1974 Pheasant Season Starts Saturday

Season Includes 3 Weekends

Pheasant hunting, Parmer County's most popular and only wildlife sport, gets underway here at sunrise Saturday for a 16-day season, which includes three weekends.

The season begins Saturday, which is the 14th, and continues through Sunday, Dec. 29.

Hunters of this area, and many out-of-county sportsmen, are eagerly looking forward to opening day this year.

Farmers in the Bovina community report an excellent supply of birds. Hunting is expected to be less difficult this year with harvest 100 per cent complete and most of the stalk fields either shredded or burned off by this week.

Legal game again this year will be the male pheasant, the more colorful of the species.

According to Texas law, the limit is two cocks per day with four in possession. Most hunters here, however, will admit the limit is hard to fill. The wily cocks, much in evidence before the season begins, seems to have a premonition of what is to come and will be almost impossible to flush out by noon Saturday.

Although the pheasant population in Parmer County does not equal that of hunting areas in states north of here, a large number of out-of-county hunters are expected for the event with the season here gaining more publicity each year.

Tailfeather contests will be conducted in Bovina, Friona and Farwell.

Cash prizes of \$30 will be awarded in each town with \$15 for first place, \$10 for second and \$5 for third. Contest headquarters in Bovina will be Bovina Gin Co.

Hunters are encouraged to turn in their tailfeathers at the gin office where Dwight Cox, manager, is in charge of the contest.

Donating first place money this year will be Boyina Gin Co., with First State Bank of Bovina donating the second place prize money and Horn Insurance Agency donating third place prize money.

A plaque will be presented the hunter who turns in the longest tailfeather in the county. The plaque will be awarded by the Parmer County Game Management Association.

Winners in Bovina last year were Junior Lambert. first place with a 26-inch entry; Travis Hancock, second; and Ronald Mitchell, third. Pete Jesko of Lazbuddie, who turned in his entry at Farwell, was the county winner with a 273/4 inch tailfeather.

Although the 16-day season includes three weekends, the greatest number of hunters is expected to be in the fields on opening day. However, with the season running through the Christmas holidays, hunters may be more in evidence throughout the season this year with holiday visitors and college students home for the holidays.

Dependents Should Know About Benefits

Deaths of 355,000 veterans during fiscal year 1974--206,000 with World War II service--has prompted the Veterans Administration to encourage 29 million living veterans to make certain their dependents are aware of the death benefits to which they may be entitled, according to Jack Coker, VA

Regional Office Director. The FY 1974 death total was 30,000 more than the previous year and 58,000 higher than the 297,000 veterans' deaths recorded in FY 1970. The World War I veteran population was decreased by almost 10 percent with the deaths of 106,000 veterans.

Veterans families should be informed of survivor's benefits, such as dependency and indemnity compensation for service-connected death or nonserviceconnected death pensions for widows. The latter may apply only to surviving children if the widow's income makes her ineligible for VA pension benefits. Burial benefits for wartime and certain peacetime veterans include a maximum of \$250 burial or cremation allowance, plus a plot allowance not exceeding \$150 for veterans buried outside national cemeteries. In lieu of these benefits, there is an \$800 burial allowance for veterans who die of service-connected disabilities.

Cremated remains presently are interred in reduced-size gravesites at

national cemeteries. New cemeteries planned by VA's National Cemetery System include columbaria for

these remains. Burial flags and headstone or grave markers also are available for many deceased veterans upon application to the VA.

Veterans service organizations or local VA offices should be contacted for information and assistance in applying for benefits. Such documents as military separation papers, divorce decrees, guardianship or child custody evidence, birth, marriage and death certificates should be accessible to validate claims.

October **Bond Sales**

United States Savings Bond sales in Parmer County totaled \$2,773 during the month of October. Sales for the ten-month period were \$71,370 which represents 71 per cent of the 1974 sales goal for the county, according to County Bond Chairman Frank A. Spring. October sales in Texas totaled \$21,154,479 compared to sales of \$16,634,914 during the same period of 1973--an increase of 27 per cent. Total sales for the January-October 1974 period were \$195,016,443, representing 82 per cent of the \$236.8 million goal for the year.
