* STATE SOVEREIGNTY IN THE ENFORCEMENT THE OF LAW

Argument has been made by some people that the officers and the people of the respective counties are the judges as to how the laws should be enforced in their respective counties; that the enforcement of the laws in these counties is not a matter in which the State should interfere: and that for the State to do so is a violation of the fundamental principles of local self-government. There is no such thing as local self-government in regard to violations of the law. Our government was not instituted to favor criminals, but to protect the law-abiding. Every crime that is committed is a crime against the State. The State enacts laws, not the counties. The State is the sovereign government. Counties are but political subdivisions of the State, made by the State for the convenience of the State in the administration of the government. Counties elect their officers, but elect them to enforce State laws. Every indictment charging an offense against the law begins in the name of the State and closes against the peace and dignity of the State. Every person in the penitentiary was sent there in the name of the State. The State pays the expenses of the sheriff who arrested him, of the judge who tried him, and of the penitentiary authorities who keep him. Therefore, the flag in behalf of the law and order is raised in the name of the State. State laws, not county laws, are being violated. Counties enact no laws. When county officers protest against the State sending her Rangers and her State officials to a county to enforce the laws, the protest is always made for the benefit of the criminals and not the law-abiding people. If a county is permitted to set up its own standard for law enforcement, then the criminals could take charge of some small county in Texas, and have a world of unrestrained lawlessness all their own. No parliament of gamblers, bootleggers, thieves, thugs, murderers, and trespassers of the law generally, should be permitted to establish courts, elect officers, and take charge of any county in this State. Civilization is not wrought out in disobedience to the law. The law should be enforced and respected on every foot of Texas soil .-- PAT M. NEFF.

POULTRY CACKLES

BEST RETURNS FROM PULLETS

Maturity Can Be Hastened by Right Kind of Care and Feeding-Range Desirable.

(Prepared by the United States Department

A flock of pullets that can be brought to laying in the fall will give the largest yearly profit. The average poultry keeper fails either to hatch early enough in spring, so that the pullets may reach laying maturity in October, or he does not keep them growing rapidly enough to bring this about. Pullets that do not get to laying well before the arrival of cold weather and the short days of December, will seldom start egg production before February. Thus two or three months of additional feeding are required, and the advantage of this period of highest egg prices is lost.

Very few eggs are secured on the average farm during autumn and early winter, but experienced poultrymen by better management secure a fair egg production during these seasons. It is advisable, though not essential, that the cockerels and pullets be separated as early as possible and given separate free range. Avoid overcrowding at night. A coop

that will hold 100 young chickens will not house properly more than half as many growing pullets. Their maturity will be retarded if too many are kept together, or if they are annoyed by lice or mites. Frequent inspection of the houses, especially after the pullets have gong to roost, is advisable. If mites are seen crawling on the perches or are found by a careful inpection of the house, prompt measures must be taken to kill them by spraying the interior of the house, as advised by the United States Department of Agriculture, with crude petroleum, kerosene, cresol solution, cattle dip, or some other effective solution. Body lice frequently cause much annoyance and retard growth and maturity. Individual treatment of each pullet with sodium fluorid or mercurial ointment will clean up these pests on the birds themselves.

Feed freely of a good egg-laying ration; give plenty of range, and be sure

The buildings called for in the contracts awarded by the State after it took over the construction of the project include the following: One-story wards, two-story wards, two-story semi-ambulant wards, two-story administration building, two-story helps' dormitories, two-story nurses' home, laundry building, power house, twostory superintendent's home, library building, chapel, garage and machine shop, warehouse, concrete water tower, oil storage tank and sewage disposal plant.

The infirmary and medical administration building is one of the Sanatorium's largest structures and is almost a complete hospital in itself. It has a capacity of 120 beds and was designed to acommodate those seriously ill and all those unable to leave their beds. It is divided into private rooms and wards varying from two to eight beds capacity and has an
