### G. C. FULLER OF CENTER POINT MAKES COMMENDABLE RECORD

Austin, May 29.—Grady Carlyle Fuller of Center Point, who was with the P. B. Brooks Company on levee and drainage engineering work at Cooper in the summer of 1918, has served this year as student assistant in physics at the University of Texas. His work consists of grading the daily problem sheets for a section of about 200 students. Mr. Fuller says that this work is agreeable and structive, since it is a review of the work done in the first year. He says of the work in physics at the University: "Physics is not only a very interesting course of study, but also a very instructive one, for it helps us to understand and appreciate the causes and effects of natural phenomena that are all about us. In order to really appreciate and understand the beauty and mysteries of nature, we must study her laws. We come to realize how necessary to human existence are the laws of gravity, the conduction or transmission of heat, etc. Most of us take nature's laws as a matter of course, because they are so commonplace and familiar to us that we do not realize their significance. However, it is only when we understand these laws and are always conscious of them that we can better understand and reverence the wisdom of Him who made and controls them.

"The equipment of the School of Physics at the University of Texas is very satisfactory and we cannot hope for better instructors than those who now compose the faculty."
