column.

This week, Friday night, the Mustangs get another chance to bring the Farwell win streak to an abrupt halt.

Again, they won't be given much chance by the oddsmakers and only those close to the situation who realize how much the Mustangs want to win the Farwell game will give them any chance at all.

Without trying to overemphasize the point, we think a new football day will dawn for the Bovina High Mustangs when they break the dominance of the Steers.

Need we say, we're hoping this is the year.

# Bovina Voters Give Lead To Nixon

## For Adult Farmers --

## Welding Class Planned Here

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held Nov. 18-21 under the sponsorship of the Bovina High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent, and John Paul Jones, teacher of vocational agriculture.

C. B. Edwards, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

The short course of four sessions at Bovina High School is scheduled to begin Monday, Nov. 18, at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building, and continue through Thursday. During the dates the short course is in progress, Edwards will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Jones.

An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who

attends all the training sessions.

Edwards states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operator in running a bead, striking an arc, types of electrical, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding.

Edwards holds two college degrees, a B. S. in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M and an M. S. in Agricultural Education - Animal Husbandry from Oklahoma A&M; and in addition, has several graduate hours at the University of Texas. Edwards has had experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and as supervisor of state schools. He has organized T & I programs and supervised the operation of several shops.

## County Ballots Favor GOPs

A total of 3,146 voters in Parmer County, including 550 from Bovina, went to the polls in the general election Tuesday and gave the nod to Republican Presidential candidate Richard M. Nixon.

Nixon had 1,539 votes in the county when final tabulations were made at 2:30 a.m. today (Wednesday). Democratic candidate Hubert H. Humphrey received 833, while American Party candidate George Wallace got 730.

U. S. Congressman Bob Price (R) was given a margin of 1958 to 1011 over Democrat Dick Brown, with Bovina going along, 269-240.

In the presidential race, Nixon received a slim margin over Humphrey, 206-202, while Wallace got 136 votes in the Bovina box.

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake was sent back to Austin for another term with the help of Parmer County. He received 1598 votes to Republican Farnk Ford's 1339. Bovina gave Clayton a 313-195 nod.

The remainder of the Democratic candidates for state offices led both Bovina and Parmer County. Preston Smith was given 1667 votes for governor of Texas, and Republican Paul Eggers received 1375.

Voting in the 1968 general election topped other records in previous years. In the last presidential election, 1964, Bovina counted 543 votes, only seven votes short of this one.

Only contested race in Parmer County was that of county commissioner of the Farwell-Oklahoma Lane precinct.

Incumbent Guy Cox won on the Democratic ticket over Republican R. L. Jones 552 to 264.

Complete tabulations of the 1968 general election by precincts are on page 2 of this issue of The Blade.

Democrats approved for state offices were Bob Barnes for lieutenant governor; Crawford Martin for attorney-general; Robert S. Calvert, comptroller; Jesse James, treasurer; Jerry Sadler, land commissioner; John C. White, commissioner of agriculture; and Jim C. Langdon, railroad commissioner.

In Texas Constitution amendment voting Bovina approved No. 1 (State Employee Re-

irement) 198 to 196, but the county turned thumbs down 1206 to 1033. That was the only one this precinct disagreed with the county on, except for No. 5 (Legislators' Salary Increases). The county approved 1297 to 1120, while Bovina was tied up 202-202.

Other Amendments approved by Bovina and Parmer County were No. 3 (University Fund Investment), Bovina 211-161, county 1223-1164; No. 7 (Abolishing Ad Valorem Tax), Bovina 215-172, county 1302-1217; No. 9 (Teacher Retirement), Bovina 303-109, county 1770-662; No. 14 (Limiting Legislators' Extra Activities), Bovina 238-151, county 1397-859.

Other than No. 1, amendments defeated county-wide were No. 2 (Public Welfare) 1513-742; No. 4 (Dallas County Road Bonds) 1133-843; No. 6 (Anti Pollution Tax Benefits) 1158-1047; No. 8 (Capitol Contracts Approval) 1343-839; No. 10 (Texarkana Tobacco Tax) 1460-526; No. 11 (El Paso-Tarrant Office Consolidation) 1316-778; No. 12 (Industrial Development Bonds) 1152-1086; and No. 13 (Stored Property Tax Exemption) 1506-689.

County officials unopposed on the ballot and thus returned to office were Archie L. Tarter, County Judge and ex-officio School Superintendent; Hurschel R. Harding, County Attorney; Chas. Lovelace, Sheriff; Hugh Moseley, County Tax Assessor-Collector; and Tom Leswellen, Friona County Commissioner. District Attorney Jack D. Young also had no opponent.

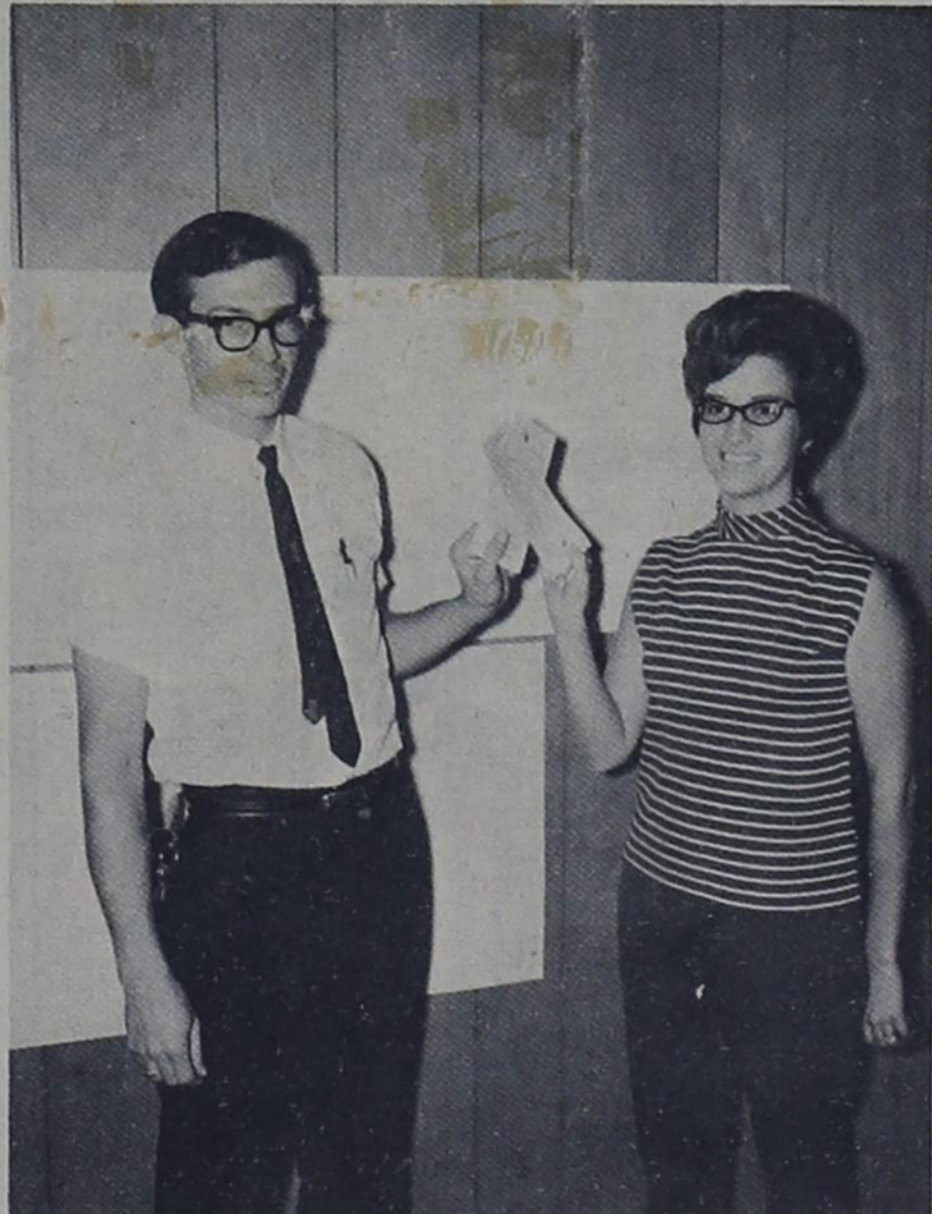
In a year that has seen the favorites win more times than not, many contestants have better than average total scores.

The event was held in the FFA barn and was crowded to overflowing most of the evening.



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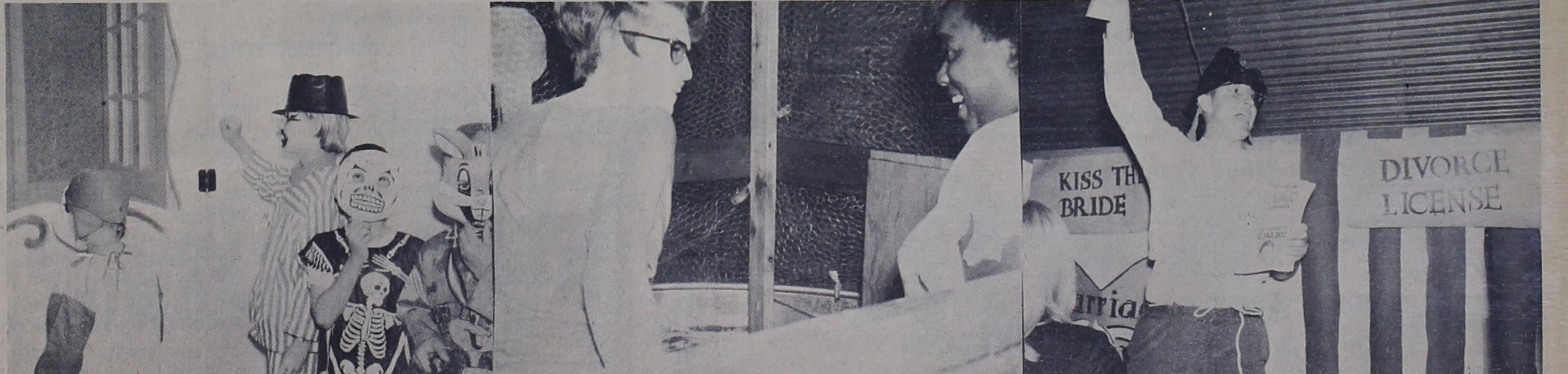

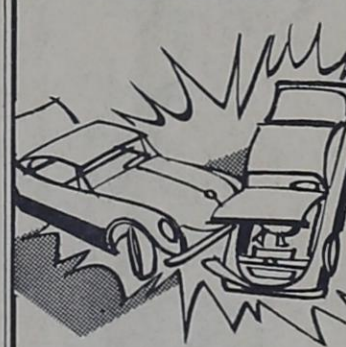
However, the base in Germany has been closed and the Burnetts will spend the remainder of their European tour in Belgium.

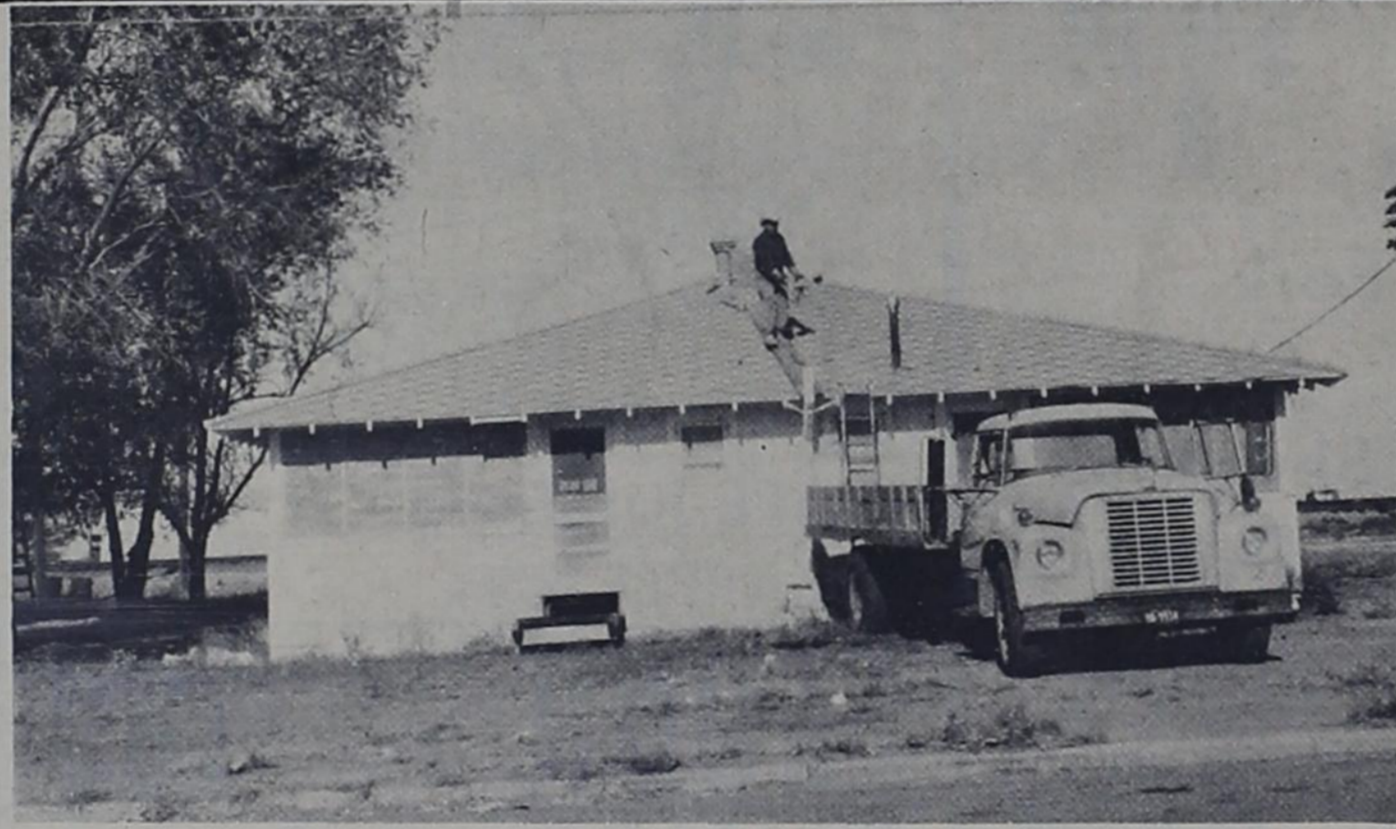

# 1968 Grain Sorghum Yields 'Average' Crop

Grain harvest in the Bovina area is virtually over and result of the 1968 milo crop is probably a little below average, elevator operators say.

However, taking into consideration that grain was hurt by hail and greenbugs, plus the fact that more acreage was laid out this year, the 1968 crop is good.

One elevator official estimated the grain received there to be averaging about 5,000 pounds per acre. Some farmers have cut bumper crops, such as Joe Fowler west of Bovina, who is

reported to have harvested nearly 10,000 pounds, and Lawrence Melcher, south of Bovina, who cut nearly 9,000 pounds. There are others, principally north of town, who harvested as little as 3,000 pounds.

"Hail did more damage to grain sorghum this year than it ever has," an operator said. The farming area north of Bovina was hit at least three times. Green bugs that were not sprayed early enough also took a toll.

Also pointed out is the fact that the area that received the greatest hail damage is also the belt that has less irrigation and averages smaller yields.

While farmers laid out more acreage this year, this is not thought to be a major factor in the outcome of the 1968 crop.

Greenbugs invaded grain sorghum fields during the summer, an unusual occurrence

since they ordinarily attack wheat. Most of the crops were sprayed to prevent great damage to grain sorghum.

## Harvest Gets Slow Start For Cotton

Cotton harvest in the Bovina area is barely getting started, gin operators say. Most farmers are awaiting another freeze before stripping their 1968 crop.

Reports on grade and staple length have not been received at one gin so far. Another estimated the 1968 cotton crop to be below what was first expected. Cotton brought in has averaged about a bale to the acre.

Most of the cotton being harvested is from 'hailed-out' patches and "hot spots." Some is from defoliated fields.

Operators say they expect it to be another week or two before much cotton begins coming into the gin yards in any great amounts.

# Farwell Places Long Winning Streak On Line

## Bovina Seeks First Victory Since 1954

With the opportunity to win over a team they haven't beaten in the past 13 years, the Bovina Mustangs take on the powerful Farwell Steers there Friday night in a District 3-A game.

The Steers are co-favorites with Sudan in the district race and are expected by the odds-makers to use the Bovin tilt as another successful stepping stone toward their showdown battle with the Hornets next week, the final game of the season.

Gametime is 7:30 p.m. The Farwell team, which has an impressive 7-1 record going into the game, will be an odds-on favorite to win its 14th consecutive victory over the Mustangs. The last time Bovina defeated Farwell in a football tilt was in 1954.

The Steers dropped their season opener to the Friona Chiefs and since then have been rolling on like "Ole Man River." During their seven game win streak, they have downed Dimmitt, Plains, Morton, Sundown, Springlake-Earth, Kress and Vega.

In three district games, they've had only six points scored against them, those by Springlake-Earth, which they defeated, 26-6. They slapped Kress, a team the Mustangs won over last week, 14-12, by an impressive 60-0 count and last week whitewashed Vega, 28-0.

The Farwell offense features "a tremendous running game plus a good passing attack," according to Mustang Head Coach Roy Stone. "They are a good, solid football team with good size and quickness," the Mustang mentor says.

The running attack is built around the Phillips boys, Craig and Al, who are cousins and seniors.

The quarterback is Gregg Hargrove, who is considered to be a good passer. Hargrove has three good batterymates including Danny Prince, Dean Stovall and Kyle Sheets, Stovall

has been his favorite receiver so far this season.

Coached by Toby Booth, a former Farwell high star, the Steers use their running game primarily, but can successfully go to the airways when it is necessary.

The Capitol City boys had a 4-4-1 mark last year and have already improved on that considerably this year.

With their 2-1 district mark, the Mustangs are still in the race for the district championship. Staying in the race, however, depends entirely on the Farwell game.

By winning over the Steers and Vega in their final game, the Mustangs would be in a position to tie for the championship if the Steers beat Sudan next week. That would create a three-way tie and a coin toss would be used to determine the district representative. Sudan could be eliminated from the

district championship by losing to Kress this week and to Farwell next week. If that happens, the Mustangs could be the district representative by winning over Farwell and Vega.

Scores of Bovina-Farwell games for the last 13 years, all in Farwell's favor, have been 0-6, in '55, 0-13 in '56, 12-38 in '57, 8-38 in '58, 12-36 in '59, 12-44 in '60, 0-6 in '61, 14-18 in '62, 0-46 in '63, 0-21 in '64, 0-6 in '65, 12-28 in '66, and 6-7 last year.

The natural rivalry between the two schools is expected to attract a good crowd for the tilt.

Commenting on the Kress game, Coach Stone said, "We were happy to win the game, but we were disappointed in our offense. All of our boys played pretty well on defense, generally speaking, but we had too many just looking on on offense."

## Kress, Colts Split Games

The seventh grade Colts tucked another football victory under their belts here Thursday night, winning 24-8 over the Kress Kangaroos at Mustang Field.

Eighth grade and "B" team lost a couple of heart-breakers after each lost a key player to injury for the second half. Eighth grade was defeated, 30-7, and the "B" team lost, 16-8.

Coach Bill Nicholas' seventh graders took the opening kick-off and after a long drive, Billy Shelby ran over from the one-yard line for six points. Tony Serna made the two extra points.

Early in the second quarter, Kress tied up the ball game. Bovina's second score, made

in the same stanza, was a 50-yard pass play from Keith Moore to Billy Shelby. Shelby ran over the two points with the half ending, 16-8.

Good team defense was the story, along with successful offensive plays, Nicholas said.

McCormick suffered a dislocated shoulder at the half-way mark, putting him out of action for the remainder of the season. Kress scored their 30 points in the second half of the ballgame.

Nicholas said the eighth graders played their best game of the year and commended the boys for "real team effort." The "B" team played one of its best games of the year and showed a defensive effort that was outstanding, Coach Roger Ezell said.

Kress came back in the second quarter to tie the game 8-8 at halftime.

Harris received a concussion just before the half ended and was out for the rest of the game. He will also possibly be out for the rest of the year, Ezell said.

Kress made its winning punch in the third quarter scoring eight points.

Leroy Pierson was outstanding on both defense and offense. Hugh Rogers and Mike McMeans showed up well on defense, although the entire team turned in a good performance.

# Mustangs Get Second 3-A Win In 2 Weeks

The extra point kicking toe of Kenny Stone proved to be the winning margin in Friday night's District 3-A football game between the Bovina Mustangs and the Kress Kangaroos. The score was 14-12 with the Mustangs on the top end.

Stone successfully booted the extra point after each of Bovina's two touchdowns. A tough Bovina defense halted passing attempts by Kress for two ex-

tra points after each of its six-pointers.

The Mustangs had a 14-0 lead before the host team got on the scoreboard.

Bovina missed two scoring opportunities in the first half which would have made the game one-sided in Bovina's favor.

They lost the ball on downs one time at the Kress' three yard line and another time at the five.

A blocked punt put the Ponies in position to get their first score. The Kangaroos attempted the kick after being halted at their own 43 yard line. Stuart McMeans blocked the punt, knocking it back down field and giving Bovina possession at the Kress 16 yard line. Halfback Danny Stanberry made one yard, then McMeans got 12 and a first down at the three yard line.

They lost the ball on downs one time at the Kress' three yard line and another time at the five.

The Mustangs threw only twice and both were incomplete.

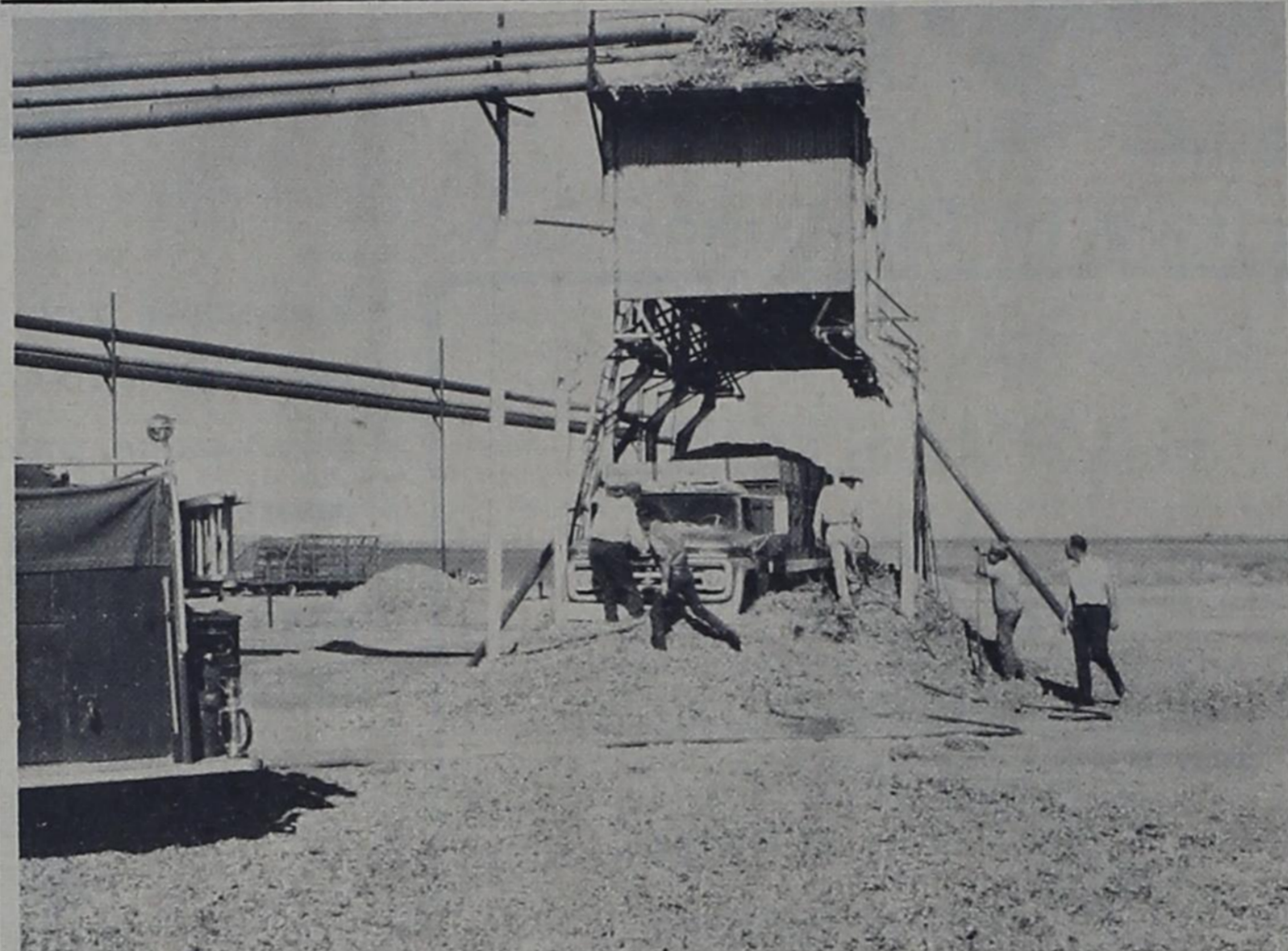

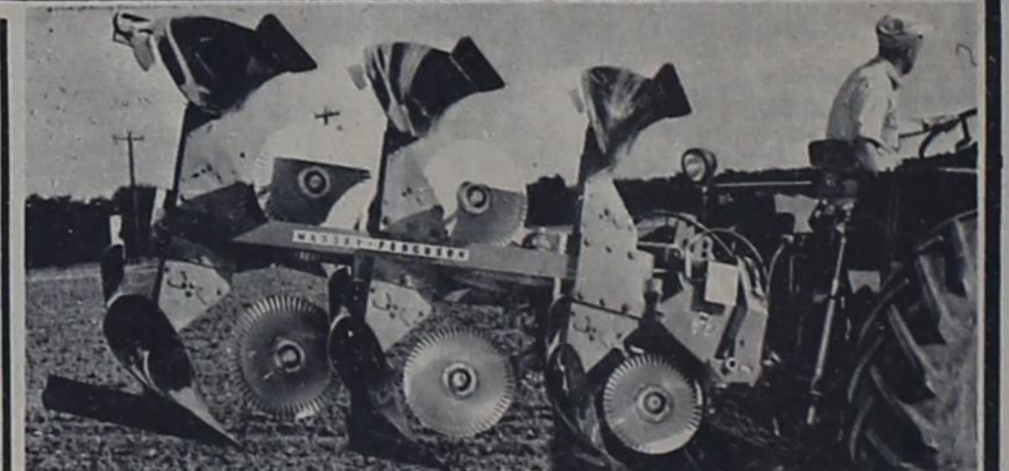

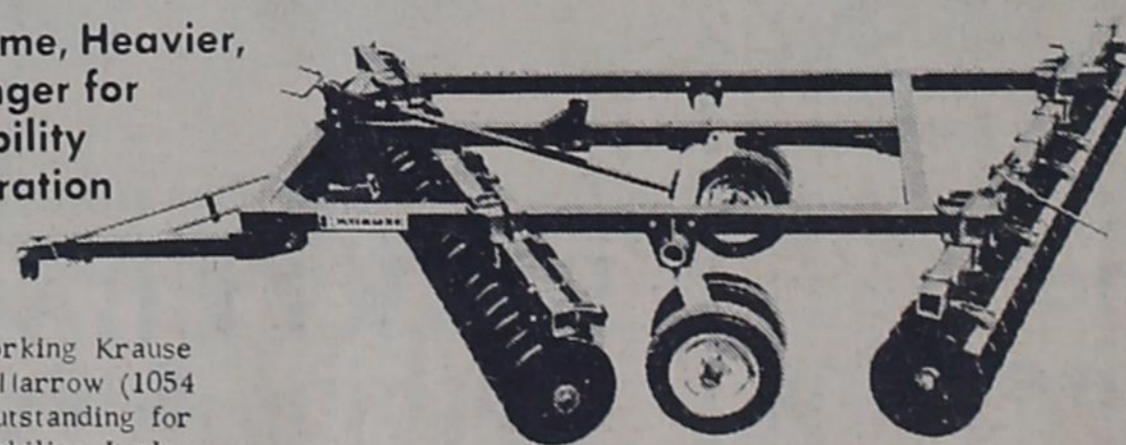
