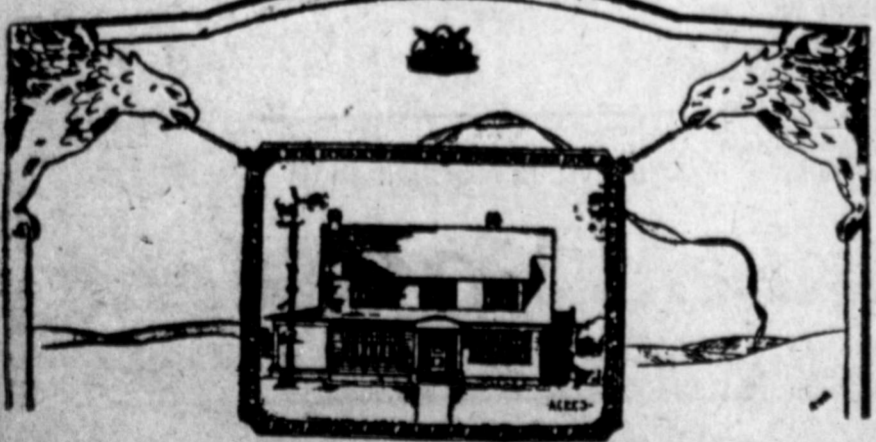

QUESTION IS RAISED AS TO WOMAN BEING STATE LEGISLATOR

Austin, Tex., Feb. 18.—In political circles here the question has been raised as to whether a woman is legally qualified to sit as a member of the Legislature in Texas. It is pointed out that nowhere in the State Constitution does it state that women are entitled to become Legislators, while on the other hand it is shown that in that provision of the Constitution prescribing the qualifications of members of the lawmaking body, the word "he" is used.

There are at least two women in the State who, it is reported, have announced as candidates for the Legislature, but so far as is known the question of their eligibility to be members of the Legislature has not been raised.

The recent decision of the State Court of Criminal Appeals in a case from Waco, where it was held that a woman can not sit on grand or petit juries, and dismissed several cases wherein two women had been members of the grand jury which indicted the defendants, is cited to sustain the contention that women are not qualified to become members of the Legislature.

SOLID TRAINLOAD OF SHEEP SOLD BY SAN ANGELO MAN

San Angelo, Tex., Feb. 20.—A solid trainload of sheep, comprising thirty-eight cars, has been shipped from Menard following the sale through Walter Mann of San Angelo of 6,783 lambs and yearling muttons to Bob Stover of Kansas City, representing the Lee Live Stock Commission Company, who was filling orders for customers.

Those who sold sheep were: W. B. Bevans, 1,800 lambs; John Treadwell, 700 lambs; Westbrook & Russell, 1,358 lambs and 700 yearling muttons; Walter Russell, 950 lambs; Fred Speck, 110 lambs; Fritz Wilhelm, 108 lambs; Fred Neal, 332 lambs and 225 muttons, a Mr. Patten, 150 muttons and lambs. The lambs brought \$5 each and the muttons \$5.25. The trainload of sheep, went to Great Bend, Kan.

L. E. Magruder of Ozona purchased through Mann 700 yearling muttons from Loftin Henderson of San Angelo and 400 from J. W. Duff. He also bought 500 ewe lambs and 500 mutton lambs from a local party. Mann sold to F. G. Patterson of Oklahoma City for L. T. Clark of Quanah and son, L. C. Clark of Water Valley, 400 steer yearlings for \$10,000.

All the sheep and cattle deals amounted to over \$53,000.
