BAILEY CHARGES SIX MEN CONTROL POLITICS IN TEXAS

Ennis, Tex.—Six men have been dictating the politics of Texas and the policies for which the party in the State stands, J. W. Bailey, candidate for Governor, declared in an address here. The six men, he said, are Thomas B. Love, Marius Marcellus Crane, Cullen F. Thomas, M. H. Wolfe, Cone Johnson and Thomas H. Ball. He declared that he proposes, if elected to Governor, "to take the government of the State away from these men and restore it to the people."

He declared that the people in the precinct conventions in May did not adopt resolutions of their own making, but resolutions sent them by these six men. He criticized the Legislature for ratifying the Federal suffrage amendment after the people had refused to adopt a constitutional amendment granting State suffrage.

He reiterated his position on union labor, producing a circular which calls upon organized labor to oppose Bailey in the primary.

He again pledged an economical administration of the State's affairs.

He criticized the Texas delegation at San Francisco, saying they favored a dry declaration the State platform and then refused to support the Bryan dry plank at San Francisco.

Charbon Breaks Out

Bracketville, Tex.—State Veteri-
narian Cloutt and two assistants have
arrived in Bracketville, and with this
place as their headquarters, have
opened an active campaign against
charbon, which recently broke out in
the lower part of Edwards County and
spread into the extreme northern
portion of this and Uvalde Counties.
At the first intimation that the dis-
ease was present, local health and
county officers secured a large quan-
tity of vaccine and also took active
measures to prevent the spread of this
disease, as well as to stamp it out.

The arrival of the State officials
found the work progressing and they
have taken complete charge of the
fight, placing a triple quarantine
against Edwards, Uvalde and Kinney
Counties, prohibiting movement of
livestock therein. Mr. Cloutt issued
a statement that there was no need
to be alarmed as the outbreak would
be short in duration. Hearty co-
operation on the part of stockmen of
the three counties have enabled much
progress in the fight against charbon
to be made.

Besides the triple quarantine, local
inter-county quarantines have been
placed by local authorities, although
the disease is confined at present in
the northern portion of this county.

AUTHORIZING ONE AND ONE-HALF PER CENT AD VALOREM TAX BY CITIES AND TOWNS OF FIVE THOUSAND OR LESS POPULATION
 Senate Joint Resolution No. 12
 Proposing an amendment to Section 4 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less than one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent, and making appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
 Section 1. That Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:
 Section 4. Cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less may be chartered alone by general law. They may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law, but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year which shall exceed one and one-half per cent of the taxable property of such city; and all taxes shall be collectible only in current money, and all licenses and occupation taxes levied, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties accruing to said cities and towns shall be collectible only in current money.
 Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment of Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by towns and cities having a population of five thousand or less from one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent of any one year," and all voters opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment of Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by towns and cities having a population of five thousand or less from one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent of any one year."
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.
 Sec. 4. That the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

RELATING TO THE MANNER OF COMPENSATION OF PUBLIC OFFICIALS
 House Joint Resolution No. 7
 A joint resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State by adding to Article 16 thereof a new Section, to be known as Section 60; providing for the compensation of public officials:

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
 Section 1. That there is hereby added to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, a new section to be known as Section 60 or Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which shall read as follows:
 Section 60. Compensation of Public Officials: All State, district, county and precinct officers within this State shall receive as compensation for their services a salary, the amount of which, the terms and methods of payment and the fund out of which such payments shall be made, shall be ascertained, declared and fixed by the Legislature from time to time; provided that the Legislature may make such exception as it may deem advisable.
 This section shall supersede all other provisions of this Constitution fixing and declaring the compensation of officers by salary, fees or otherwise, and all provisions for salaries or other compensation for public officials, executive, legislative or judicial.
 Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and law of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters, the following words: "Official Ballot" "For the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding thereto Section 60, providing for compensation of public officials." "Against the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding thereto Section 60, providing for compensation of public officials."
 Those voters who favor such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "Against the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing compensation for public officials." Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through them, the words "For the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing compensation for public officials." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.
 Sec. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.

INSTRUCTIONS TO PRESIDING OFFICERS OF PRIMARY

We take it that practically all those named to conduct this primary have heretofore had similar service, therefore, it is not necessary to give you lengthy instructions concerning your duties, but the following may be beneficial:

1. Precincts that cast less than one hundred votes at last primary election must have two judges and two clerks, the presiding officer acting as one of the judges; and precincts of one hundred or more votes, two additional clerks shall be appointed and they will be paid two dollars each for this service.

2. Each presiding officer will select and appoint his own assistants, but they should be Democrats and otherwise legally qualified under the law as voters of the precinct, and women may serve on the election boards.

3. The polls must be opened at 8 and closed at 7 o'clock.

4. Each voter must vote in the precinct of his residence; the residence of a married man is where his wife resides, and that of a single man where he usually sleeps at night.

5. It is not within the province of any person to challenge the good faith of a voter; you can not prejudge what the voter will do at the following general election; however, where it is known or believed that a voter did not support the Democratic nominees at the previous general election, his right to participate in this primary MAY be challenged and then the burden is placed upon the voter to establish his right by his written affidavit to the effect that he did support such nominees at that time, otherwise he is not entitled to vote when challenged.

6. In every instance where a doubt arises concerning the right of a voter to vote, the doubt should be resolved in favor of the voter, for the reason if the vote is not legal it can be thrown out on contest.

7. The certified poll list will enable you to ascertain you have paid poll taxes in your precinct and you should carefully check off each voter as he goes to vote and perjure himself to vote and perjure himself to vote and perjure himself to vote under exemption or otherwise.

8. No ballot can be counted for any candidate when the primary pledge has in any way been scratched or mutilated; it then becomes void.

9. Mail the returns at once in the two envelopes found among the supplies or send them by private means, but do not make a special trip to bring the returns in, for the reason we have not sufficient funds to pay this charge. Hold the box containing the ballots and bring or send it in at a later time and leave it with the County Clerk.

10. Naturally many things may come up on which you desire advice and I shall always be ready to render you all the assistance I can. Phone me if it becomes important and necessary.

11. It is hoped that we will have a large and enthusiastic primary, for experience has taught us that this is the best plan in selecting those whom we desire to serve us; our National Convention has been held, a platform adopted and candidates named for President and Vice President; it now remains for us to make such further nominations as the ballot will indicate, and then go forward to the November election with every hope of victory. Let us all do our part as free American citizens and Democratic voters.
