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### GUS F. SCHREINER HOME- IS NEARING COMPLETION

Foundation of L. A. Schreiner Residence, Show Place of City, Is Well Under Way.

Construction of the beautiful colonial residence of Gus F. Schreiner, Kerrville stockman and capitalist, is being rushed to completion by Contractors McCreary & Schott. The home, a stone, hollow tile and concrete structure of twelve rooms, will cost more than \$40,000 and will be one of the most modern in the Hill Country.

Besides the many conveniences included in the Schreiner home, it will have an unusually large and artistic ballroom in the third story, accommodating several scores of dancers at a time.

It was intended to build the residence entirely of stone, but cutters were so difficult to secure, it was decided to finish the second and third stories in reinforced concrete and hardwood. The beautiful structure is situated on a prominent rise just south of Kerrville and adjoining the ranch and farm owned by Mr. Schreiner.

Work on the foundation and concrete forms for the home of L. A. Schreiner, almost directly across the Guadalupe River southwest of Kerrville, is progressing nicely and but for delay in getting shipments of cement work would be well under way, Mr. Schreiner stated yesterday.

This home will embody all that is modern and convenient, to say nothing of the many beautiful details planned by Mr. and Mrs. Schreiner. It will also be built of rock, brick and concrete, reinforced throughout and with extra strong foundations. It is situated on one of the highest building sites around Kerrville and commands a view of the hills and vales in all directions except immediately southwest. While the cost of the home is not yet known, it is estimated that it will run considerably more than \$50,000.

### J. W. BAILEY GREETED AT GREENVILLE WITH CHEERS

Ex-Senator Discusses War, Suffrage and Prohibition, and States His Attitude.

Greenville, Tex., April 15.—In his speech here this afternoon, Former Senator J. W. Bailey expressed his willingness to vote for this resolution: "We cordially indorse all the acts and measures of the Wilson Administration which are in accordance with Democratic principles."

For his opponents not to agree to this, said Mr. Bailey, must mean that "they are trying to deceive the people into indorsing acts and measures that are not Democratic."

"Isn't that a fair proposition?" he asked. There were many affirmative responses from the audience. "Would you want me to vote for anything that is not Democratic?" A chorus of noes gave reply. "Well," said Mr. Bailey, "I wouldn't do it if you wanted me to." (More applause.)

Bailey in Fine Form

Mr. Bailey spoke in much more fiery fashion than heretofore in this campaign, several times applying to certain men opposing him the "shorter and uglier" word. Although speaking in the home of B. F. Looney, Mr. Bailey did not refer to him. He described one of his former friends who is now aligned against him as "the only Irish hypocrite I have ever known." Frequently and derisively he discussed the "sissies" who oppose him, saying his side has more men more brains and more nerve than the others. He called the names of women signers of the Dallas resolutions and, calling their husbands' names, expressed wonderment as to how those husbands handled the children while their wives were away. Mr. Bailey said also, with reference to some of his opponents, that he had rather be a woman who wants to be a man than to be a man who wants to be a woman.

In his speech here today, Mr. Bailey addressed one of the most—indeed, probably the most—enthusiastically responsive and persistently demonstrative audiences of this campaign. The degree of approval expressed by those who heard him was extreme, and the occasion was notable for the very large number of persons who attempted vainly to get to the meeting place. Not less than 3,000 were wedged into the building—literally packing every bit of space—and the streets outside were blocked with others clamoring and shouting and trying to enter. The downtown streets were lined with thickly parked rows of automobiles that had brought people from all over Hunt and from parts of adjoining counties, and the sidewalks of the business section were thick with those who "milled around town," being unable to get to the speaking. From beginning to end of the speech Mr. Bailey was cheered and applauded, and

### CONVENTION LAWS OF TEXAS ARE CLEARLY EXPLAINED

Opinion by Attorney General's Office Governing Precincts, Counties and State.

Austin, Tex., April 19.—Information relative to precinct, county and State conventions to select delegates to the National Convention is contained in an opinion given by the Attorney General's Department and prepared by Assistant Attorney General L. C. Sutton to John W. Hornsby, County Attorney of Travis County. The information contained in the opinion follows:

The State Convention. The State Democratic Convention to elect delegates to the National Democratic Convention will be held at such place as may be designated by the State Executive Committee of the party on the fourth Tuesday of May, 1920, which is May 25, 1920.

Selection of Delegates.—Said State Convention shall be composed of delegates duly elected by the voters of said political party in the several counties of the State in the following manner:

Precinct Convention.—On the first Saturday in May, 1920, that is, May 1, 1920, a primary convention shall be held in each voting precinct of the county, which precinct primary convention shall elect delegates to the county convention.

Hours of Holding Precinct Convention.—The precinct convention shall be held between the hours of 10 a. m. and 8 p. m. on May 1, 1920.

Qualifications of Members.—Only qualified voters of each voting precinct are entitled to assemble and participate in the precinct convention.

Presiding Officer.—Appointment and Qualifications.—The precinct convention shall be presided over by a chairman, who shall have been previously appointed by the County Executive Committee of the party, and said chairman shall be a qualified voter in said election precinct.

Officers of Precinct Convention.—Said precinct convention may elect from among its members a secretary and such other officers as may be necessary to conduct the business of the convention.

Powers of Chairman.—The chairman of said precinct convention shall possess all the powers and authority that is given to election judges under the provisions of the election laws of this State. This means, among other things, that he may swear members and interrogate them relative to their qualifications and require them to establish their right to participate in the convention.

List of Voters.—Before transacting any business, the chairman of the precinct convention shall make or cause to be made a list of all qualified voters present; and the name of no person shall be entered upon said list, nor shall he be permitted to vote or to participate in the business of such convention, until it is made to appear that he is a qualified voter in said precinct from a certified list of qualified voters, the same as is required in conducting a general election.

Election of Delegates to County Convention.—After the precinct convention is organized, as above provided, it shall elect its delegates to the county convention and transact such other business as may properly come before it.

Record of Proceedings.—The officers of said precinct convention shall keep a written record of its proceedings, including a list of the delegates elected to the county convention, which record shall constitute the returns from said convention.

The same shall be signed officially, sealed up and safely transmitted by the officers thereof to the chairman of the County Executive Committee of the party and to be used by the executive committee in making up a roll of the delegates to the county convention.

The County Convention.—The county convention shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Saturday in May, 1920, which is May 4, 1920, and shall elect delegates to the State Convention aforesaid.

Qualifications of Voters.—These conventions are affairs of the Democratic party, and hence only those who are Democrats can participate in same. In the foregoing, wherever it is explained that only qualified voters can

vote or participate in the conventions or be chairman thereof, it means those qualified to vote in primary elections; that is, for instance, persons who, in addition to being qualified voters generally under the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, are also full-fledged citizens of the United States; they must be either natural-born citizens or those fully naturalized; persons who have simply declared their intention to become citizens are not qualified voters within the meaning of the law governing the holding of these conventions.

Women are qualified voters within the meaning of the law governing the holding of conventions of this kind and may vote and participate in such conventions if they are otherwise qualified voters.

Presidential Primary Law.—It will be remembered that the statute passed in 1913, attempting to provide for the holding of primary elections on May 1 to select delegates to the National Convention, etc., was held unconstitutional by our State Supreme Court. Thus we must resort to the convention system as above outlined, and which is provided for by a previous statute to the one held invalid.

### CALL DEMOCRATIC PRE-IDENTIAL PRECINCT PRIMARY CONVENTIONS

The conventions above named are hereby called to meet at 4 o'clock p. m., May 1, 1920, at the usual voting places in the several precincts of this county, for the purpose of electing delegates to the Democratic County Convention on May 4, 1920.

The County Democratic Executive Committee has appointed the following persons to preside in their respective precincts:

Precinct No. 1, H. C. Geddie, Kerrville; No. 2, W. D. Burney, Center Point; No. 3, F. G. Holekamp, Cypress Creek; No. 4, Chas. Eddins, Sunset; No. 5, W. H. Furr, Grape Creek; No. 6, J. O. McNealy, Ingram; No. 7, Harry Williams, Turtle Creek; No. 8, Gus Ehlers, Lone Valley; No. 9, Henry Vanham, Divide; No. 10, W. R. Schreiner, Live Oak; No. 11, Cleve Griffin, Pebble; No. 12, H. I. Hardin, Hunt; No. 13, J. A. Peril, Reservation.

It is suggested that after the convention has been called to order and its purpose stated, the following order be pursued:

1. Before transacting any business the chairman shall cause to be made a list of the qualified Democratic voters present and no person shall be allowed to participate in the business of such convention until it is made to appear that he or she is a qualified Democratic voter in said precinct, from a certified list of qualified voters, the same as required in conducting a general election, save and except that under the primary election laws of Texas women shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges as men in voting in primaries.
2. Elect a secretary.
3. Elect delegates to County Convention.
4. Adopt such resolutions and instructions desired.
5. Adjourn.

The officers of said convention shall keep a written record of the proceedings, including a list of the delegates elected to the County Convention, which shall constitute the returns from said convention to the County Convention. The same shall be signed officially by the chairman and secretary, and sealed up and transmitted by the officers thereof to the undersigned on or before May 4, 1920.

Where precinct chairman appointed to preside is absent, or fails or refuses to act, the qualified Democratic voters of the precinct assembled at the time and place as provided and directed, shall elect a chairman and proceed as provided by law.

This is a call for a Democratic Convention to be composed of men and women who believe in the principles of the Democratic party, endorse its policies and will support its nominees; therefore, only duly qualified Democratic voters should be permitted to participate therein and each precinct chairman should use all means necessary to protect and preserve the political integrity of the party.

### CONGRESSMAN CLAUDE B. HUDSPETH PETH MAKES ENVIABLE RECORD

Political wisecracks, who ventured the assertion, or prophesy—whatever may be its classification in political parlance—that before one could become useful to one's constituents he would have to bask in the shadows of the Capitol for many moons or so, missed their guess as far as Congressman Claude B. Hudspeth is concerned.

Just about a year has rolled around. Twelve months have been tapped off the calendar and there is considerable to the credit of the Congressman from the Sixteenth Congressional District of Texas. The figures on the credit side of the ledger have not been piled up by any loafing on the job. It required days and nights of labor. In point of size and also variety of interests, the Sixteenth Congressional District ranks with the largest in the broad lands of the United States. In area it is probably the largest congressional district.

Anyway, it comprises thirty-nine counties and it is a day and night job to guard the best interests of this wide stretch of territory. It may be a fact that the newly elected member to Congress, making his congressional bow for the first time, experiences a feeling of awkwardness. Observation has led to the conclusion that this is possibly the very best sensation he could undergo for the reason that old members, who are really in a position to render every assistance, appear to resent a showing of over-confidence on the part of a brand new member and therefore his travels along congressional highways may be more or less uphill work.

On the 4th of March, 1919, Congressman Hudspeth sat in his congressional seat for the first time. As he gazed around at his colleagues he came to the decision that the best thing he could do would be to make friends with Senators and other Congressmen. He knew the other seven-

teen members of the Texas delegation and was known to them personally; intimately by some, and by others on account of his sixteen years as one of the leaders in Texas political circles. Deciding that the Texas end of Congress was all right, the member from the Sixteenth District determined to know and make friends of the members from other States. Not only was it good to have friends in the House and Senate, but he considered it would be part of wisdom to know and have as friends the heads of the various Government departments. So, the first few months of his new congressional life was spent in making and gathering about him friends. He figured in this that friends could lend valuable support in obtaining needed legislation and improvements for his district, and heads of the departments could materially aid these measures by their recommendations.

Congressman Hudspeth first stepped into the Capitol's limelight when he delivered a stirring speech in the House, urging the complete protection of the lives and property of American citizens in whatever clime they might happen to be. If this could be accomplished in no other way, he favored sending our troops into any country which withheld this protection and

## CATHOLIC CHURCH NOTES

By Father Kemper

Services this Sunday will be held at 7 o'clock in St. Mary's Church so as to keep the monthly engagement in Comfort at 9 a. m. There will be several auto loads of Knights of Columbus to accompany Father Kemper and to continue thence to San Antonio, where many new Kerrville candidates will be initiated into this benevolent and patriotic order.

The K. C.'s are subscribing to a fifty thousand dollar monument of Lafayette, which will be presented to France in the person of President Deschanel and Marshal Foch. This statue, sculptured by Bartlett, will be a replica of his masterpiece in the Paris Louvre, but will have the following bas-reliefs: Christopher Columbus and his associate Franciscan priests discovering America, Marshal Foch's address to the overseas Knights, President Wilson's speech before Congress and General Pershing at the tomb of Lafayette. For the presentation of this American gift to our sister republic in arms, the K. C.'s are arranging a co-operative tour without a cent of profit, for over one thousand members, not only to Metz but also to several of the most noteworthy points in Western Europe.

Last Sunday in the presence of the Baltimore Knights, assembled in his cathedral, the venerable Cardinal Gibbons, delegated by Pope Benedict XV, conferred the Knighthood of St. Gregory on Admiral Benson.

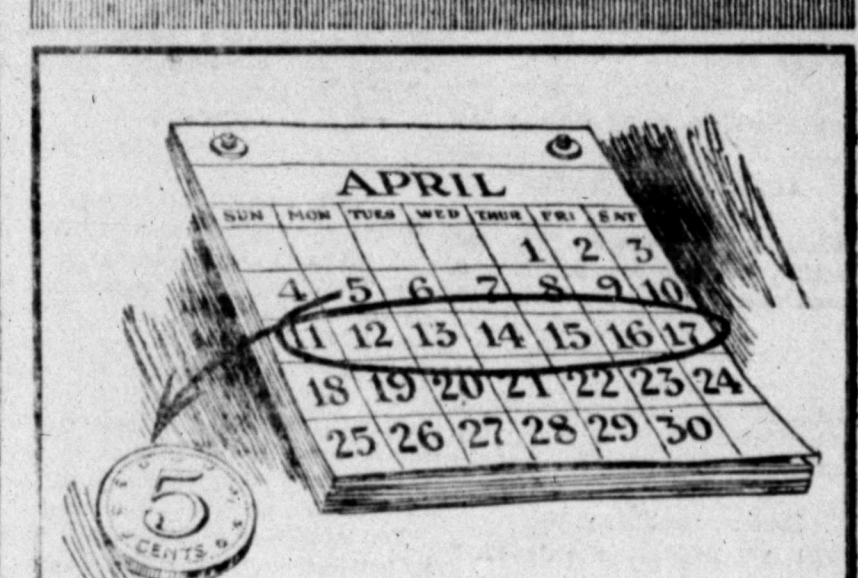

#### TRADE AT HOME

The familiar expression "Trade at Home" is a more comprehensive term than at first blush it is often taken to be. The usual idea is that it means only that Mr. Ordinary Citizen should supply all his wants at the local stores. So far, so good, but it means more than that when you get right down to the true inwardness of Community Development and mutual helpfulness. For instance, it is just as important that the storekeeper, when in need of something out of his own line, buy it from his home merchant who handles it.

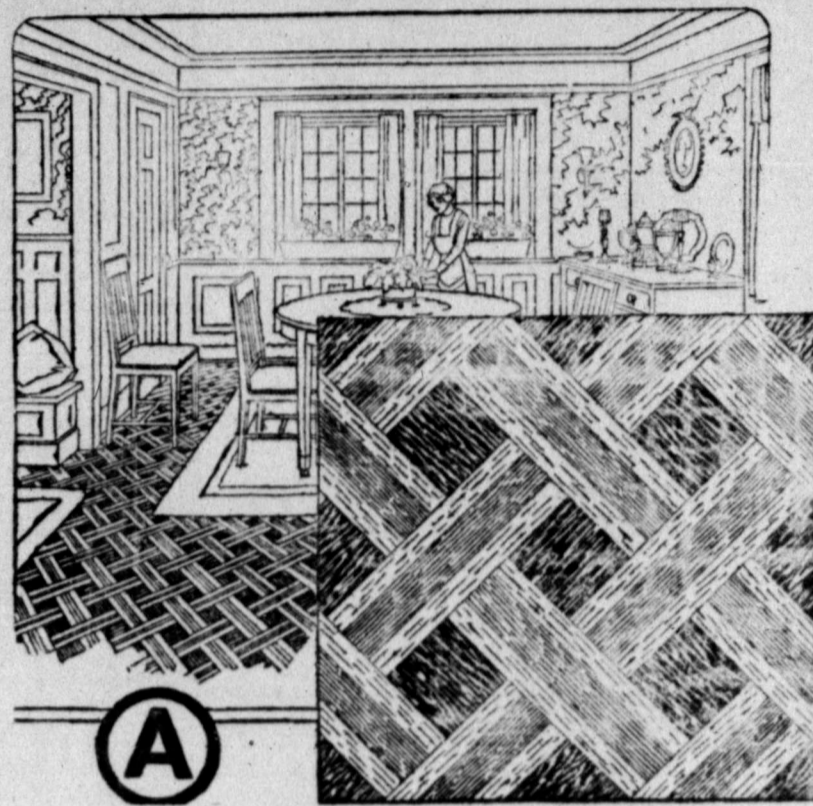

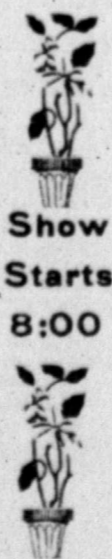

## CONGRESSMAN HUDSPETH MAKES ENVIABLE RECORD

(Continued From Page One)

having them remain until the derelict country fully demonstrated its ability to afford this. He was a new member and it was his maiden speech. Under the rules he was allowed just so many minutes, much too few for the subject. He was just getting warmed up well when the interruption came: "The gentleman's time has expired." Not only Democrats, but Republicans were on their feet, moving that the time of the gentleman from the Sixteenth Congressional District of Texas had expired. This was done not only once, but several times, and altogether he spoke for more than forty-five minutes. During the speech the applause from the Republican side was just as hearty and enthusiastic as it was from the Democratic side. The Congressman from the Sixteenth Congressional District of Texas had arrived. Republican colleagues joined the throng of Democrats that came forward to shake hands with him.

The Congressman's creed is "to get action on any request is by personal attention to it." He believes that a personal call will accomplish a great deal more than any letter no matter how finely it may be couched. Taking on a creed, those who know him, declare that he always lives up to it. He has done it in this instance.

It was several months after the armistice had been signed when Congressman Hudspeth came to Washington to take up his congressional duties. A flood of letters began to pour in from relatives who wanted to obtain the release of soldiers. The war was over and they were needed at home. These were busy days, occupied with making personal calls at the War Department, cabing and telegraphing. No opportunity was overlooked. A request taken up was followed from one headquarter to another and over the same route again if necessary. The many who were able to gain early discharges owe this to the untiring efforts of Congressman Hudspeth.

Files crammed with correspondence constitute the evidence of the utmost care and devoted attention that was given to the compensation cases of disabled service men and allotment matters of the relatives of soldiers. A letter from a disabled soldier that his compensation check was over-due resulted in the immediate call of the Congressman at the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, where he remained or went back until the case was adjusted and the check was on the way to the soldier. Allotment cases received the same attention.

Upon their discharge soldiers were entitled to certain equipment and Congressman Hudspeth sent out notices to this effect. Applications from all over the district flowed into the Congressman. Each was presented to the Quartermaster General with the request that the soldier be given his equipment. There were also claims for additional mileage, lost baggage, and requests for the victory button. All were attended to.

Shortly after coming to Washington, the fight to have the War Department erect a hospital at El Paso was renewed. Congressman Hudspeth entered into this with all his enthusiasm and energy. The fact that expended by the government for this purpose is due largely to his individual efforts. The department finally reached the conclusion that there was enough money for the hospital, but it was in another fund and it lacked authority to expend it unless given permission. This should come from the Senate and House military committees and it was decided that a letter from each chairman recommending the expenditure would be sufficient. It was Congressman Hudspeth who obtained the consent of Senator Wadsworth, chairman of the Senate Military Committee, to sign such a letter after it was believed that he would not. With this letter, the necessary letter from the House Military Committee followed and the department has issued instructions to proceed with the work of constructing the hospital.

There is another incident which fits in with the Congressman's reputation for making every effort to have a meritorious request of a constituent granted. The Boy Scouts of El Paso owe the Congressman the credit for last summer's vacation spent in the New Mexico mountains. It was a question of obtaining army trucks to take them to the camping ground. The heart of the commander of the El Paso district was in the right place. He knew the boys had their hearts more than earned it by their valiant work in the Liberty Bond drives. He wanted to furnish the trucks, but there was an army regulation against it. If this could be removed, he would be more than happy to have the trucks turned up and sent on their way to New Mexico with the Boy Scouts as passengers. Telegrams were sent to Congressman Hudspeth. A call at the War Department established the fact there was a regulation against the use of the trucks for the purpose desired by the Boy Scouts. Of course, it was to be sincerely regretted, and it was agreed that it was a shame the boys would be deprived of their vacation in the mountains. Back in El Paso, Congressman Hudspeth knew there were 150 little fellows, drawing mental pictures of camp fires, smoke curling up through the branches of tall trees; pots and pans, and other things that go to make up a real camp; tents and bedding rolls. He felt like these little fellows depended on him.

"What's the difference between the soldier and the Boy Scout, whose untiring efforts and patriotic assists in obtaining money with which to properly equip the soldiers in the fighting lines?" the Congressman inquired of War Department officials. He hammered this point home until it was finally agreed that the Boy

### The Law of Compensation

"To him that hath shall be given, and from him that hath not, shall be taken away, even that which he hath."

We have heard good, sincere, intelligent and orthodox men puzzle over that passage of Scripture, groping for an interpretation which should, as they said, be free from the appearance of hardness and injustice which it bears on its face.

To us, we confess, there is no such appearance in the passage quoted. We regard it as merely a concise promulgation of The Law of Compensation on the job, so to speak, working out to its logical conclusion.

The truth of the statement, just as it stands, appears to us to be writ large in the lives and daily experience of humanity as to need no amplification.

It is true of morals. It is true of intellect. It is true of character. It is true in many other applications, but it is of its financial aspect that we purpose here to speak. Like attracts like. The mass gathers and absorbs the itinerant atom.

### J. W. BAILEY GREETED AT GREENVILLE WITH CHEERS

(Continued From Page One)

encouraged by a running fire of approving commentaries and interruptions of acquiescence from his hearers. Several elderly gentlemen near the front shouted "A-a-a-men!" with energetic regularity. "That's right, Joe!" "You betcher!" and a dozen companion expressions came almost unceasingly. At one point, as Mr. Bailey was referring to "old timers," someone roared fervently, "Let's go back!" and, again, when he was considering certain features of the Wilson Administration, there was a lusty comment from one of his supporters: "Why, Joe, it's worse than the Kaiser's!" The platform was reserved for women, and a considerable proportion of those in the audience and on the streets seemed to be farmers. Mr. Bailey was presented with bouquets by Miss Luzelle Horton and Mrs. L. M. Byrd.

"If a man didn't feel his record to be unassailable he would shrink in shame from acknowledging a tribute like that," said Mr. Bailey. "But I can not only accept these beautiful flowers from such immaculate hands, but I can take from the hands of men—oil-stained though many of them be—those expressions of the ballot that are the will of free men in this country."

#### Answers Some Assertions

Mr. Bailey used vigorous language in referring to one of the speakers against him, who has been quoted as saying Mr. Bailey makes a prohibition speech in North Texas and an anti speech in South Texas. He also pronounced untrue any statement that he did not buy Liberty Bonds during the war, and said any man who hereafter repeats it deliberately tells a falsehood.

"I can not bring back liquor if I would. I would not if I could. Isn't that plain enough? Do you think I would stand here and tell you one thing when I purpose another? (Many cries, no, no.) In view of the fact that we have State and National prohibition amendments to the Constitution they are assuming that Bailey can do a great deal when they say he will bring liquor back. If they could get the people to believe that I would get more votes, for this thing is a lot dryer than a great many pros want it." (Much laughter and applause.)

After telling of his Liberty Bond purchases, which he sold at a discount after the armistice in order to pay back the money he borrowed to buy them, Mr. Bailey added that his war record is better than that of those opposing him.

"I have but two children in the world. They are both boys. I gave them both, with my blessings. They volunteered and did not wait for the draft. My youngest son, then at school, went five days after war was declared. Could any man do more than that? Yet some of these men had as many sons as I. And some of their sons claimed exemption. And some found soft, swivel-chair jobs and never heard a cannon roar or smelled powder. While my son was on the battle front, his comrades falling dead around him, their sons were safely encased in bomb-proof positions."

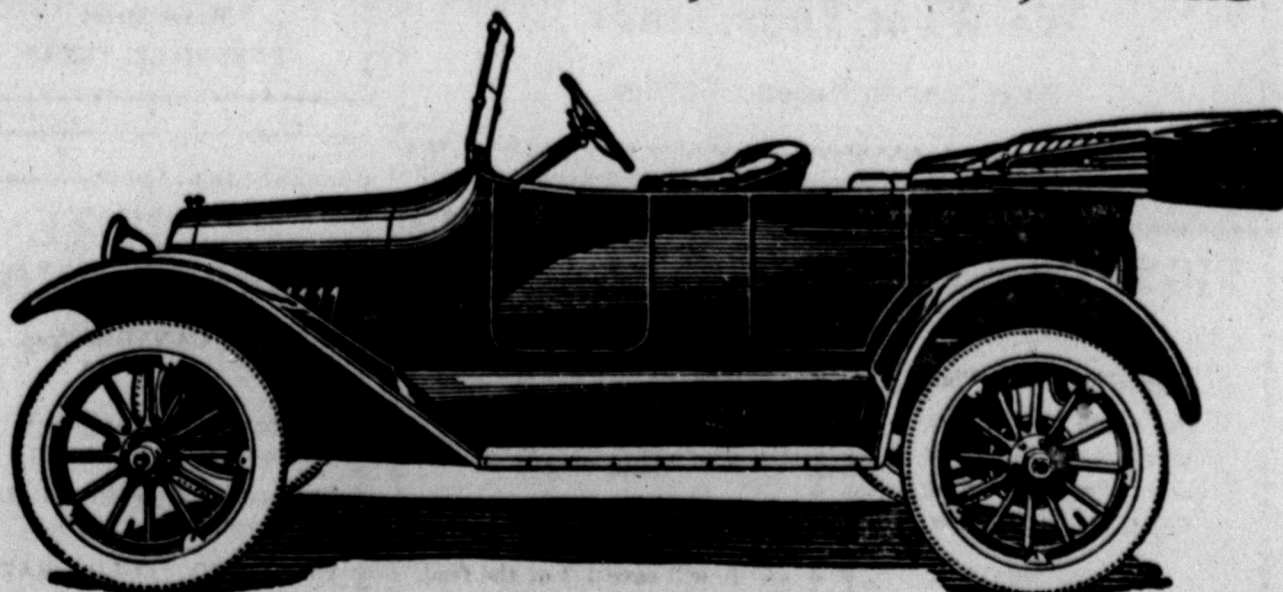
