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MUSCLE SHOALS HOLD MILLIONS IN WEALTH IN LATENT FORM

New York, Jan. 21.-Muscle Shoals is the greatest hope of the entire and an assurance of national security tonight. in time of war.

At a point in Northern Alabama, a few miles from the Tennessee line are Florence and Sheffield, two small cities; about three miles west is Tuscumbia. The three have a combined population of but 20,000. At this point the Tennessee River, formed by the confluence of the French, Broad and Holston Rivers, in Tennessee, flows to the northwest where it empties into the Ohio at Paducah. Between Sheffield and Florence the river has cut deep into its banks. Its bed for thirty-five miles is solid rock and in this distance is a fall of nearly 150 feet,

This is Muscle Shoals.

When U. S. Took It Over Not until the United States was in the midst of the World War and hastily needed an immense explosive appropriated \$20,000,000 for construction of a dam across the Tennessee River at Muscle Shoals. 





POULTRY FLOCKS

Mash of Bran, Middlings, Meat Scrap and Cornmeal Is Best, Experts Have Proven.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Valuable results of interest to poultrymen have been obtained by the United States Department of Agriculture in the experimental tests at the government poultry farm, Beltsville, Md., where different rations have been fed to various groups of laying hens for a period of eight years. At this time, more than 1,000 hens and pullets

are used in feeding trials of this kind. The pens range in size from 30 to 50 hens, all the fowls being trap-nested during the period under test. During the last three years, the mash which has given the most uniform and best production has consisted of a mixture of 4 per cent bran, 4 per cent mid-dlings, 26 per cent meat scrap, and 66 per cent cornmeal. This mash was the result of experiments where the hens were allowed to select their own mash ingredients. When given free choice of these various ingredients, the fowls consumed the various ingredients in the above proportions. Several pens, both of Leghorns and Rhode Island Reds, of 30 hens each have averaged from 140 to 155 eggs aplece where this mash has been fed. The feeding mixture seems to be especially adapted for Leghorns, although it has also given good results with the Reds. The Wyandottes and Plymouth Rocks are inclined to accumulate too much fat when fed this mash, and one somewhat lower in meat scrap content gives better results when fed to these

two breeds. The Wyandottes and Plymouth Rocks maintained on the Beltsville farm are large, standard-size fowls, and the tendency to take on fat on this mash probably did not occur in the case of smaller types of Plymouth Rocks, such as commonly are found on commercial poultry farms. Experiments conducted during the current year in which this mash was modified by the addition of 15 per cent ground oats and the reduction of the meat

At present, a scratch mixture of three parts cracked corn, two parts oats, and one part wheat, by weight, is used with this mash,

In previous years fish meal has not proved a more profitable and practical source of protein in the mash than meat scrap, but during the present year the production has been very used, and as the price of this material has decreased, larger net incomes result from its use. Sixty per cent protein fish scrap now can be obtained for from \$1 to \$2 per hundred pounds cheaper than 55 per cent protein meat scrap. Innumerable varieties of fish scrap have been fed and no harmful effects have resulted from feeding even fish scrap of varied compositions, some being unusually rich in oil con-Tests in which only 15 per cent of meat scrap was fed in the mash have not resulted in as high production with pullets as where 20 or 25 per cent of meat scrap was used, but with yearling hens the 16 per cent meat scrap has given practically as good production as the higher. With the heavier breeds, it is advisable to decrease the amount of meat scrap during the second year, as such eeding tends to keep the fowls in better breeding condition.

FARM POULTRY

POULTRY PROFIT IS FEEDING CHRISTMAS BEST FOR GEESE

These Fowls Require Little Care and Attention Compared With Returns They Bring.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Roast goose and apple sauce! Christmas in many homes is in complete without them, and for that reason the best season in which to market the goose is the latter part of December, although there is a lim-

ited demand all the year. Goose raising is not so extensively engaged in as duck raising, the conditions under which they can be successfully raised being almost entirely different from those necessary for successful duck raising. The duck, being smaller, can be raised in a more limited space than can the goose, the latter needing free range and water, while the former has been proved to do well without water.

While the goose cannot profitably be raised in as large numbers as the duck, still it cannot justly be termed unprofitable. There are many places on a farm that are worthless for cultivation that could be utilized with excellent results for goose raising. Fields that have streams, branches, or unused springs on them could be turned to good advantage by making them into goose pastures. A goose on range will gather the largest portion of its food, consisting of grasses, insects, and other animal and vegetable matter to be found in the fields and

Young geese are fattened by placing them in a pen, not too large, so that they will not exercise too much, and by feeding them once a day all they will eat up clean of a moist mash made of one-half shorts and two-thirds cornmeal, and two feeds daily of corn with some oats or barley. While fattening young geese they should be kept as quiet as possible; no excitement whatever should disturb them, poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture say, When feeding, approach them quietly, and do not frighten them. wings reach the tail, they are ready for market, if they have been heavily fed, and should weigh between eight and ten pounds. Most young geese from general farms are sold when they are from five to eight months old.

When young goslings are to be dressed for market, they are first stuck in the roof of the mouth with a long-bladed knife and then stunned by hitting them a sharp, quick blow on the head. For dry picking the picker uses a box in front of him about the height of the knees, holding the bird with the left hand and clasping the feet and wings together; he places the head of the bird against the box and holds it in place with the knee. Pick the feathers from the body of the bird, then dampen the right hand and brush the body to remove the down. Leave about two inches of feathers on the neck, and also leave feathers on the wings at the first joint. Lay the wings against the body of the birds and tie a string around to hold in position. Place the birds, when picked, in cold water for an hour or so to plump them; if they are in the water too long they are liable to bleach and become water-soaked. They are then iced up in barrels ready

In either hen-hatched or incubatorhatched flocks, there are likely to be some backward, slow-growing, slowfeathering chicks. If the hatch is in the brooder, separate these backward chicks, and give them to a hen, or put them with a younger hatch. A turkey hen that has no family is an ideal mother for them.


