************* REACTION TO the pardoning of ex-president Nixon by President Ford, as with most of the other Watergate-related events, pretty well followed partyline politics, with the Democrats disapproving and the Republicans approving.

The Watergate fiasco has already developed more avenues than we ever dreamed possible.

However, we honestly believe that President Ford has taken a step to attempt to get the issue behind us, so that our nation might turn its attention to matters that affect the nation much more vitally than that which occupied the nation's leaders for the greater part of two years.

As you know by now, Knievel didn't make it across, but he's still around \$6 million richer because of the promotion, That's better than any promotion we've come up with

We were likening Knievel's headline-seeking stunt to one about this same time a year ago, when male chauvenist pig Bobby Riggs, the almost over the hill tennis buff, who was gonna try to beat the not-too-feminine Billie Jean

Come to find out, Riggs was involved in the Knievel stunt, in a round-about manner. Seems he bet the daredevil \$25,000 that he could ride a motorcycle from Las Vegas to Twin Falls, Idaho, in less than 72 hours. And he won.

It was just a bad day for Knievel all the way around.

ON THE FIRST week of the football contest, it seems we had about as hard a time as the fans did in picking the games.



Enrollment continues to ncrease at a slow rate in Bovina Schools, announces Superintendent L.F. Jacobs.


Total enrollment as of Tuesday morning was 613. This is an increase of 34 over opening day total of 579 and 13 over last week's total of 603.


